SECTION 4. Section 38.013, Education Code, is amended by amending Subsections (a) and (a-1) and adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

(a) The agency shall make available to each school district or more coordinated health programs designed to prevent one obesity, cardiovascular disease, and Type 2 diabetes in elementary school, middle school, and junior high school students. Each program must provide for coordinating:

(1) health education;

(2) physical education and physical activity;

nutrition services; and (3)

(4) parental involvement.

The commissioner by rule shall adopt criteria for (a-1) evaluating a coordinated health program before making the program available under Subsection (a). Before adopting the criteria, the commissioner shall request review and comment concerning the criteria from the [Texas] Department of State Health Services [Health's] School Health Advisory Committee. The commissioner may make available under Subsection (a) only those programs that meet criteria adopted under this subsection.

for (c) The commissioner by rule shall adopt criteria evaluating the nutritional services component of a program under this section that includes an evaluation of program compliance with the Department of Agriculture guidelines relating to foods of minimal nutritional value.
