A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT 1 2 relating to increasing the number of students in medical education 3 in Texas. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 5 SECTION 1. Subchapter C, Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by adding Sections 61.0903, 61.0904, and 61.0905 to read as 6 7 follows: Sec. 61.0903. EXTENDED UNDERGRADUATE MEDICAL EDUCATION 8 PREPARATION PROGRAM. The board shall examine the use of 9 undergraduate programs that require more than four years of 10 undergraduate course work to prepare students for graduate medical 11 12 education to determine whether such a program would be feasible or effective in institutions of higher education in this state. Not 13 later than December 1, 2006, the board shall report to the 14 legislature the board's determination whether extended 15 undergraduate medical education preparation programs may be 16 effective in the education and training of physicians or other 17 health care professionals in this state. 18 Sec. 61.0904. RECRUITING AND RETAINING UNDERREPRESENTED 19 STUDENTS. (a) The board, in coordination with institutions of 20 21 higher education, shall develop a strategy to coordinate recruitment and retention of students from backgrounds or 22 23 geographic areas that are underrepresented in institutions of 24 higher education in this state.

No. 68 (b) In coordinating efforts under this section, the board 1 2 and institutions of higher education shall: 3 (1) identify best practices in recruitment and 4 retention efforts; and (2) create regional joint programs to eliminate 5 6 duplicate or overlapping recruitment and retention programs. Sec. 61.0905. MENTORING PILOT PROGRAM. (a) In this 7 section, "Texas-Mexico border region" has the meaning assigned by 8 Section 2056.002, Government Code. 9 The board shall collaborate with the Texas Education 10 (b) Agency to establish a pilot program to provide opportunities for 11 secondary school students in the Texas-Mexico border region who are 12 enrolled in health science technology and related courses to be 13 mentored by health care professionals or students enrolled in 14 15 undergraduate or graduate health science technology programs or related programs. The pilot program should be designed to foster 16 17 student awareness of the health professions and encourage students to pursue an education leading to a career in the health professions 18 and to enter into practice in the Texas-Mexico border region. 19 (c) The board shall provide mentoring opportunities at 20 21 three high schools in the pilot program's first year and add three 22 additional secondary schools in the second year. If the board determines that the pilot program is successful, the board, to the 23 extent possible, shall expand the program throughout the 24 25 Texas-Mexico border region. (d) Mentoring opportunities under the pilot program may be 26 27 provided by expanding existing mentoring programs.

(e) The entities participating in the pilot program shall 1 2 track, to the extent possible, students who are mentored to assess 3 the success of the mentoring efforts. 4 (f) The Texas Education Agency shall encourage school 5 districts to participate in the pilot program. 6 SECTION 2. Subchapter F, Chapter 29, Education Code, is 7 amended by adding Section 29.189 to read as follows: 8 Sec. 29.189. SUMMER STUDY SCIENCE PROGRAMS FOR UNDERREPRESENTED STUDENTS. The agency may establish a statewide 9 network of summer study science instruction programs for students 10 from groups or geographic areas that are underrepresented in the 11

SECTION 3. (a) In this section, "Texas-Mexico border region" has the meaning assigned by Section 2056.002, Government Code.

(b) Each school district in the Texas-Mexico border region 16 17 shall assess the adequacy of existing health science technology and college preparatory courses and programs in the district's 18 secondary schools and the need to establish additional health 19 science technology and college preparatory courses and programs in 20 those schools. Each district shall submit the results of the 21 assessment to the Texas Education Agency. The Texas Education 22 Agency shall compile the assessments conducted under this 23 24 subsection and submit the compilation to the governor, the lieutenant 25 governor, and the speaker of the house of representatives not later than September 1, 2006. 26

(c) This section expires January 1, 2007.
