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	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
1	AN ACT
2	relating to disease control programs to reduce the risk of certain
3	communicable diseases.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 81, Health and Safety Code, is amended by
6	adding Subchapter J to read as follows:
7	SUBCHAPTER J. PROGRAMS TO REDUCE RISK
8	OF CERTAIN COMMUNICABLE DISEASES
9	Sec. 81.401. DISEASE CONTROL PROGRAMS. (a) A local health
10	authority or an organization that contracts with a local
11	governmental entity may establish a disease control program that:
12	(1) provides for the anonymous exchange of used
13	hypodermic needles and syringes for an equal number of new
14	hypodermic needles and syringes;
15	(2) offers education on the transmission and
16	prevention of communicable diseases, including HIV, hepatitis B,
17	and hepatitis C; and
18	(3) assists program participants in obtaining
19	health-related services, including substance abuse treatment
20	services.
21	(b) A local health authority or other organization
22	operating a disease control program authorized by this subchapter
23	may charge a participant in the program a fee for each hypodermic
24	needle or syringe used in the program not to exceed 150 percent of

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1	the actual cost of the hypodermic needle or syringe.
2	(c) A local health authority or other organization
3	operating a disease control program authorized by this subchapter
4	shall annually provide the department with information on the
5	effectiveness of the program and its impact on reducing the spread
6	of communicable diseases, including HIV, hepatitis B, and hepatitis
7	<u>C.</u>
8	Sec. 81.402. DISTRIBUTION OF NEEDLES AND SYRINGES TO
9	PROGRAM. A person licensed as a wholesale drug distributor or
10	device distributor under Chapter 431 may distribute hypodermic
11	needles and syringes to a disease control program authorized by
12	this subchapter.
13	Sec. 81.403. HANDLING OF NEEDLES AND SYRINGES. (a) The
14	operator of a disease control program shall store hypodermic
15	needles and syringes in a proper and secure manner. Only authorized
16	employees or volunteers of the disease control program may have
17	access to the hypodermic needles and syringes. Program clients may
18	obtain hypodermic needles and syringes only from an authorized
19	employee or volunteer.
20	(b) The operator of a disease control program authorized by
21	this subchapter shall store and dispose of used hypodermic needles
22	and syringes in accordance with board rule.
23	SECTION 2. Section 481.125, Health and Safety Code, is
24	amended by adding Subsection (g) to read as follows:
25	(g) It is an exception to the application of Subsections (a)
26	and (b) that:
27	(1) the person manufactures hypodermic needles or

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syringes that are delivered or are to be delivered through a disease 1 2 control program established under Subchapter J, Chapter 81; or 3 (2) the person: 4 (A) uses, possesses, or delivers hypodermic needles or syringes that are delivered or are to be delivered 5 6 through a disease control program established under Subchapter J, 7 Chapter 81; and 8 (B) presents evidence showing that the person is an employee, volunteer, or participant of the disease control 9 10 program. SECTION 3. The purpose of this Act is to authorize disease 11 12 control programs to combat the spread of infectious and communicable diseases, including HIV, hepatitis B, and hepatitis C. 13 The change to Section 481.125, Health and 14 SECTION 4. (a) 15 Safety Code, made by this Act applies only to an offense committed on or after the effective date of this Act. For purposes of this 16 section, an offense is committed before the effective date of this 17 Act if any element of the offense occurs before the effective date. 18 An offense committed before the effective date of this 19 (b) Act is covered by the law in effect when the offense was committed, 20 and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose. 21 22 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2005.

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
