A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the Texas Academy of International Studies at Texas A&M
3	International University.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subchapter F, Chapter 87, Education Code, is
6	amended by adding Section 87.505 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 87.505. TEXAS ACADEMY OF INTERNATIONAL STUDIES.
8	(a) In this section:
9	(1) "Academy" means the Texas Academy of International
10	Studies.
11	(2) "Board" means the board of regents of The Texas A&M
12	University System.
13	(3) "University" means Texas A&M International
14	University.
15	(b) The Texas Academy of International Studies is a division
16	of Texas A&M International University and is under the management
17	and control of the board. The academy serves the following
18	purposes:
19	(1) to provide academically gifted and highly
20	motivated junior and senior high school students with a challenging
21	university-level curriculum that:
22	(A) allows students to complete high school
23	graduation requirements, including requirements adopted under

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2 education; 3 (B) fosters students' knowledge of real-world international issues and problems and teaches students to apply 4 critical thinking and problem-solving skills to those issues and 5 6 problems; 7 (C) includes the study of English, foreign languages, social studies, anthropology, and sociology; 8 (D) is presented through an interdisciplinary 9 approach that introduces and develops issues, especially issues 10 related to international concerns, throughout the curriculum; and 11 (E) offers students learning opportunities 12 related to international issues through in-depth research and 13 field-based studies; 14 15 (2) to provide students with an awareness of 16 international career and professional development opportunities through seminars, workshops, collaboration with postsecondary 17 18 students from other countries, summer academic international studies internships in foreign countries, and similar methods; and 19 (3) to provide students with social development 20 activities that enrich the academic curriculum and student life, 21 22 including, as determined appropriate by the academy, University Interscholastic League activities and other extracurricular

(c) The academy is a residential, coeducational institution

activities generally offered by public high schools.

admit only high school juniors and seniors, except that the academy may admit a student with exceptional abilities who is not yet a high school junior. The board shall set aside adequate space on the university campus in Laredo to operate the academy and implement the purposes of this section. The academy must operate on the same fall and spring semester basis as the university. Full-time students of the academy must enroll for both the fall and spring semesters. Faculty members of the university shall teach all academic classes at the academy. A student of the academy may attend a college course offered by the university and receive college credit for that course.

- (d) Except as otherwise provided by this subsection, the university administration has the same powers and duties with respect to the academy that the administration has with respect to the university. The board shall consult with the dean of the College of Education and other members of the administration as the board considers necessary concerning the academy's administrative design and support, personnel and student issues, and faculty development. The board shall consult with the dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and other members of the administration as the board considers necessary concerning the academy's curriculum development, program design, and general faculty issues. The board, in consultation with university administration, shall:
- (1) establish an internal management system for the academy and appoint an academy principal who serves at the will of the board and reports to the university provost;
- (2) provide for one or more academy counselors;

- 1 (3) establish for the academy a site-based
 2 decision-making process similar to the process required by
 3 Subchapter F, Chapter 11, that provides for the participation of
 4 academy faculty, parents of academy students, and other members of
 5 the community; and
- 6 (4) establish an admissions process for the academy.
- 7 (e) The student-teacher ratio in all regular academic
 8 classes at the academy may not exceed 30 students for each classroom
 9 teacher, except that the student-teacher ratio may exceed that
 10 limit:
- 11 (1) in a program provided for the purposes prescribed 12 by Subsection (b)(2) or another special enrichment course or in a 13 physical education course; or
- 14 (2) if the board determines that a class with a higher
 15 student-teacher ratio would contribute to the educational
 16 development of the students in the class.
- (f) The academy shall provide the university-level curriculum in a manner that is appropriate for the social, psychological, emotional, and physical development of high school juniors and seniors. The administrative and counseling personnel of the academy shall provide continuous support to and supervision of students.

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(g) For each student enrolled in the academy, the academy is entitled to allotments from the foundation school fund under Chapter 42 as if the academy were a school district without a tier one local share for purposes of Section 42.253. If in any academic year the amount of the allotments under this subsection exceeds the

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amount of state funds paid to the academy in the first fiscal year of the academy's operation, the commissioner of education shall set aside from the total amount of funds to which school districts are entitled under Section 42.253(c) an amount equal to the excess amount and shall distribute that amount to the academy. After deducting the amount set aside and paid to the academy by the commissioner of education under this subsection, the commissioner of education shall reduce the amount to which each district is entitled under Section 42.253(c) in the manner described by Section 42.253(h). A determination of the commissioner of education under this subsection is final and may not be appealed.

(h) The board may use any available money, enter into contracts, and accept grants, including matching grants, federal grants, and grants from a corporation or other private contributor, in establishing and operating the academy. Money spent by the academy must further the purposes of the academy prescribed by Subsection (b).

(i) The liability of the state under Chapters 101 and 104, Civil Practice and Remedies Code, is limited for the academy and employees assigned to the academy and acting on behalf of the academy to the same extent that the liability of a school district and an employee of the school district is limited under Sections 22.0511, 22.0512, and 22.052 of this code and Section 101.051, Civil Practice and Remedies Code. An employee assigned to the academy is entitled to representation by the attorney general in a civil suit based on an action or omission of the employee in the course of the employee's employment, limits on liability, and

- 1 indemnity under Chapters 104 and 108, Civil Practice and Remedies
- 2 <u>Code.</u>
- 3 (j) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the
- 4 <u>academy is not subject to the provisions</u> of this code, or to the
- 5 rules of the Texas Education Agency, regulating public schools.
- 6 (k) A student may not begin attending the academy before the
- 7 2007 fall semester. This subsection expires August 31, 2008.
- 8 SECTION 2. Subsection (a), Section 25.086, Education Code,
- 9 is amended to read as follows:
- 10 (a) A child is exempt from the requirements of compulsory
- 11 school attendance if the child:
- 12 (1) attends a private or parochial school that
- includes in its course a study of good citizenship;
- 14 (2) is eligible to participate in a school district's
- 15 special education program under Section 29.003 and cannot be
- 16 appropriately served by the resident district;
- 17 (3) has a physical or mental condition of a temporary
- and remediable nature that makes the child's attendance infeasible
- 19 and holds a certificate from a qualified physician specifying the
- 20 temporary condition, indicating the treatment prescribed to remedy
- 21 the temporary condition, and covering the anticipated period of the
- 22 child's absence from school for the purpose of receiving and
- 23 recuperating from that remedial treatment;
- 24 (4) is expelled in accordance with the requirements of
- law in a school district that does not participate in a mandatory
- 26 juvenile justice alternative education program under Section
- 27 37.011;

- 1 (5) is at least 17 years of age and:
- 2 (A) is attending a course of instruction to
- 3 prepare for the high school equivalency examination, and:
- 4 (i) has the permission of the child's parent
- 5 or guardian to attend the course;
- 6 (ii) is required by court order to attend
- 7 the course;
- 8 (iii) has established a residence separate
- 9 and apart from the child's parent, guardian, or other person having
- 10 lawful control of the child; or
- 11 (iv) is homeless as defined by 42 U.S.C.
- 12 Section 11302; or
- 13 (B) has received a high school diploma or high
- 14 school equivalency certificate;
- 15 (6) is at least 16 years of age and is attending a
- 16 course of instruction to prepare for the high school equivalency
- 17 examination, if:
- 18 (A) the child is recommended to take the course
- of instruction by a public agency that has supervision or custody of
- 20 the child under a court order; or
- 21 (B) the child is enrolled in a Job Corps training
- 22 program under [the Job Training Partnership Act (]29 U.S.C. Section
- 23 <u>2881</u> [1501] et seq.[), and its subsequent amendments];
- 24 (7) is enrolled in the Texas Academy of Mathematics
- 25 and Science;
- 26 (8) is enrolled in the Texas Academy of Leadership in
- 27 the Humanities; [or]

- 1 (9) <u>is enrolled in the Texas Academy of International</u>
- 2 Studies; or
- 3 (10) is specifically exempted under another law.
- 4 SECTION 3. Section 28.024, Education Code, is amended to
- 5 read as follows:
- 6 Sec. 28.024. CREDIT FOR ENROLLMENT IN CERTAIN ACADEMIES. A
- 7 school district shall grant to a student credit toward the academic
- 8 course requirements for high school graduation, up to a maximum of
- 9 two years of credit, for courses the student successfully completes
- 10 at:
- 11 (1) the Texas Academy of Leadership in the Humanities
- under Section 96.707 [Subchapter E, Chapter 108]; [or]
- 13 (2) the Texas Academy of Mathematics and Science under
- 14 Subchapter \underline{G} [\underline{H}], Chapter 105; or
- 15 (3) the Texas Academy of International Studies under
- 16 Section 87.505.
- 17 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 18 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 19 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 20 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 21 Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
