- 1 recommendations or requirements of regulations adopted by the
- 2 Occupational Safety and Health Administration for warning signs,
- 3 that reads:
- 4 "WARNING--UNLAWFUL TO OPERATE THIS EQUIPMENT WITHIN TEN FEET OF
- 5 HIGH VOLTAGE LINES."
- 6 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 7 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 8 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 9 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 10 Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
