1	AN ACT
2	relating to reducing the time management burdens imposed on
3	classroom teachers.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subchapter I, Chapter 21, Education Code, is
6	amended by adding Section 21.4011 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 21.4011. MAXIMUM WORKDAY; MEETINGS. (a) A workday for
8	a classroom teacher may not be more than 30 minutes longer than the
9	instructional day.
10	(b) Except in the case of an emergency, a classroom teacher
11	must be given at least 24 hours' notice of any meeting that is held
12	outside of the teacher's regular workday as provided under
13	Subsection (a). The commissioner by rule shall define an emergency
14	for purposes of this subsection.
15	(c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this code, a
16	classroom teacher may not be required to attend more than one
17	meeting each week that is held outside of the teacher's regular
18	workday as provided under Subsection (a).
19	SECTION 2. Section 21.404, Education Code, is amended to
20	read as follows:
21	Sec. 21.404. PLANNING AND PREPARATION TIME. (a) Each
22	classroom teacher is entitled to at least 450 minutes within each
23	two-week period for instructional preparation, including
24	parent-teacher conferences, evaluating students' work, and

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1 planning. A planning and preparation period under this section may 2 not be less than 45 minutes within the instructional day. During a 3 planning and preparation period, a classroom teacher may not be 4 required to participate in any other activity.

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5 (b) Each school district shall schedule at least one 6 two-hour period each month during the regular workday for teachers 7 to plan and collaborate with other teachers who teach the same 8 subject or grade level.

9 (c) To allow teachers additional preparation and planning 10 time, each school district and school shall establish a volunteer 11 program under which volunteers perform most routine nonteaching 12 duties, including performing clerical duties, monitoring students 13 in the cafeteria, and performing routine before-school and 14 after-school duties such as monitoring students at bus stops.

SECTION 3. This Act applies beginning with the 2005-2006 school year.

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2005.

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
