4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 436.101, Government Code, is amended to
6	read as follows:
7	Sec. 436.101. POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMISSION. The
8	commission shall:
9	(1) advise the governor and the legislature on
10	military issues and economic and industrial development related to
11	military issues;
12	(2) make recommendations regarding:
13	(A) the development of policies and plans to
14	support the long-term viability and prosperity of the military,
15	active and civilian, in this state, including promoting strategic
16	regional alliances that may extend over state lines; <u>and</u>
17	(B) [the development of methods to improve
18	private and public employment opportunities for former members of
19	the military residing in this state; and
20	[-(C)] the development of methods to assist
21	defense-dependent communities in the design and execution of
22	programs that enhance a community's relationship with military
23	installations and defense-related businesses;
24	(3) [develop and maintain a database of the names and

public business information of all prime contractors and 1 2 subcontractors operating in this state who perform defense-related 3 work; [(4)] provide information to communities, 4 the 5 legislature, the state's congressional delegation, and state agencies regarding federal actions affecting military 6 7 installations and missions; 8 (4) [(5)] serve as a clearinghouse for: 9 (A) defense economic adjustment and transition information and activities along with the Texas Business and 10 Community Economic Development Clearinghouse; and 11 information about: 12 (B) (i) issues related to the operating costs, 13 14 missions, and strategic value of federal military installations 15 located in the state; (ii) employment issues for communities that 16 17 depend on defense bases and in defense-related businesses; and (iii) defense strategies and 18 incentive 19 programs that other states are using to maintain, expand, and attract new defense contractors; 20 21 (5) [(6)] provide assistance to communities that have experienced a defense-related closure or realignment; 22 23 (6) $\left[\frac{(7)}{(7)}\right]$ assist communities in the design and 24 execution of programs that enhance a community's relationship with military installations and defense-related businesses, including 25 26 regional alliances that may extend over state lines; 27 (7) [(8)] assist communities in the retention and

No. 1481 recruiting of defense-related businesses, including fostering 1 2 strategic regional alliances that may extend over state lines; 3 [(9) prepare a biennial strategic plan that: 4 [(A) fosters the enhancement of military value of 5 the contributions of Texas military installations to national 6 defense strategies; [(B) considers all current and anticipated base 7 8 realignment and closure criteria; and 9 [(C) develops strategies to protect the state's existing military missions and positions the state to be 10 competitive for new and expanded military missions;] and 11 (8) [(10)] encourage economic development in this 12 state by fostering the development of industries related to defense 13 14 affairs. 15 SECTION 2. Sections 436.103(b) and (d), Government Code, are amended to read as follows: 16 Not later than July 1 of each even-numbered year, the 17 (b) commission shall prepare and submit a report to the governor and the 18 legislature about the active military installations, communities 19 that depend on military installations, and defense-related 20 businesses in this state. The commission may update the report in 21 an odd-numbered year. The report must include: 22 an economic impact statement describing in detail 23 (1)24 the effect of the military on the economy of this state; (2) a statewide assessment of active 25 military installations and current missions; 26 (3) a statewide strategy to attract new military 27

No. 1481 missions and defense-related business and include specific actions 1 2 that add military value to existing military installations; (4) a list of state and federal activities that have 3 4 significant impact on active military installations and current 5 missions; 6 (5) a statement identifying: the state and federal programs and services 7 (A) 8 that assist communities impacted by military base closures or 9 realignments and the efforts to coordinate those programs; and (B) the efforts to coordinate state agency 10 programs and services that assist communities in retaining active 11 military installations and current missions; 12 (6) an evaluation of initiatives to retain existing 13 14 defense-related businesses; and 15 (7) a list of agencies with regulations, policies, programs, or services that impact the operating costs or strategic 16 17 value of federal military installations and activities in the 18 state. (d) The commission shall periodically meet [coordinate 19 annual meetings] with [the head of] each state agency that has 20 21 defense-related programs or is engaged in a project in a defense-dependent community and with each [or] member of the 22 legislature whose district contains an active, closed, or realigned 23 24 military installation to discuss defense-related issues and the 25 implementation of the recommendations outlined in the report required under Subsection (b). 26 SECTION 3. Subchapter D, Chapter 436, Government Code, is 27

1 amended by adding Sections 436.1531 and 436.1532 to read as 2 follows:

3 Sec. 436.1531. LOANS FOR COMMUNITIES ADVERSELY AFFECTED BY 4 DEFENSE BASE REDUCTION. (a) The commission may provide a loan of financial assistance to a defense community for an economic 5 6 development project that minimizes the negative effects of a 7 defense base reduction on the defense community as a result of a 8 United States Department of Defense base realignment process that occurs during 2005 or later. The loan shall be made from the Texas 9 military value revolving loan account established under Section 10 436.156. 11

12 (b) On receiving an application for a loan under this 13 section, the commission shall evaluate the economic development 14 project to determine how the project will minimize the negative 15 effects of a defense base reduction on the defense community, 16 including the number of jobs that the project will create and the 17 economic impact the project will have on the community.

18 (c) If the commission determines that a project will reduce 19 the negative effects of a defense base reduction on the defense 20 community, the commission shall:

21 (1) analyze the creditworthiness of the defense
22 community to determine the defense community's ability to repay the
23 loan; and
24 (2) evaluate the feasibility of the project to be

27 (d) If the commission determines that the funds will be used

The loan shall be made from the Texas military value 4 revolving loan account established under Section 436.156. (b) On receiving an application for a loan under this 5 6 section, the commission shall evaluate the infrastructure project 7 to determine how the project will assist the defense community in accommodating the new or expanded military missions that are 8 9 assigned to the military facility. (c) If the commission determines that the project will 10 assist the defense community in accommodating the new or expanded 11 12 military missions that are assigned to the military facility, the commission shall: 13 14 (1) analyze the creditworthiness of the defense 15 community to determine the defense community's ability to repay the 16 loan; and 17 (2) evaluate the feasibility of the project to be financed to ensure that the defense community has pledged a source 18 19 of revenue or taxes sufficient to repay the loan for the project. (d) If the commission determines that the funds will be used 20 21 to finance an infrastructure project to accommodate new or expanded 22 military missions assigned to the military facility located in, near, or adjacent to the defense community and that the project is 23 24 financially feasible, the commission may award a loan to the defense community for the project. The commission shall enter into 25 26 a written agreement with a defense community that is awarded a loan. 27 The agreement must contain the terms and conditions of the loan,

2	(e) The commission shall notify the Texas Public Finance
3	Authority of the amount of the loan and the recipient of the loan
4	and request the authority to issue general obligation bonds in an

8	(f) The commission shall administer the loans to ensure full

16	SECTION 4. Section 397.001(1), Local Government Code, is

22	SECTION 5. Section 397.002(a), Local Government Code, is

1 with the community, a defense base military value enhancement 2 statement that illustrates specific ways the funds will enhance the 3 military value of the installations and must include the following 4 information for each project:

5 (1) the purpose for which financial assistance is6 requested, including a description of the project;

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(2) the source of other funds for the project;

8 (3) a statement on how the project will enhance the9 military value of the installation;

10 (4) whether the defense community has coordinated the 11 project with authorities of the military installation and whether 12 any approval has been obtained from those authorities;

13 (5) whether any portion of the project is to occur on14 the military installation;

(6) whether the project will have any negative impacton the natural or cultural environment;

17 (7) a description of any known negative factors 18 arising from the project that will affect the community or the 19 military installation; and

20 (8) a description of how the project will address21 future base realignment or closure.

22 SECTION 6. Chapter 397, Local Government Code, is amended 23 by adding Section 397.0021 to read as follows:

24 <u>Sec. 397.0021. DEFENSE COMMUNITY ECONOMIC REDEVELOPMENT</u> 25 <u>VALUE STATEMENT. (a) A defense community that is adjacent to a</u> 26 <u>closed military installation and applies for financial assistance</u> 27 from the Texas military value revolving loan account shall prepare

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1	an economic redevelopment value statement that illustrates
2	specific ways the funds will be used to promote economic
3	development in the community and include the following information
4	for each project:
5	(1) the purpose for which financial assistance is
6	requested, including a description of the project;
7	(2) the source of other funds for the project;
8	(3) a statement on how the project will promote
9	economic development in the community;
10	(4) whether any portion of the project is to occur on a
11	closed military installation;
12	(5) whether any approval has been obtained from those
13	authorities retaining or receiving title to that portion of the
14	closed installation to be affected by the project;
15	(6) whether the project will have any negative impact
16	on the natural or cultural environment; and
17	(7) a description of any known negative factors
18	arising from the project that will affect the defense community.
19	(b) The Texas Military Preparedness Commission may require
20	a defense community to provide any additional information the
21	commission requires to evaluate the community's request for
22	financial assistance under this section.
23	(c) Two or more defense communities near the same defense
24	base that apply for financial assistance from the Texas military
25	value revolving loan account may prepare a joint statement.
26	(d) A copy of the economic redevelopment value statement
27	shall be distributed to the Texas Military Preparedness Commission

- 1 and any defense community which may be affected by the resulting 2 project.
- 3 (e) This section does not prohibit a defense community that
 4 is not applying for financial assistance from preparing an economic
 5 redevelopment value statement under this section.

6 SECTION 7. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 7 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 8 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 9 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 10 Act takes effect September 1, 2005.
