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SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2 WHEREAS, In recognition of both the direct and indirect revenues that could be generated for the state by a robust wine 3 industry, Lt. Governor Dewhurst charged the Senate Committee on 4 Intergovernmental Relations Committee of the 78th Legislature to 5 6 study and make recommendations relating to the development of the 7 Texas wine producing industry; assess the impact of state and federal laws on the shipment and delivery of wine; and make 8 recommendations for increasing the economic impact of the wine 9 10 producing industry in Texas; and

WHEREAS, The Senate Committee on Intergovernmental Relations 11 12 found that Texas has all the elements necessary to be a competitive force in the national and international wine industries; the Texas 13 wine producing industry could prove to be a stellar economic 14 15 generator for the state of Texas; with the proper policies in place, the Texas wine producing industry is positioned to boom within the 16 17 next 5 to 10 years; although progress has been made throughout the years, insufficient funding and budget reductions for new and 18 19 existing education, training, and research hinder the development of the industry; and the lack of a consistent, coordinated, and 20 centralized effort among industry stakeholders and public policy 21 22 makers to develop appropriate programs and policies; explore, 23 develop and access relevant funding streams; and communicate 24 concerns and needs to appropriate parties impedes the development

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1 of this industry to its full potential; and

2 WHEREAS, It has been shown by the world's major wine 3 producing regions that investment into education and research 4 creates an unparalleled advantage; and

5 WHEREAS, Expansion of the Texas wine industry will need an 6 influx of professional talent and expertise, particularly in the 7 specialized fields of wine production and vineyard development; and

8 WHEREAS, Nationwide, only universities in California and 9 Washington State offer four-year undergraduate degree programs in 10 viticulture and/or enology; and

11 WHEREAS, Testimony at the October 6th hearing of the Senate 12 Committee on Intergovernmental Relations indicated that, there are 13 individuals and organizations ready, willing, and able to assist 14 with the development of viticulture and enology education, but 15 there is no specific undergraduate or graduate degree program in 16 which to vest their support; now, therefore be it

17 RESOLVED, That the 79th Legislature of the State of Texas 18 hereby respectfully encourage Texas A&M University, Texas Tech University, Grayson County College T.V. Munson Viticulture and 19 Enology Center, and other Texas institutes of higher education 20 offering education and research opportunities in viticulture and 21 22 enology to collaborate to develop a world class education and research program within the State of Texas; and, therefore be it 23 24 further

RESOLVED, That the efforts of this collaboration be reported to the members of Legislature no later than the opening day of the 80th Legislative Session.

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
