SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1-10 WHEREAS, In recognition of both the direct and indirect 1-11 revenues that could be generated for the state by a robust wine 1-12 industry, Lieutenant Governor David Dewhurst charged the Senate 1-13 Committee on Intergovernmental Relations of the 78th Legislature to 1-14 study and make recommendations relating to the development of the 1-15 Texas wine industry, assess the impact of state and federal laws on 1-16 the shipment and delivery of wine, and make recommendations for 1-17 increasing the economic impact of the wine industry in Texas; and

1-18 WHEREAS, The Senate Committee on Intergovernmental Relations 1-19 found that Texas has all the elements necessary to be a competitive 1-20 force in the national and international wine industries; the Texas 1-21 wine industry could prove to be a stellar economic generator for the 1-22 state, and with the proper policies in place, the industry is 1-23 positioned to boom within the next five to 10 years; and

1-24 WHEREAS, Although progress has been made through the years, 1-25 insufficient funding and budget reductions for new and existing 1-26 education, training, and research hinder the development of the 1-27 industry; moreover, the lack of a consistent, coordinated, and 1-28 centralized effort among industry stakeholders and public policy 1-29 makers to develop appropriate programs and policies, to explore, 1-30 develop, and access relevant funding streams, and to communicate 1-31 concerns and needs to appropriate parties impedes the development 1-32 of this industry to its full potential; and

1-33 WHEREAS, It has been shown by the world's major wine 1-34 producing regions that investment in education and research creates 1-35 an unparalleled advantage; and

1-36 WHEREAS, Expansion of the Texas wine industry will require an 1-37 influx of professional talent and expertise, particularly in the 1-38 specialized fields of wine production and vineyard development; and

1-39 WHEREAS, Nationwide, only universities in California and 1-40 Washington offer four-year undergraduate degree programs in 1-41 viticulture or enology; and

1-42 WHEREAS, Testimony at the October 6, 2004, hearing of the 1-43 Senate Committee on Intergovernmental Relations indicated that 1-44 there are individuals and organizations ready, willing, and able to 1-45 assist with the development of viticulture and enology education 1-46 but that there is no specific undergraduate or graduate degree 1-47 program in which to vest their support; now, therefore, be it

1-48 RESOLVED, That the 79th Legislature of the State of Texas 1-49 hereby respectfully encourage Texas A&M University, Texas Tech 1-50 University, Grayson County College T. V. Munson Viticulture and 1-51 Enology Center, and other Texas institutions of higher education 1-52 offering education and research opportunities in viticulture and 1-53 enology to collaborate to develop a world-class education and 1-54 research program within the State of Texas; and, be it further

1-55 RESOLVED, That the efforts of this collaboration be reported 1-56 to the members of the legislature not later than the opening day of 1-57 the 80th Legislative Session; and, be it further
