3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Section 25.087, Education Code, is amended by
5	amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (c) to read as
6	follows:
7	(b) A school district shall excuse a student from attending
8	school for the purpose of :
9	(1) observing religious holy days, including
10	traveling for that purpose <u>;</u>
11	(2) attending an appointment with a [. A school
12	district shall excuse a student for temporary absence resulting
13	<pre>from] health care professional [professionals] if the [that]</pre>
14	student commences classes or returns to school on the same day of
15	the appointment; or
16	(3) visiting the State Capitol or a state or national
17	park with the student's family, provided that:
18	(A) a district is not required to excuse more
19	than two days for this purpose during each school year; and
20	(B) the student must submit a brief essay that
21	describes the student's experiences while visiting the State
22	Capitol or park and summarizes the historical, scientific, or other
23	academic subject area information learned by the student during the

- (c) A student whose absence is excused under <u>Subsection</u> (b) 1 [this subsection] may not be penalized for that absence and shall be 2 counted as if the student attended school for purposes of 3 4 calculating the average daily attendance of students in the school district. A student whose absence is excused under Subsection (b) 5 6 [this subsection] shall be allowed a reasonable time to make up school work missed on those days. If the student satisfactorily 7 8 completes the school work, the day of absence shall be counted as a 9 day of compulsory attendance.
- SECTION 2. This Act applies beginning with the 2007-2008 school year.
- SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2007.
