6	SECTION 1. Section 521.142, Transportation Code, is amended
7	by adding Subsection (i) to read as follows:
8	(i) The department may not accept, recognize, or rely on an
9	identity document issued to an applicant by a consular office or
10	consular official of another country, including a matricula
11	consular issued by a consular office of the United Mexican States
12	located in this country, as primary, secondary, or supporting proof
13	of the applicant's identity.
14	SECTION 2. Subtitle B, Title 10, Government Code, is
15	amended by adding Chapter 2057 to read as follows:
16	CHAPTER 2057. RECOGNITION OF CONSULAR IDENTITY DOCUMENTS
17	Sec. 2057.001. GOVERNMENTAL RECOGNITION OF CONSULAR
18	IDENTITY DOCUMENT OF APPLICANT FOR PUBLIC BENEFIT OR SERVICE. In
19	the provision by an agency or political subdivision of this state of
20	a public benefit or service that requires the applicant for or
21	recipient of the public benefit or service to verify the
22	applicant's or recipient's identity, the agency or political
23	subdivision may not accept, recognize, or rely on an identity
24	document issued to the applicant or recipient by a consular office

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or consular official of another country, including a matricula 1 2 consular issued by a consular office of the United Mexican States located in this country, as primary, secondary, or supporting 3 4 evidence of the applicant's or recipient's identity. Sec. 2057.002. GOVERNMENTAL RECOGNITION OF CONSULAR 5 6 IDENTITY DOCUMENT OF APPLICANT FOR PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT. An agency or 7 political subdivision of this state may not accept, recognize, or rely on an identity document issued to the applicant by a consular 8 office or consular official of another country, including a 9 matricula consular issued by a consular office of the United 10 Mexican States located in this country, as primary, secondary, or 11 supporting evidence of the identity of an applicant for employment 12 by the agency or political subdivision. 13

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SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2007.

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
