Sec. 571.0713. SEMINARS FOR LOBBYISTS. (a) [(c)] The commission may provide a seminar for persons required to register under Chapter 305 that addresses issues involving lobbying, political contributions and expenditures, and other issues as determined by the commission.

6 (b) The commission may charge a fee for attending the 7 seminar in an amount necessary to cover the costs associated with 8 the seminar.

9 SECTION 2. A person who on January 1, 2008, serves as a 10 member of the legislature must complete the ethics training 11 required by Section 571.071, Government Code, as amended by this 12 Act, not later than April 1, 2008. A person who after January 1, 13 2008, is elected or appointed to the legislature must complete the 14 ethics training required by Section 571.071, Government Code, as 15 amended by this Act, in compliance with that section.

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SECTION 3. This Act takes effect January 1, 2008.
