HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The Denver Harbor neighborhood, in northeast 2 Houston, is one of the oldest communities in the Bayou City; and 3 WHEREAS, Bounded on the north by Wallisville Road, on the west by the Houston Belt and Terminal Railroad, on the south by the 4 Southern Pacific Railroad, and on the east by the Port Authority 5 Railroad, the area was first settled in the 1890s; platting in 1911 6 and again in 1913 created what were originally four distinct 7 subdivisions: Denver, Harbor, Harbordale, and Liberty Heights; and 8 WHEREAS, Many early residents were Texans who had left 9 hardscrabble farms for the city in hopes of making a better life for 10 11 themselves and their families; these citizens found work on the 12 railroads and at various industrial companies that sprang up along

WHEREAS, Those who put down roots in Denver Harbor found it a good place to raise a family; among the neighborhood's amenities were Charles Eliot Elementary School, churches, drug stores, and the Globe Theater, where children could watch the latest Hollywood westerns for the sum of nine cents; and

WHEREAS, The Great Depression hit Denver Harbor hard, and many families in the neighborhood lost their homes; as the 1930s drew to an end, however, a curious occurrence did much to lift the spirits of the beleaguered community: on June 1, 1939, the morning sun revealed the word "Podunk" emblazoned on the formerly blank side of the local water tower; though the city tried repeatedly to

the Houston Ship Channel; and

1 cover over the word, the name would always reappear within a few

- 2 days; and
- 3 WHEREAS, Inspired by the spunky defiance of the sign's
- 4 unknown painter, area residents soon began asserting their identity
- 5 as Podunkers, and the name was even adopted by a youth basketball
- 6 team, the Podunk Skunks; and
- WHEREAS, Today, Denver Harbor reflects the ethnic diversity
- 8 of Houston itself, with Hispanics forming the core of its
- 9 population; the community is currently undergoing revitalization,
- 10 especially along Lyons Avenue, where a new fire station has opened
- and a number of new businesses have set up shop; residents are also
- 12 served by four elementary schools, a middle school, and a private
- 13 school; and
- 14 WHEREAS, The story of this resilient neighborhood is told in
- 15 the book Where the Hell Is Podunk, Texas?, which won an honorable
- 16 mention at the 2006 Independent Publisher Book Awards; Dr. Jay
- 17 Grady, the volume's author, grew up in Denver Harbor; following the
- 18 publication of his historical account, a Podunk reunion brought
- 19 together many present and former residents aged 80 and older; and
- 20 WHEREAS, Notable Houstonians who have resided in Denver
- 21 Harbor include Richard Vara, Harris County justice of the peace,
- 22 Tina Reyes, member of the board of the Houston Independent School
- 23 District, Raul Martinez, the first Mexican American constable in
- 24 Harris County, and Elias C. "Ace" Martinez, the first Mexican
- 25 American firefighter in Houston; assigned to Station 27, in Denver
- 26 Harbor, Mr. Martinez spent 36 years with the department and
- 27 achieved the rank of sergeant before his retirement; in December

- 1 2005, the department dedicated Fire Engine No. 27 to his memory;
- 2 other prominent residents of the neighborhood have included the
- 3 late Joe E. Moreno, who represented District 143 in the Texas
- 4 Legislature, and his predecessors in that office, Ben T. Reyes, who
- 5 also served on the Houston City Council, and Al Luna; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The citizens of Denver Harbor take great pride in
- 7 the heritage of their community and in the unpretentious name that
- 8 earlier residents made their own; it is the wish of the
- 9 neighborhood, with the expressed support of the Denver Harbor Civic
- 10 Club and Bill White, mayor of Houston, that this community's
- 11 identification with that simple but enduring locale of the
- imagination be appropriately recognized, and a declaration to that
- 13 effect is indeed appropriate; now, therefore, be it
- RESOLVED, That the 80th Legislature of the State of Texas
- 15 hereby designate Denver Harbor, aka Podunk, as the official
- 16 Mythical Town of Texas.
