## CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, With the passing of Herriford Williams on May 3, 2007, the State of Texas bid farewell to a respected business and civic leader whose dedication to helping others made a significant contribution to the Lone Star State during his 35 years as a Texas resident; and

WHEREAS, Born in Brewton, Alabama, in 1935, "John" Williams answered his country's call to duty during the Korean War, serving as a chaplain's aide in the U.S. Army; after completing his studies at Hope College, he became one of the earliest African American sales executives hired by Procter & Gamble; a resident of Michigan for a number of years, Mr. Williams helped found the Palmer Drug Abuse Program in Detroit in the late 1960s; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Williams and his family moved to Houston in 1972 when he gave up his successful corporate career to become a franchise owner for the McDonald's Corporation; the first African American to operate such an enterprise in Houston, Mr. Williams chose to base his three restaurants in economically depressed neighborhoods in the city, providing much-needed jobs to area residents; and

WHEREAS, Emerging as a role model and a civic activist, Mr. Williams committed himself to bettering his community and worked to empower Houston's African American citizens and to achieve greater social justice; his positive and wide-ranging efforts received recognition from local government and law enforcement agencies, and

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in time his wisdom and insight were sought by Texas governors, members of congress, and a long list of other elected officials; and WHEREAS, With a commitment to serving others that was based in his spiritual faith, Mr. Williams was a member of the board of directors of St. Timothy's United Methodist Church in Houston for many years; following his retirement in 2000, he and his wife, Doris, moved to New Waverly, and he became a prominent member of St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Conroe; his retirement years were also devoted to counseling at-risk youth at the Gulf Coast Trade Center, and he continued this service until his final days; compassionate actions of this type pervaded all aspects of John Williams's life, and his devotion to those in need will be long remembered and greatly missed; now, therefore, be it 

RESOLVED, That the 80th Legislature of the State of Texas hereby pay tribute to the life of Herriford "John" Williams and extend deepest condolences to the members of his family: to his wife of 46 years, Doris Williams; to his sons, Kevin and Patrick Williams; to his grandchildren, Marie and Moses Williams; to his brothers, the Reverend Samuel Williams and John Williams; to his cousin, Leonard Mobley; to his close friend, Tyris Johnson; and to his other relatives and many friends; and, be it further
