RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The State of Texas has lost an esteemed statesman 2 with the death of former speaker of the Texas House of 3 Representatives, the Honorable Bill W. Clayton of Springlake, who 4 passed away on January 6, 2007, at the age of 78; and

5 WHEREAS, Born on September 11, 1928, Bill Clayton grew up as a 6 member of a farming family near the Texas Panhandle town of 7 Springlake; after earning a degree in agricultural economics at 8 Texas A&M University in 1950, he assumed the management of the 9 family farm and also took part in other business enterprises in the 10 Springlake area; and

WHEREAS, His interest in civic affairs led him into politics, 11 12 and after serving as a delegate for Lyndon Johnson at the Democratic 13 National Convention in 1960, he was elected to the Texas House of 14 Representatives in 1962; for the next two decades, this insightful leader was repeatedly returned to office, and he became an 15 influential figure at the State Capitol; Representative Clayton was 16 particularly concerned with water issues and sponsored legislation 17 that called for increased resources and conservation in the Lone 18 Star State; and 19

20 WHEREAS, With a reputation for building consensus among other 21 legislators, Bill Clayton was recognized as a candidate to lead the 22 chamber, and in 1975 he was elected as the 70th speaker of the house 23 of representatives; he retained that position until he retired from 24 the legislature at the end of 1982, and his eight-year tenure was

1 twice as long as the tenure of any previous Texas speaker; and 2 WHEREAS, Pioneering new initiatives to make state government more efficient and accountable, Speaker Clayton oversaw the 3 4 enhancement of support services, electronic resources, and office 5 facilities for legislators, and he expanded the activities of 6 standing house committees and directed them to conduct research in 7 the interim periods between legislative sessions; as vice-chairman 8 of the Joint Advisory Committee on Governmental Operations, he helped implement a regular oversight process for state agencies 9 through the Texas Sunset Act, and he was a driving force behind the 10 creation of a new commission on ethics; and 11

WHEREAS, Speaker Clayton was renowned for his abilities to 12 reach out to members of both parties and became the first Democratic 13 14 speaker to appoint Republicans as committee chairs; his rapport 15 with officials across the political spectrum continued after he left office, when he became the founder and president of Capital 16 17 Consultants, a political and business consulting firm in Austin; Mr. Clayton, who switched to the Republican Party in 1985, also 18 served two terms on the State Aircraft Pooling Board, was a regent 19 for The Texas A&M University System, and was a member of the board 20 21 for Campaigns for People, a group that promotes campaign finance reform in Texas; he also found time to further his education, 22 earning an MBA from The University of Texas at Austin in 1992; and 23

24 WHEREAS, The straightforward qualities of rural living 25 continued to be part of Bill Clayton's life, as he maintained his 26 agricultural operations in Springlake and mentored his son, Tommy, 27 in the management of the business; like many other residents of the

farming community he called home, he was known for his calmness and common sense, and in bringing these qualities to the highest levels of state government, Bill W. Clayton established an admirable record of service that strongly influenced younger public servants and has had a lasting impact on the State of Texas; now, therefore, be it

7 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 80th Texas 8 Legislature hereby pay tribute to the life of Bill Clayton and 9 extend deepest condolences to the members of his family: to his 10 wife, Delma Clayton; to his children, Tommy Clayton and Brenda 11 Herrell; to his sister, Ann Kelley; to his brother, Donnie Clayton; 12 to his five grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren; and to his 13 other relatives and many friends; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That an official copy of this resolution be prepared for his family and that when the Texas House of Representatives adjourns this day, it do so in memory of Bill Clayton.
