RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, February 5-9, 2007, is being celebrated as Texas 2 Technology Week in order to create public awareness of the 3 extraordinary achievements of these industries and the vital role 4 they play in the prosperity of the Lone Star State; and

5 WHEREAS, Sponsoring Texas Technology Week are the AeA Texas 6 Council, the Texas Healthcare and Bioscience Institute, the 7 Metroplex Technology Business Council, and TechNet Texas; and

8 WHEREAS, The state's technology and life-sciences industries 9 and research institutions are revolutionizing the world we live in, 10 achieving leading-edge advances in medicine, space exploration, 11 computing, communications, energy, and transportation; these 12 industries employ more Texans than the oil, natural gas, and 13 agriculture industries combined, and their high-wage, high-skill 14 jobs contribute to a diverse and growing economy; and

WHEREAS, People around the globe have benefited immeasurably 15 from the medical treatments and devices developed by 16 Texas companies; the Texas Healthcare and Bioscience Institute, whose 17 18 membership includes universities and private research institutions, as well as biotechnology, medical device, and 19 pharmaceutical companies, acknowledges that between 2000 and 2004, 20 21 approximately 2,700 Texas biotechnology patents were issued and 22 that the state's biotechnology-related patent growth is outpacing 23 the national average; and

24 WHEREAS, The life-sciences industry constitutes a

significant pillar of the Texas economy; including approximately
3,000 establishments employing more than 75,000 Texans, with the
promise of continued job growth for many years to come; and

4 WHEREAS, AeA, the nation's largest high-tech trade group, 5 reports that Texas ranks second in the country in high-tech 6 employment, with some 436,000 jobs and with 57 of every 1,000 private sector workers in our state employed by high-tech firms; 7 8 moreover, Texas ranks 12th among all the states in terms of its high-tech average wage, a wage that is nearly double that of the 9 average private sector worker, allowing the industry to provide an 10 aggregate high-tech payroll of \$31.5 billion; the importance of 11 this industry to Texans is further underscored by the fact that 12 high-tech products account for 26 percent of the 13 state's 14 international exports; and

15 WHEREAS, All sectors of the high-technology and life-sciences community are joining together this week to discuss 16 17 the major issues facing their industries and to affirm their support for a strong system of public and higher education, a 18 critical factor in providing the highly skilled workforce on which 19 these industries depend; and 20

21 WHEREAS, The technology and life-sciences industry have 22 become a tremendous engine of economic growth in the State of Texas, 23 and the benefits of their research and production enrich people the 24 world over; now, therefore, be it

25 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 80th Texas
26 Legislature hereby recognize February 5-9, 2007, as Texas
27 Technology Week and commend its sponsors for their outstanding
