property submits to the chief appraiser evidence that the property

is owned by an organization that meets the requirements of

Subsections (b)(1), (2), and (4). If the owner of the property

submits the evidence required by this subsection, the exemption

24 continues to apply to the property for the remainder of the current

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- 1 tax year and for subsequent tax years until the owner ceases to
- 2 qualify the property for the exemption. This subsection does not
- 3 prohibit the chief appraiser from requiring the owner to file a new

- 6 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
