S.B. No. 960

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to the administration of exit-level state assessment
3 instruments to transfer students who are dependents of military
4 personnel.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

6 SECTION 1. Section 39.025, Education Code, is amended by
7 adding Subsections (f) and (g) to read as follows:

8 (f) Notwithstanding any other provision of this section,
9 the commissioner shall allow a student who is the dependent of a
10 person serving in the military to satisfy the requirements of
11 Subsection (a) and qualify for a high school diploma through
12 satisfactory performance on one or more alternative nationally
13 recognized norm-referenced assessment instruments if the student,
14 as a result of a military transfer or deployment of the person
15 serving in the military, transfers into the public school system of
16 this state after completion of the student's sophomore year in high
17 school.

18 (g) For purposes of Subsection (f), the commissioner, in
19 order to ensure that a student described by that subsection may
20 satisfy the requirements of Subsection (a) solely through
21 performance on one or more alternative assessment instruments,
22 shall establish required performance levels for the alternative
23 assessment instrument or instruments that correspond to the
24 performance levels otherwise required under Subsection (a) on the

1 secondary exit-level assessment instruments for English language
2 arts, mathematics, social studies, and science.

3 SECTION 2. Section 39.025, Education Code, as amended by
4 this Act, applies beginning with students enrolled in public high
5 schools in this state as juniors or seniors during the 2006-2007
6 school year.

7 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
8 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
9 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
10 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
11 Act takes effect September 1, 2007.
