	A BILL TO BE ENTITLED
1	AN ACT
2	relating to the administration of the work-study student mentorship
3	program by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Section 56.079, Education Code, is amended to
6	read as follows:
7	Sec. 56.079. WORK-STUDY STUDENT MENTORSHIP PROGRAM.
8	(a) In this section:
9	(1) "Coordinating board" means the Texas Higher
10	Education Coordinating Board.
11	(2) "Eligible institution" means:
12	(A) an institution of higher education; or
13	(B) a private or independent institution of
14	higher education, as defined by Section 61.003(15), other than a
15	private or independent institution of higher education offering
16	only professional or graduate degrees.
17	(3) "Participating entity" means an eligible
18	institution, a school district, or a nonprofit organization that
19	has filed a memorandum of understanding with the coordinating board
20	under this section to participate in the work-study student
21	mentorship program established under this section [, "general
22	academic teaching institution" has the meaning assigned by Section
23	61.003].
24	(b) In accordance with this section and coordinating board

1	rules, the coordinating board shall administer a work-study student
2	mentorship program under which students who are enrolled in their
3	junior or senior years at participating eligible institutions and
4	who meet the eligibility requirements for employment in the Texas
5	college work-study program under Section 56.075 may be employed by
6	participating entities under the Texas college work-study program
7	<u>to:</u>
8	(1) mentor students on academic probation at
9	participating eligible institutions or high school students in
10	participating school districts; or
11	(2) counsel high school students at GO Centers or
12	similar high school-based recruiting centers designed to improve
13	student access to higher education.
14	(c) To participate in the work-study student mentorship
15	program, an eligible institution and one or more school districts
16	or nonprofit organizations interested in jointly participating in
17	the program shall file with the coordinating board a joint
18	memorandum of understanding detailing the roles and
19	responsibilities of the participating entities.
20	(d) The coordinating board, in consultation with eligible
21	institutions, school districts, and nonprofit organizations that
22	express interest in participating in the work-study student
23	mentorship program, shall develop a standard contract establishing
24	the roles and responsibilities of participating entities to be used
25	as a model for a memorandum of understanding entered into by
26	participating entities under Subsection (c).
27	(e) The coordinating board:

1 <u>(1) shall establish criteria to ensure that the</u> 2 participating eligible institution's contribution toward the wages 3 and benefits of a student employed as a mentor under the work-study 4 student mentorship program is matched by funds provided by the 5 participating entity benefiting from the services of the employed 6 student in an amount that is at least equal to the amount of the 7 participating eligible institution's contribution;

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8 (2) may accept appropriate in-kind contributions from 9 participating nonprofit organizations to satisfy the matching 10 funds requirement of this subsection; and

11 (3) may waive the matching funds requirement of this 12 subsection for a participating entity that meets criteria 13 established by the coordinating board for a waiver.

14 (f) The coordinating board shall partner with participating 15 nonprofit organizations to establish additional GO Centers or 16 similar high school-based recruiting centers designed to improve 17 student access to higher education in this state [A general academic teaching institution may establish a work-study student 18 mentorship program under which students who are enrolled in their 19 junior or senior year at the institution and who meet 20 eligibility requirements for employment in the Texas college 21 work-study program under Section 56.075 may be employed by the 22 institution under the Texas college work-study program to mentor 23 24 students who are on academic probation at the institution].

25 (g) The coordinating board shall ensure that each student
 26 employed under the work-study student mentorship program:

27 (1) receives appropriate training and supervision;

1 and

2 (2) is paid at least at the minimum wage required by 3 <u>law.</u>

4 (h) The coordinating board may accept gifts, grants, and
5 donations from any public or private source for the purposes of this
6 section.

7 <u>(i) An eligible</u> [(c) A general academic teaching] 8 institution <u>participating in the</u> [that has established a] 9 work-study student mentorship program under this section may 10 require students who are on academic probation at the institution 11 to be matched with a student mentor employed under the program.

12 (j) [(d)] Not later than November 1 of each year, each 13 eligible [general academic teaching] institution participating in 14 the [that has established a] work-study student mentorship program 15 [under this section] shall submit to the coordinating board [Texas 16 Higher Education Coordinating Board] a report regarding the 17 progress resulting from [of] the institution's participation in the 18 program. The report must include:

19 <u>(1)</u> the number of students <u>of the institution</u> employed 20 [by the institution] as mentors under the program in the preceding 21 academic year<u>;</u>

22 (2) the number of students of the institution 23 receiving mentoring under the program in the preceding academic 24 year; 25 (3) the number of high school students receiving

25 (3) the number of high school students receiving 26 mentoring or counseling from students of the institution under the 27 program in the preceding academic year;

1	(4) [and] information relating to the costs of the
2	program <u>; and</u>
3	(5) information in the form prescribed by the
4	<u>coordinating board regarding the following indicators of</u> [and] the
5	academic progress of the students <u>of the institution employed as</u>
6	mentors under the program, students of the institution receiving
7	mentoring under the program, and the high school students receiving
8	mentoring or counseling from students of the institution under the
9	program:
10	(A) changes in grade point averages;
11	(B) changes in graduation rates;
12	(C) changes in the percentage of high school
13	students who enroll in higher education; and
14	(D) effects on higher education readiness and
15	preparation [in that year].
16	<u>(k)</u> [(e)] Each <u>eligible</u> [general academic teaching]
17	institution <u>participating in the</u> [that has established a]
18	work-study student mentorship program under this section shall set
19	aside a portion of the institution's Texas college work-study
20	program funds to pay for the state's contribution toward the costs
21	of the program.
22	<u>(1)</u> [(f)] Notwithstanding Section 56.076, <u>a participating</u>
23	<u>entity</u> [a general academic teaching institution] that employs a
24	student mentor under the work-study student mentorship program
25	shall provide from sources other than federal college work-study
26	funds:
27	(1) not less than 10 percent of the employed student's

1 wages; and

2 (2) 100 percent of other employee benefits for the3 employed student.

4 SECTION 2. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board 5 shall adopt rules relating to the administration of the work-study 6 student mentorship program under Section 56.079, Education Code, as 7 amended by this Act, as soon as practicable after the effective date 8 of this Act.

9 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 10 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 11 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 12 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 13 Act takes effect September 1, 2007.
