- 5 (2) credit toward payment of tuition and mandatory
- 6 fees for a subsequent semester or other academic term at the
- 7 <u>institution or unit.</u>
- 8 (c) Separate withdrawal refund schedules may be established
- 9 for optional fees [such as intercollegiate athletics, cultural
- 10 entertainment, parking, and yearbooks].
- 11 (e) A general academic teaching institution or medical and
- 12 dental unit <u>may</u> [shall] terminate <u>a student's</u> student services and
- 13 privileges, including [such as] health services, library
- 14 privileges, facilities and technology usage, and athletic and
- cultural entertainment tickets, when the [a] student withdraws from
- 16 the institution.
- SECTION 3. Subsection (g), Section 54.006, Education Code,
- 18 is repealed.
- 19 SECTION 4. The change in law made by this Act applies to
- 20 tuition and mandatory fees charged beginning with the fall 2007
- 21 semester.
- 22 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 23 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 24 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 25 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 26 Act takes effect September 1, 2007.
