H.B. No. 3184

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to educating parents about the benefits of immunizing
3 certain children against influenza.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Section 161.0101, Health and Safety Code, is
6 amended by adding Subsection (c) to read as follows:

7 (c) The department shall work to increase immunization
8 awareness and participation among parents of children in child-care
9 facilities, as defined by Section 42.002, Human Resources Code, in
10 the state's early childhood vaccination program by publishing on
11 the department's website information about the benefits of annual
12 immunization against influenza for children aged six months to five
13 years. The department shall work with the Department of Family and
14 Protective Services and with child-care facilities to ensure that
15 the information is annually distributed to parents in August or
16 September.

17 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
18 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
19 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
20 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
21 Act takes effect September 1, 2007.

17 SECTION 2. Subchapter E, Chapter 431, Health and Safety
18 Code, is amended by adding Section 431.117 to read as follows:

19 Sec. 431.117. PRIORITY FOR HEALTH CARE PROVIDERS IN
20 DISTRIBUTION OF INFLUENZA VACCINE. The executive commissioner of
21 the Health and Human Services Commission shall study the wholesale
22 distribution of influenza vaccine in this state to determine the
23 feasibility of implementing a system that requires giving a
24 priority in filling orders for influenza vaccine to physicians and

1 other licensed health care providers authorized to administer
2 influenza vaccine over retail establishments. The executive
3 commissioner may implement such a system if it is determined to be
4 feasible.

5 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
6 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
7 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
8 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
9 Act takes effect September 1, 2007.

The bill requires the Health and Human Services Commission (HHSC) to study the wholesale distribution of influenza vaccine. It is assumed that any cost from the study could be reasonably absorbed within available resources.

IN RE: **HB3184** by Coleman (Relating to the education of parents of young children about the benefits of vaccination against influenza.), **As Introduced**

No significant fiscal implication to the State is anticipated.

The bill requires the Department of State Health Services (DSHS) to publish information on its website to educate parents of children in day-care facilities about the benefits of annual vaccination against influenza for children six to 59 months of age. DSHS is directed to work with the Department of Human Services and day-care facilities to ensure information is distributed to parents in August and September of each year. It is assumed that DSHS will instead work with the Department of Family and Protective Services (DFPS), the agency responsible for licensing and regulation of child care facilities. Both DSHS and DFPS indicate any costs associated with publishing and distributing information can be absorbed within available resources.
