- 12 county by order may:
- 13 (1) abate and remove a nuisance and punish by fine the 14 person responsible for the nuisance;
- 15 (2) define and declare what constitutes a nuisance and authorize and direct the summary abatement of the nuisance; and 16
- 17 (3) abate in any manner the commissioners court considers expedient any nuisance that may injure or affect the 18 public health or comfort. 19
- Sec. 236.003. MUNICIPAL ORDINANCE PREVAILS OVER COUNTY 20
- 21 ORDER. If an order adopted by a commissioners court under this
- chapter conflicts with an ordinance of a municipality, the 22
- 23 municipal ordinance prevails within the municipality's
- 24 jurisdiction to the extent of the conflict.

- 1 Sec. 236.004. CONFLICT WITH OTHER LAWS. This chapter may
- 2 not be construed to interfere with a right guaranteed by the Second
- 3 Amendment to the United States Constitution.
- 4 Sec. 236.005. CUMULATIVE EFFECT. Authority under this
- 5 chapter is cumulative of other authority that a county has to
- 6 regulate nuisances and does not limit that other authority.
- 7 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 8 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 9 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 10 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 11 Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
