A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

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	AN ACT

- 2 relating to emergency management.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 4 SECTION 1. Sections 418.005(a) and (b), Government Code,
- 5 are amended to read as follows:
- 6 (a) This section applies only to an elected or appointed
- 7 public officer of the state or of a political subdivision who has
- 8 management or supervisory responsibilities and:
- 9 (1) whose position description, job duties, or
- 10 assignment includes emergency management responsibilities; or
- 11 (2) who plays a role in emergency preparedness,
- 12 response, or recovery.
- 13 (b) Each person described by Subsection (a) shall complete a
- 14 course of training provided or approved by the division of not less
- 15 than three hours regarding the responsibilities of state and local
- 16 governments under this chapter not later than the 180th day after
- 17 the date the person:
- 18 (1) takes the oath of office, if the person is required
- 19 to take an oath of office to assume the person's duties as \underline{a} [an
- 20 appointed] public officer; or
- 21 (2) otherwise assumes responsibilities as \underline{a} [$\frac{an}{a}$]
- 22 appointed] public officer, if the person is not required to take an
- 23 oath of office to assume the person's duties.
- SECTION 2. Section 418.013, Government Code, is amended by

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- 1 amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (d) to read as
- 2 follows:
- 3 (b) The emergency management council is composed of
- 4 representatives [the heads] of state agencies, boards, [and]
- 5 commissions, and [representatives of] organized volunteer groups
- 6 designated by the head of each entity.
- 7 (d) The council shall assist the division in identifying,
- 8 mobilizing, and deploying state resources to respond to major
- 9 emergencies and disasters throughout the state.
- SECTION 3. Section 418.042(a), Government Code, is amended
- 11 to read as follows:
- 12 (a) The division shall prepare and keep current a
- 13 comprehensive state emergency management plan. The plan may
- 14 include:
- 15 (1) provisions for prevention and minimization of
- 16 injury and damage caused by disaster;
- 17 (2) provisions for prompt and effective response to
- 18 disaster;
- 19 (3) provisions for emergency relief;
- 20 (4) provisions for energy emergencies;
- 21 (5) identification of areas particularly vulnerable
- 22 to disasters;
- 23 (6) recommendations for zoning, building
- 24 restrictions, and other land-use controls, safety measures for
- 25 securing mobile homes or other nonpermanent or semipermanent
- 26 structures, and other preventive and preparedness measures
- 27 designed to eliminate or reduce disasters or their impact;

- 1 (7) provisions for assistance to local officials in
- 2 designing local emergency management plans;
- 3 (8) authorization and procedures for the erection or
- 4 other construction of temporary works designed to protect against
- 5 or mitigate danger, damage, or loss from flood, fire, or other
- 6 disaster;
- 7 (9) preparation and distribution to the appropriate
- 8 state and local officials of state catalogs of federal, state, and
- 9 private assistance programs;
- 10 (10) organization of manpower and channels of
- 11 assistance;
- 12 (11) coordination of federal, state, and local
- 13 emergency management activities;
- 14 (12) coordination of the state emergency management
- 15 plan with the emergency management plans of the federal government;
- 16 (13) coordination of federal and state energy
- 17 emergency plans; and
- 18 (14) [provisions for education and training of local
- 19 officials on activation of the Emergency Alert System established
- 20 under 47 C.F.R. Part 11; and
- 21 $\left[\frac{(15)}{}\right]$ other necessary matters relating to disasters.
- SECTION 4. Section 418.045, Government Code, is amended to
- 23 read as follows:
- Sec. 418.045. TEMPORARY PERSONNEL. (a) The division may
- 25 employ or contract with temporary personnel from funds appropriated
- 26 to the division, from federal funds, or from the disaster
- 27 contingency fund. The merit system does not apply to the temporary

- 1 or contract positions.
- 2 (b) The division may enroll, organize, train, and equip a
- 3 cadre of disaster reservists with specialized skills in disaster
- 4 recovery, hazard mitigation, community outreach, and public
- 5 information to temporarily augment its permanent staff. The
- 6 division may activate enrolled disaster reservists to support
- 7 recovery operations in the aftermath of a disaster or major
- 8 emergency and pay them at a daily rate commensurate with their
- 9 qualifications and experience. Chapter 654, Chapter 2254, and
- 10 Subtitle D, Title 10, do not apply in relation to a disaster
- 11 reservist under this subsection.
- 12 SECTION 5. Section 418.048, Government Code, is amended to
- 13 read as follows:
- 14 Sec. 418.048. MONITORING WEATHER (+ SUSPENSION OF WEATHER
- 15 MODIFICATION]. [(a)] The division shall keep continuously
- 16 apprised of weather conditions that present danger of climatic
- 17 activity, such as precipitation, severe enough to constitute a
- 18 disaster.
- 19 [(b) If the division determines that precipitation that may
- 20 result from weather modification operations, either by itself or in
- 21 conjunction with other precipitation or climatic conditions or
- 22 activity, would create or contribute to the severity of a disaster,
- 23 it shall request in the name of the governor that the officer or
- 24 agency empowered to issue permits for weather modification
- 25 operations suspend the issuance of permits. On the governor's
- 26 request, no permits may be issued until the division informs the
- 27 officer or agency that the danger has passed.

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- 1 SECTION 6. Section 418.1015, Government Code, is amended by
- 2 adding Subsection (d) to read as follows:
- 3 (d) An emergency management director exercising under
- 4 Subsection (b) a power granted to the governor may not seize or use
- 5 state or federal resources without prior authorization from the
- 6 state or federal agency having responsibility for those resources.
- 7 SECTION 7. Section 418.107(b), Government Code, is amended
- 8 to read as follows:
- 9 (b) Political subdivisions may make agreements for the
- 10 purpose of organizing emergency management service divisions and
- 11 provide for a mutual method of financing the organization of units
- 12 on a basis satisfactory to the subdivisions. [The functioning of
- 13 the units shall be coordinated by the emergency management
- 14 council.
- SECTION 8. Section 418.108(d), Government Code, is amended
- 16 to read as follows:
- 17 (d) A declaration of local disaster activates the
- 18 appropriate recovery and rehabilitation aspects of all applicable
- 19 local or interjurisdictional emergency management plans and
- 20 authorizes the furnishing of aid and assistance under the
- 21 declaration. The appropriate preparedness and response aspects of
- 22 the plans are activated as provided in the plans and take effect
- 23 immediately after the local state of disaster is declared.
- SECTION 9. Section 418.117, Government Code, is amended to
- 25 read as follows:
- Sec. 418.117. LICENSE PORTABILITY. If the assistance of a
- 27 person who holds a license, certificate, permit, or other document

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- 1 evidencing qualification in a professional, mechanical, or other
- 2 skill is requested by a state agency or local government entity
- 3 under the system, the person is considered licensed, certified,
- 4 permitted, or otherwise documented in the political subdivision in
- 5 which the service is provided as long as the service is required,
- 6 subject to any limitations imposed by the chief executive officer
- 7 or the governing body of the requesting state agency or local
- 8 government entity.
- 9 SECTION 10. Section 418.172(b), Government Code, is amended
- 10 to read as follows:
- 11 (b) If sufficient funds are not available for the required
- 12 insurance, an agency may request funding from [petition] the
- 13 disaster contingency fund [emergency funding board] to purchase the
- 14 insurance [on the agency's behalf. The board may spend money from
- 15 that fund for that purpose].
- SECTION 11. Section 771.051(a), Health and Safety Code, is
- 17 amended to read as follows:
- 18 (a) The commission is the state's authority on emergency
- 19 communications. The commission shall:
- 20 (1) administer the implementation of statewide 9-1-1
- 21 service and the telecommunications requirements for poison control
- 22 centers under Chapter 777;
- 23 (2) develop minimum performance standards for
- 24 equipment and operation of 9-1-1 service to be followed in
- 25 developing regional plans under Section 771.055, including
- 26 requirements that the plans provide for:
- 27 (A) automatic number identification by which the

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- 1 telephone number of the caller is automatically identified at the
- 2 public safety answering point receiving the call; and
- 3 (B) other features the commission considers
- 4 appropriate;
- 5 (3) examine and approve or disapprove regional plans
- 6 as provided by Section 771.056;
- 7 (4) recommend minimum training standards, assist in
- 8 training, and provide assistance in the establishment and operation
- 9 of 9-1-1 service;
- 10 (5) allocate money to prepare and operate regional
- 11 plans as provided by Section 771.056;
- 12 (6) develop and provide public education materials and
- 13 training;
- 14 (7) plan, implement, operate, and maintain poison
- 15 control center databases and assist in planning, supporting, and
- 16 facilitating 9-1-1 databases, as needed;
- 17 (8) provide grants or contracts for services that
- 18 enhance the effectiveness of 9-1-1 service;
- 19 (9) coordinate emergency communications services and
- 20 providers;
- 21 (10) make reasonable efforts to gain voluntary
- 22 cooperation in the commission's activities of emergency
- 23 communications authorities and providers outside the commission's
- 24 jurisdiction, including:
- 25 (A) making joint communications to state and
- 26 federal regulators; and
- 27 (B) arranging cooperative purchases of equipment

- 1 or services; [and]
- 2 (11) provide education for local officials on the
- 3 operation of the Emergency Alert System, including how to:
- 4 (A) access the system to issue warnings to the
- 5 public; and
- 6 (B) provide information about emergency
- 7 situations to the public; and
- 8 (12) accept, receive, and deposit in its account in
- 9 the general revenue fund gifts, grants, and royalties from public
- 10 and private entities. Gifts, grants, and royalties may be used for
- 11 the purposes of the commission.
- 12 SECTION 12. On the effective date of this Act, the disaster
- 13 emergency funding board is abolished.
- 14 SECTION 13. Section 418.072, Government Code, is repealed.
- 15 SECTION 14. The changes in law made by this Act by the
- 16 amendment of Section 418.005, Government Code, apply only to a
- 17 public officer elected or appointed on or after the effective date
- 18 of this Act. A public officer elected or appointed before the
- 19 effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect
- 20 immediately before that date, and the former law is continued in
- 21 effect for that purpose.
- 22 SECTION 15. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
