4	SECTION 1. Subtitle C, Title 5, Business & Commerce Code, as
5	effective April 1, 2009, is amended by adding Chapter 107 to read as
6	follows:
7	CHAPTER 107. COMPUTER DATA ANALYSIS
8	Sec. 107.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
9	(1) "Computer data recovery specialist" means a person
10	who offers the service of recovering data, for non-evidentiary
11	purposes, from a digital form of media storage that is not
12	accessible by the person requesting the service.
13	(2) "Computer forensic analyst" means a person who
14	acquires, reviews, takes images of, or analyzes digital or
15	computer-based information for the purpose of obtaining or
16	furnishing the information for evidentiary purposes in an actual or
17	potential civil or criminal proceeding.
18	(3) "Computer technician" means a person who repairs
19	or services computers, including the repair of software.
20	Sec. 107.002. STATEMENT OF OWNERSHIP REQUIRED. (a) A
21	computer data recovery specialist, computer forensic analyst, or
22	computer technician may not, in the course and scope of employment

or for a fee, analyze or recover data contained in a computer

- 1 (1) the specialist, analyst, or technician, or the
- 2 employer of the specialist, analyst, or technician, has obtained a
- 3 dated work order that includes a signed statement from the person
- 4 requesting the service that states that the facts contained in the
- 5 work order form are true and correct and that the person:
- 6 (A) owns or has the right of possession to the
- 7 computer; or
- 8 (B) represents the owner as an authorized agent
- 9 <u>or attorney; or</u>
- 10 (2) the data analysis is authorized by a court or a law
- 11 enforcement agency.
- 12 (b) This section does not apply to a computer owned by the
- 13 employer of the computer forensic analyst or computer technician.
- 14 Sec. 107.003. MAINTENANCE AND INSPECTION OF STATEMENTS.
- 15 <u>(a) A computer data recovery specialist, computer forensic</u>
- 16 <u>analyst</u>, computer technician, or employer who obtains a statement
- 17 required under Section 107.002 shall maintain the statement for a
- 18 period of not less than one year.
- 19 (b) The computer data recovery specialist, computer
- 20 forensic analyst, computer technician, or employer shall make the
- 21 <u>statement available for inspection on request by a law enforcement</u>
- 22 agency under a court-ordered subpoena or search warrant.
- Sec. 107.004. VIOLATION. (a) A person commits an offense
- 24 if the person violates Section 107.003. An offense under this
- 25 subsection is a Class C misdemeanor.
- 26 (b) A person commits an offense if the person provides a
- 27 materially false statement in a signed work order statement

- 1 required by Section 107.002. An offense under this subsection is a
- 2 Class A misdemeanor.
- 3 SECTION 2. Section 1702.104, Occupations Code, is amended
- 4 by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsections (c) and (d) to
- 5 read as follows:
- 6 (b) Except as provided by Subsection (c) or (d), for [For]
- 7 purposes of Subsection (a)(1), obtaining or furnishing information
- 8 includes information obtained or furnished through the review and
- 9 analysis of, and the investigation into the content of,
- 10 computer-based data not available to the public.
- 11 (c) "Obtaining or furnishing information" does not include
- 12 <u>obtaining or furnishing computer-based data by a computer forensic</u>
- 13 analyst, as defined by Section 107.001, Business & Commerce Code,
- 14 which does not constitute an investigation for purposes of this
- 15 <u>section and does not require licensing under this chapter.</u>
- 16 (d) The repair or maintenance of a computer does not
- 17 constitute an investigation for purposes of this section and does
- 18 not require licensing under this chapter if the person performing
- 19 the repair or maintenance:
- 20 (1) is installing or repairing computer equipment or
- 21 diagnosing a computer or software problem; and
- 22 (2) is not furnishing information or securing evidence
- 23 <u>described by Subsection (a)(1) or (2).</u>
- SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
