H.B. No. 2660

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to regulation of the practice of therapeutic optometry. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. Section 351.002(8), Occupations Code, is amended 5 to read as follows: 6 (8) "Surgery" means a procedure using instruments, 7 including lasers $\underline{or}[\tau]$ scalpels, $[\overline{or needles_{\tau}}]$ in which human tissue is cut, burned, or vaporized[, or otherwise altered] by any 8 9 mechanical means, laser, or ionizing radiation. The term includes procedures using instruments that require closing by suturing, 10 11 clamping, or another device. The term does not include a 12 [noninvasive] procedure described by Section 351.368 [to remove a superficial foreign body in the conjunctiva, eyelid, or corneal 13 epithelium that has not perforated the Bowman's membrane]. 14 SECTION 2. Subchapter H, Chapter 351, Occupations Code, is 15 16 amended by adding Sections 351.367 and 351.368 to read as follows: Sec. 351.367. SCOPE OF PRACTICE OF THERAPEUTIC OPTOMETRIST. 17 (a) A therapeutic optometrist may diagnose and treat any disease, 18 condition or disorder of the eye, adnexa, or visual system by any 19 appropriate means other than surgery. 20 21 (b) A therapeutic optometrist may administer or prescribe any medication using any means of administration that is reasonably 22 23 related to the diagnosis or treatment of the eye, adnexa, or visual system. A therapeutic optometrist may not prescribe a controlled 24

3	Act of 1970 (21 U.S.C. Section 801 et seq.).
4	(c) In addition to the professional designations listed in
5	Section 104.003, a therapeutic optometrist may use the professional
6	designation "optometric glaucoma specialist" or "optometric
7	physician."
8	Sec. 351.368. AUTHORIZED PROCEDURES PERFORMED BY
9	THERAPEUTIC OPTOMETRIST. A therapeutic optometrist may:
10	(1) perform a noninvasive procedure to remove a
11	superficial foreign body in the conjunctiva, eyelid, or corneal
12	epithelium that has not perforated the Bowman's membrane;
13	(2) use tissue glue to close a wound;
14	(3) perform cultures or smears for diagnosis;
15	(4) pull eyelashes or remove irregular eyelashes with
16	<u>electrolysis;</u>
17	(5) dilate, irrigate, or probe the lacrimal passages;
18	(6) place punctal plugs;
19	(7) administer medication by injection;
20	(8) remove loose epithelium to promote healing;
21	(9) drain an abscess or cyst;
22	(10) remove small bumps from the eyelid;
23	(11) close the puncta by cautery; and
24	(12) perform any glaucoma treatment procedure,
25	including glaucoma treatment procedures using lasers, other than
26	intraocular surgery by blade.
27	SECTION 3. The following laws are repealed:

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1 (1) Section 351.160, Occupations Code; 2 (2) Section 351.165, Occupations Code; 3 Section 351.358, Occupations Code; and (3) 4 (4) Section 351.3581, Occupations Code. SECTION 4. Chapter 351, Occupations Code, as amended by 5 6 this Act, may not be construed as preventing a therapeutic optometrist from performing a procedure or administering or 7 prescribing any medication that could legally be performed, 8 administered, or prescribed by a therapeutic optometrist 9 immediately before the passage of this Act. 10

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SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

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
