1	AN ACT
2	relating to the establishment of the Transportation Legislative
3	Oversight Committee.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subtitle A, Title 6, Transportation Code, is
6	amended by adding Chapter 205 to read as follows:
7	CHAPTER 205. TRANSPORTATION LEGISLATIVE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE
8	Sec. 205.001. DEFINITION. In this chapter, "committee"
9	means the Transportation Legislative Oversight Committee.
10	Sec. 205.002. ESTABLISHMENT; COMPOSITION. (a) The
11	Transportation Legislative Oversight Committee is established to
12	provide objective research, analysis, and recommendations on the
13	operation and needs of the state transportation system.
14	(b) The committee is composed of six members as follows:
15	(1) the chair of the Senate Committee on
16	Transportation and Homeland Security;
17	(2) the chair of the House Committee on
18	Transportation;
19	(3) two members of the senate appointed by the
20	lieutenant governor; and
21	(4) two members of the house of representatives
22	appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives.
23	(c) An appointed member of the committee serves at the
24	pleasure of the appointing official.

H.B. No. 3395 Sec. 205.003. PRESIDING OFFICER; TERM. (a) The lieutenant 1 2 governor and the speaker of the house of representatives shall appoint the presiding officer of the committee on an alternating 3 4 basis. 5 (b) The presiding officer of the committee serves a two-year term that expires February 1 of each odd-numbered year. 6 7 Sec. 205.004. POWERS AND DUTIES. (a) The committee shall: 8 (1) monitor the department's planning, programming, and funding of the state transportation system; 9 10 (2) conduct an in-depth analysis of the state transportation system that includes: 11 (A) an assessment of the cost-effectiveness of 12 the use of state, local, and private funds in the transportation 13 14 system; 15 (B) an identification of critical problems in the 16 transportation system, such as funding constraints; and 17 (C) a determination of the long-range needs of the transportation system; 18 19 (3) recommend to the legislature: (A) strategies to solve the problems identified 20 under Subdivision (2)(B); and 21 22 (B) policy priorities to address the long-range needs determined under Subdivision (2)(C); and 23 24 (4) advise and assist the legislature in developing plans, programs, and proposed legislation to improve the 25 26 effectiveness of the state transportation system. (b) The committee has all other powers and duties provided 27

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1	to a special committee by:
2	(1) Subchapter B, Chapter 301, Government Code;
3	(2) the rules of the senate and the house of
4	representatives; and
5	(3) policies of the senate and house committees on
6	administration.
7	Sec. 205.005. REVIEW OF RESEARCH PROGRAM. (a) The
8	department shall present the department's entire research program
9	to the committee for review and comment before adopting or
10	implementing the program.
11	(b) The committee shall review and comment on the
12	department's research program, including each of the individual
13	research projects and activities. The review of a proposed research
14	project must include an evaluation of the purpose of the project,
15	the proposed start and ending dates for the project, and the cost of
16	the project.
17	(c) The department shall provide to the committee quarterly
18	updates and an annual summary on the progress of the department's
19	research projects and activities.
20	(d) The committee may request the results of any of the
21	department's research projects, including draft reports from the
22	department or the contracted entities performing the research.
23	(e) A university transportation research program in this
24	state may:
25	(1) perform transportation research projects
26	recommended by the committee; and
27	(2) initiate and propose transportation research

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1 projects to the committee.

2 (f) The committee may request assistance from a university 3 transportation research program in this state in conducting 4 transportation research and in reviewing, evaluating, and 5 comparing elements of the state transportation system to the 6 transportation systems in other states to set needed benchmarks.

Sec. 205.006. CONTRACT WITH CONSULTING FIRM. (a) The committee may contract with an outside management consulting firm that is independent of the department to make recommendations regarding an effective and efficient organizational structure for the department, including recommending appropriate performance measurements and staffing levels for each major function of the department, after review and analysis under Section 205.007.

(b) In performing its functions, the consulting firm shall
coordinate with the Legislative Budget Board, the State Auditor's
Office, and the department to minimize the duplication of efforts
and to perform cost effectively and in a timely manner.

18 (c) The committee shall:

19 (1) oversee the implementation of the recommendations 20 under this section with the goal of making the department more 21 efficient, transparent, and accountable, including through 22 reducing staff and streamlining processes; and

23 (2) assess the department's progress in implementing 24 the recommendations under this section and report on the progress 25 to the Senate Finance Committee and House Appropriations Committee 26 for consideration in establishing the department's budget as part 27 of the appropriations process.

H.B. No. 3395 Sec. 205.007. FUNCTIONS OF CONSULTING FIRM. The primary 1 2 functions of a management consulting firm the committee contracts with under Section 205.006 include: 3 4 (1) evaluating the department's financial condition 5 and business practices; 6 (2) evaluating the department's administrative 7 practices and performance, including statewide transportation 8 planning, the department's relationship with metropolitan planning organizations, as defined by Section 472.031, the performance of 9 the department's district and central offices, and the need for 10 standardization of the department's operations across the state; 11 12 (3) evaluating the current guidelines of metropolitan planning organizations and all other transportation entities 13 14 within the state involved with project delivery or transportation 15 policy by identifying duplicative practices and providing recommendations for better efficiency and transparency; 16 17 (4) identifying ways to streamline all processes and procedures of policy implementations of the department, including 18 19 the environmental process; 20 (5) examining and evaluating the use and benefits of performance-based maintenance contracting by the department; 21 22 (6) examining and presenting recommendations on how to maximize the department's use of multimodal solutions; 23 (7) analyzing the department's compliance 24 with 25 applicable laws and legislative intent; 26 (8) examining the efficient use of the department's 27 available funding, personnel, equipment, and office space;

1 (9) evaluating the establishment in statute of a state pavement quality goal of having 85 percent of state roads in good or 2 3 better condition; and 4 (10) considering significantly expanding the use of 5 the private sector for planning, design, and delivery of projects and a commitment to excellence in project and program management. 6 7 Sec. 205.008. MEETINGS. The committee shall meet at the 8 call of the presiding officer. 9 Sec. 205.009. STAFF; AUTHORITY TO CONTRACT. The committee 10 may hire staff or may contract with universities or other suitable entities to assist the committee in carrying out the committee's 11 12 duties. Funding to support the operation of the committee shall be provided from funds appropriated to the department. 13 Sec. 205.010. REPORT. Not later than January 1 of each 14

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15 <u>odd-numbered year, the committee shall submit to the legislature a</u> 16 <u>report that contains the recommendations described by Section</u> 17 <u>205.004(a)(3).</u>

18 SECTION 2. (a) The speaker of the house of representatives 19 and the lieutenant governor shall appoint members to the 20 Transportation Legislative Oversight Committee under Chapter 205, 21 Transportation Code, as added by this Act, not later than January 1, 22 2010.

(b) Notwithstanding Section 205.003, Transportation Code, as added by this Act, the lieutenant governor, not later than January 15, 2010, shall appoint a presiding officer for the Transportation Legislative Oversight Committee. The presiding officer appointed by the lieutenant governor under this section

H.B. No. 3395 1 serves a one-year term that begins on February 1, 2010, and ends on 2 February 1, 2011.

3 SECTION 3. On the effective date of this Act:

4 (1) all employees of the Texas Department of 5 Transportation who primarily perform duties related to the 6 department's government and public affairs research section become 7 employees of the Transportation Legislative Oversight Committee 8 under Chapter 205, Transportation Code, as added by this Act; and

9 (2) all funds appropriated by the legislature to the 10 Texas Department of Transportation for purposes related to the 11 department's government and public affairs research section are 12 transferred to the Transportation Legislative Oversight Committee 13 under Chapter 205, Transportation Code, as added by this Act.

SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

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
