4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 493, Government Code, is amended by
6	adding Section 493.032 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 493.032. SKILLS DEVELOPMENT ASSESSMENT. (a) The
8	department shall develop an inmate skills development assessment
9	instrument to evaluate the functional capacity of an inmate in the
10	following areas:
11	(1) academic ability, including intellectual
12	functioning, literacy, and language skills;
13	(2) vocational and career development, including
14	employment history, career development, institutional work
15	history, and prospects for post-incarceration employment;
16	(3) establishing and maintaining interpersonal
17	relationships, including the existence of any ongoing contact with
18	family members or other support systems, the ability to fulfill
19	parental responsibilities and duties, and communication skills;
20	(4) wellness maintenance, including health promotion
21	and disease prevention, disease and illness management, and
22	knowledge concerning eligibility for and procedures for obtaining
23	governmental assistance;
24	(5) mental health maintenance, including substance

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1 abuse management, mental illness management, and the ability to 2 identify and manage inappropriate sexual behavior; (6) general behavior, including cognitive behavior, 3 criminal behavior and history, and history of domestic violence or 4 5 other abuse; 6 (7) character, including personal characteristics and 7 personal responsibilities; 8 (8) leisure activities, including the appropriate use of leisure time; and 9 (9) skills needed in daily life, including financial 10 management, the ability to secure and maintain housing, and skills 11 12 needed to care for one's family. (b) The department shall consult with the 13 Texas Correctional Office on Offenders with Medical and Mental 14 15 Impairments, the Department of State Health Services, the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services, and the Texas 16 17 Workforce Commission in developing the inmate skills development assessment instrument under Subsection (a). 18 19 (c) The department shall: (1) not later than the 90th day after the date an 20 inmate is placed in the custody of the department, evaluate the 21 inmate using the inmate skills development assessment instrument 22 developed under Subsection (a); 23 24 (2) use the inmate skills development assessment instrument under Subsection (a) as a guide in deciding the 25 26 rehabilitative services and programs in which to place an inmate; 27 (3) maintain a record for each inmate of the results of

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1 any inmate skills development assessment administered under this
2 section;

3 (4) not later than the 90th day before any release or 4 discharge date applicable to an inmate, reevaluate the inmate using 5 the inmate skills development assessment instrument to prepare a 6 post-incarceration transition plan for the inmate; and

7 (5) as soon as practicable after the reevaluation of an inmate under Subdivision (4) and not later than the 30th day 8 before any release or discharge date applicable to an inmate, 9 provide the results of the reevaluation and the post-incarceration 10 transition plan to any reentry or reintegration office operated by 11 12 the county or municipality into which the inmate will be released or 13 discharged. 14 (d) The department may periodically reevaluate an inmate

15 <u>using the inmate skills development assessment instrument to</u> 16 <u>determine the inmate's progress in skill development and, if</u> 17 <u>necessary, to place the inmate in different rehabilitative services</u>

18 and programs.

19 SECTION 2. The Texas Department of Criminal Justice shall 20 develop the inmate skills development assessment instrument as 21 required by Section 493.032, Government Code, as added by this Act, 22 not later than April 1, 2010.

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SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

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
