1 AN ACT 2 relating to the purchasing and contracting authority of counties; providing penalties. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 5 SECTION 1. Section 262.002, Local Government Code, is amended to read as follows: 6 Sec. 262.002. AUTHORITY TO COOPERATIVELY PURCHASE GOODS 7 [ROAD EQUIPMENT] AND SERVICES [TIRES THROUGH COMPTROLLER]. 8 (a) A 9 county may purchase an item through a cooperative purchasing program that uses a competitive bidding procedure. 10 [The commissioners court of a county may purchase through the 11 12 comptroller road machinery and equipment, tires, and tubes to be 13 used by the county.] 14 (b) A county may purchase an item according to a competitive bidding procedure promulgated by an authorized state agency. 15 [The commission must purchase an item under this section on 16 competitive bids and in accordance with any rules of the 17 18 commission.] (c) A county may purchase an item cooperatively through an 19 interlocal agreement that requires a competitive bidding 20 procedure. [A purchase under this section must be made on the 21 requisition of the commissioners court. When the court sends the 22 23 requisition to the commission, the court must include with the

24 requisition a general description of the item desired and a

1 certification of the funds available to pay for the item.]

2 (d) <u>A cooperative purchase under this section does not</u>
3 <u>violate competitive bidding statutes.</u> [The commission may adopt
4 <u>rules to carry out the purpose of this section.</u>]

5 SECTION 2. Section 262.003, Local Government Code, is 6 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 262.003. SMALL, SOLE-SOURCE PURCHASE EXEMPT FROM COMPETITIVE BIDDING. [(a) Any law that requires a county to follow a competitive bidding procedure in making a purchase requiring the expenditure of \$25,000 or less does not apply to the purchase of an item available for purchase from only one supplier.

[(b)] If a county makes a <u>sole-source</u> purchase <u>as described</u> by Section 262.024(a)(7) [covered by Subsection (a)], the county auditor or other appropriate county officer or employee may not refuse payment for the purchase because a competitive bidding procedure was not followed.

17 SECTION 3. Section 262.011, Local Government Code, is 18 amended by amending Subsections (f), (g), (k), (m), and (o) and 19 adding Subsection (q) to read as follows:

(f) A purchase made by the county purchasing agent shall be paid for by <u>an electronic transfer, check, or</u> [-] warrant drawn by the county auditor on funds in the county treasury in the manner provided by law. The county auditor may not draw and the county treasurer may not honor <u>an electronic transfer, check, or</u> [-]warrant for a purchase unless the purchase is made by the county purchasing agent or on competitive bid as provided by law.

27 (g) The county purchasing agent may cooperate with the

1 purchasing agent of a municipality in the county to purchase any 2 item in volume as may be necessary. The county treasurer shall 3 honor <u>an electronic transfer, check, or</u> [a] warrant drawn by the 4 county auditor to reimburse the municipality's purchasing agent 5 making the purchase for the county.

6 (k) The board that appoints the county purchasing agent 7 shall set the salary of the agent in an amount not less than \$5,000 a 8 year, payable in equal monthly installments or by any other 9 distribution at the option of the county. The salary shall be paid 10 by <u>an electronic transfer, check, or warrant</u> [warrants] drawn on 11 funds in the county treasury.

A person, including an officer, agent, or employee of a 12 (m) county or of a subdivision or department of a county, commits an 13 14 offense if the person violates this section. An offense under this subsection is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than 15 \$10 or more than \$100[, by confinement in the county jail for not 16 17 less than 30 days or more than one year, or by both the fine and confinement]. Each act in violation of this section is a separate 18 offense. 19

The county purchasing agent shall adopt the rules and 20 (0) procedures necessary to implement the agent's duties under this 21 section subject to approval by the commissioners 22 court. 23 Notwithstanding Subsection (f) or other law, rules and procedures 24 adopted under this subsection may include rules and procedures for persons to use county purchasing cards to pay for county purchases 25 26 under the direction and supervision of the county purchasing agent. Procedures for use of purchasing cards may not avoid the 27

1 competitive bidding requirements of this chapter or other 2 requirements of county financial law.

3 (q) An electronic transfer under this chapter must provide
4 the same level of internal controls and statutory authorizations as
5 required for a check or warrant.

6 SECTION 4. Sections 262.0115(d) and (e), Local Government 7 Code, are amended to read as follows:

8 (d) Under the supervision of the commissioners court, the 9 purchasing agent shall carry out the functions prescribed by law 10 for a purchasing agent under Section 262.011 and for <u>any</u> 11 <u>ministerial function of</u> the county auditor in regard to county 12 purchases and contracts and shall administer the procedures 13 prescribed by law for notice and public bidding for county 14 purchases and contracts.

(e) A county that has established the position of county purchasing agent under this section may abolish the position at any time. On the abolition of the position, the county auditor shall assume the <u>rights and responsibilities of bid or proposal notice</u> <u>and opening under this chapter and Chapter 271</u> [functions <u>previously performed by the purchasing agent</u>].

21 SECTION 5. Section 262.012, Local Government Code, is 22 amended to read as follows:

23 Sec. 262.012. [COUNTY AUDITORS AS] PURCHASING AGENTS IN 24 [CERTAIN] COUNTIES <u>WITH POPULATION OF 100,000 OR LESS</u>. (a) <u>In a</u> 25 <u>county with a population of 100,000 or less:</u>

10 SECTION 29. Section 252.312, Transportation Code, is 11 amended by amending Subsection (b) and adding Subsection (d) to 12 read as follows:

(a) Notwithstanding Section 31 of this Act, the 5 changes in law made by this Act to Sections 262.034, 271.029, and 6 271.064, Local Government Code, apply only to an offense committed 7 on or after the effective date of this Act. For purposes of this 8 section, an offense is committed before the effective date of this 9 Act if any element of the offense occurs before that date.

10 (b) An offense committed before the effective date of this 11 Act is covered by the law in effect immediately before the effective 12 date of this Act, and the former law is continued in effect for that 13 purpose.

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SECTION 33. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
