## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1-7 WHEREAS, Texas has become world famous for its many dinosaur 1-8 discoveries; and

1-9 WHEREAS, To honor the prehistoric reptiles that long ago 1-10 resided in the state, Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 57 of the 1-11 75th Texas Legislature named Brachiosaur Sauropod, *Pleurocoelus*, 1-12 as the official Lone Star State Dinosaur; this designation was 1-13 based on evidence that supported the presence of the dinosaur 1-14 *Pleurocoelus* in Texas; and

1-15 WHEREAS, Subsequently, the fossilized bones that were 1-16 thought to be *Pleurocoelus* have been properly identified as a new 1-17 species named *Paluxysaurus jonesi*; the identification was made by 1-18 Peter Rose during his graduate studies at Southern Methodist 1-19 University, and his findings have been widely accepted by other 1-20 scientists since being published in 2007; and

 1-21 WHEREAS, The dinosaur is named for the town of Paluxy in Hood
 1-22 County and for the Paluxy River, both of which are near the Jones
 1-23 Ranch site where the fossils of this species were discovered; and

1-24 WHEREAS, *Paluxysaurus jonesi* inhabited the earth 1-25 approximately 95 to 112 million years ago, and these sauropods left 1-26 behind a rich record of their existence; in addition to the bone 1-27 fossils, evidence of the species exists in dinosaur footprints that 1-28 have been found throughout the state; the most famous of these 1-29 trackways runs along the Paluxy River and its tributaries, not far 1-30 from the Jones Ranch site; many of these footprints can be viewed at 1-31 Dinosaur Valley State Park, near the town of Glen Rose; and

1-31 Dinosaur Valley State Park, near the town of Glen Rose; and 1-32 WHEREAS, The bones and tracks reveal the massive scale of 1-33 Paluxysaurus; it is estimated that the dinosaur measured 70 feet 1-34 long and 12 feet high at the shoulder, and weighed as much as 20 1-35 tons; and

1-36 WHEREAS, *Paluxysaurus* continues to be the subject of 1-37 important paleontological research; a major dinosaur project is 1-38 ongoing at the Jones Ranch site, with the work being led by the Fort 1-39 Worth Museum of Science and History in partnership with Southern 1-40 Methodist University; moreover, a public exhibit of the bones of 1-41 *Paluxysaurus jonesi* is planned for the museum; and

1-42 WHEREAS, Through the insightful work of Texas-based 1-43 scientists, the tracks and bones of the large quadrupedal sauropod 1-44 found in the Lone Star State are now clearly known to be those of the 1-45 species *Paluxysaurus jonesi* rather than *Pleurocoelus*; and

1-46 WHEREAS, Given the importance of the paleontological 1-47 discoveries that have taken place in Texas, it is indeed 1-48 appropriate that the designation of our state dinosaur keep pace 1-49 with the latest scientific research; now, therefore, be it

1-49 with the latest scientific research; now, therefore, be it 1-50 RESOLVED, That the 81st Legislature of the State of Texas 1-51 hereby designate Paluxysaurus jonesi as the official Lone Star 1-52 State Dinosaur, replacing Brachiosaur Sauropod, Pleurocoelus.

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
