RESOLUTION

- 1 WHEREAS, A passionate advocate for social justice and civil
- 2 rights for the poor and disenfranchised, Cesar Chavez was a true
- 3 American hero, and the anniversary of his birth on March 31, 2010,
- 4 provides a fitting opportunity to remember and honor his many
- 5 contributions; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Born in 1927 near Yuma, Arizona, Cesar Chavez was 10
- 7 years old when his family lost their farm in the Great Depression
- 8 and became migrant farmworkers; throughout his youth and into his
- 9 adulthood, Mr. Chavez traveled across the Southwest, laboring in
- 10 the fields and vineyards and attending more than 30 different
- 11 schools by the time he was in the eighth grade; and
- WHEREAS, After serving in the U.S. Navy for two years, he
- 13 returned home to marry Helen Fabela, whom he had met while working
- 14 in the vineyards of central California; settling with his wife in
- 15 the East San Jose barrio of Sal Si Puedes, he returned to farming to
- 16 support his young family; and
- WHEREAS, Witnessing firsthand the hardships and injustices
- 18 of farmworker life, Mr. Chavez joined the Community Service
- 19 Organization, a prominent Latino civil rights group, in 1952; while
- 20 with the CSO, he coordinated voter registration drives and
- 21 conducted campaigns against racial and economic discrimination; in
- 22 the late 1950s and early 1960s, he served as the CSO's national
- 23 director; and
- 24 WHEREAS, Determined to create an organization that would

- 1 protect and serve farmworkers, he resigned from the CSO in 1962,
- 2 leaving the security of a regular paycheck, and moved with his wife
- 3 and eight children to Delano, where he founded the first successful
- 4 farmworkers union in American history; originally called the
- 5 National Farm Workers Association, the organization later became
- 6 known as the United Farm Workers of America; and
- WHEREAS, For more than three decades, Mr. Chavez led this
- 8 groundbreaking organization by effecting change through peaceful
- 9 tactics such as fasts, boycotts, strikes, and pilgrimages; his
- 10 union's efforts influenced and inspired millions of Americans,
- 11 forging a diverse national coalition of students, middle-class
- 12 consumers, religious groups, and minorities in a hard-won struggle
- 13 to achieve fair wages, medical coverage, pension benefits, humane
- 14 living conditions, and perhaps most important, dignity and respect
- 15 for the hundreds of thousands of farmworkers across the country;
- 16 and
- WHEREAS, In 1991, this second-generation American received
- 18 the Aguila Azteca award, the highest award Mexico can bestow on a
- 19 person of Mexican heritage, and in 1994, a year after his death on
- 20 April 23, 1993, his widow accepted the Presidential Medal of
- 21 Freedom, America's highest civilian honor, on behalf of her late
- 22 husband; since his death, communities across the nation have chosen
- 23 to pay homage to Mr. Chavez by naming schools, parks, streets, and
- 24 libraries, as well as scholarships and awards, in his honor; and
- WHEREAS, His motto in life, "si se puede," or "it can be
- 26 done," embodies the legacy that Cesar Chavez has left for the
- 27 world's benefit, and his principles of equality, justice, and

- 1 dignity for all Americans remain as essential and as relevant today
- 2 as they were when he began his important life's work; now,
- 3 therefore, be it
- 4 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 81st Texas
- 5 Legislature hereby pay tribute to the life of Cesar Chavez by
- 6 recognizing the month beginning March 31, 2010, as Cesar Chavez
- 7 Farmworker Appreciation Month and encourage all Texans to reflect
- 8 on and celebrate the extraordinary achievements of this inspiring
- 9 humanitarian.
