RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The 89th birthday of an esteemed Texan is indeed 2 cause for celebration, and Geraldine Bright of San Antonio 3 commemorated this special occasion on October 27, 2008; and

WHEREAS, Born in the East Texas town of Pittsburg in 1919, 4 5 Mrs. Bright attended Prairie View State Normal & Industrial College, where she earned a bachelor's degree in business 6 7 administration in 1942; graduating just months after the United States had entered World War II, she volunteered for the Women's 8 Army Auxiliary Corps, and as one of the first 40 African American 9 women to take this step, she demonstrated great dedication to her 10 11 country as well as tremendous courage as she strove to break down 12 the walls built by racial prejudice; and

13 WHEREAS, Although she faced discrimination during her time in 14 the corps, Mrs. Bright overcame the challenges she encountered and went on to excel and become a leader among her peers; she ranked at 15 16 the top of her class and was promoted to first lieutenant before being stationed at Fort Huachuca, Arizona, where she trained other 17 young recruits; her efforts helped open the way for later 18 generations of African American women who have played important 19 roles as members of our nation's armed forces; and 20

21 WHEREAS, Following her military service, Mrs. Bright secured 22 employment with the law offices of W. J. Durham in Dallas at a time 23 when the NAACP was coordinating its efforts to open the Democratic 24 Party to African Americans; her work as a legal secretary brought

1 her in contact with a number of influential figures who 2 participated in that effort, including Thurgood Marshall and 3 William Henry Hastie; after moving to San Antonio in 1946, she took 4 a job with the San Antonio Housing Authority, using her expertise to 5 set up financial and bookkeeping systems for the organization; and

6 WHEREAS, Mrs. Bright is a charter member of the Women 7 Pavilion in Washington, D.C., and has shared her time and talents 8 with Delta Sorority; she is also a longtime congregant of St. 9 Philip's Episcopal Church in San Antonio, where she has worshipped 10 for more than a half-century; and

11 WHEREAS, In addition to her many other accomplishments, Mrs. 12 Bright has devoted herself to caring for her family; married to 13 Gerald Bright, she became a single mother when Mr. Bright passed 14 away and raised four children on her own, often working two jobs to 15 make ends meet; and

16 WHEREAS, Beloved by her relatives and friends, Geraldine 17 Bright is an inspiration to all who know her and she may indeed 18 reflect on the past 89 years with considerable pride; now, 19 therefore, be it

20 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 81st Texas 21 Legislature hereby congratulate Geraldine Bright on her 89th 22 birthday and extend to her sincere best wishes for continued 23 happiness; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That an official copy of this resolution be prepared for Mrs. Bright as an expression of high regard by the Texas House of Representatives.
