RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, Nearly 2-1/2 years have gone by since Freddy Fender 2 died on October 14, 2006, but the passage of time has in no way diminished the stature of this Texas music legend, and his legacy 3 remains as poignant as ever; and 4 5 WHEREAS, Born Baldemar Huerta on June 4, 1937, in the South Texas town of San Benito, he began singing at a young age and 6 7 originally focused on performing the conjunto, Tejano, traditional Mexican music that was popular in his Hispanic 8 9 neighborhood; after serving three years in the U.S. Marine Corps, he launched his music career in the late 1950s by playing Texas 10 honky-tonks and recording Spanish versions of popular hits by other 11 performers; when Imperial Records offered him a contract in 1959, 12

he adopted the stage name Freddy Fender; and 13

14 WHEREAS, The following year, that name became well known all across the country as Mr. Fender's song "Wasted Days and Wasted 15 Nights" became a national hit; sadly, his good fortune was 16 short-lived, as an arrest for possession of a small amount of 17 marijuana led to a three-year prison term in Louisiana; by the late 18 1960s, he had returned to the Rio Grande Valley, where he earned a 19 20 living as a mechanic, playing music only on the weekends; and 21 WHEREAS, Mr. Fender's talent refused to be denied, however,

and in 1975, his career was reborn when "Before the Next Teardrop 22 23 Falls" became a number one hit on both the pop and country charts;

he followed "Teardrop" with a remake of his original hit, "Wasted 24

- 1 Days and Wasted Nights," and it once again swept the country,
- 2 becoming his second consecutive number one country song; two more
- 3 number one smashes from the same multi-platinum album confirmed his
- 4 status as a major country music star and earned him the 1975 Best
- 5 Male Artist award from Billboard magazine; and
- 6 WHEREAS, Ever the versatile performer, Mr. Fender enjoyed
- 7 success as an actor in film and television projects and as an
- 8 announcer in advertising campaigns; musically, he took his career
- 9 in a new direction in the 1990s by forming the Texas Tornados with
- 10 famed Lone Star musicians Doug Sahm, Flaco Jimenez, and Augie
- 11 Meyers; the band won the 1990 Grammy Award for best
- 12 Mexican-American performance for its song, "Soy de San Luis," and
- 13 two more Grammy Awards came to Mr. Fender for later projects, one in
- 14 1999 for his work with Los Super Seven and one in 2002 for his album
- 15 La Musica de Baldemar Huerta, a tribute to the Spanish-language
- 16 music of his youth; and
- WHEREAS, Through the years, this exceptional singer enjoyed
- 18 the love and support of his family, including his wife, Vangie
- 19 Huerta, and his children, Baldemar Huerta, Jr., Tammy Loriane
- 20 Huerta, Daniel Huerta, and Marla Ann Huerta Garcia; the sadness the
- 21 family felt when Mr. Fender's life drew to a close at the age of 69
- 22 was shared by countless music fans, but all may rest assured that
- 23 the evocative and heartfelt songs created by this beloved Texan
- 24 will continue to be treasured long into the future; now, therefore,
- 25 be it
- 26 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 81st Texas
- 27 Legislature hereby pay tribute to the life of Freddy Fender and

- 1 recognize his many contributions to the proud musical tradition of
