

R E S O L U T I O N

1 WHEREAS, The State of Texas lost an accomplished educator and
2 public servant with the passing of Dr. John D. Moseley on March 11,
3 2009, at the age of 93; and

4 WHEREAS, Dr. Moseley distinguished himself in a range of
5 endeavors, and his talents were of direct benefit to the Texas
6 Legislature during his tenure as the first executive director of
7 the Texas Legislative Council; he went on to serve as president of
8 Austin College for 25 years, skillfully guiding its growth and
9 enhancing its reputation as a respected and influential place of
10 learning; and

11 WHEREAS, Born in Greenville in 1915, John Moseley was active
12 in the Presbyterian Youth Council in the 1930s and met his future
13 wife, Sara Bernice Honea, while a member of that organization; he
14 completed his undergraduate studies at East Texas State Teachers
15 College and earned a doctor of law degree and a master's degree in
16 public administration from The University of Texas at Austin; and

17 WHEREAS, Initially pursuing a career in government service,
18 Dr. Moseley worked for the State of Texas and then for several
19 federal agencies in Texas and in Washington, D.C., including the
20 Office of Price Administration and the Bureau of the Budget in the
21 Executive Office of the President of the United States; in October
22 1950, he was asked to head up the recently formed Texas Legislative
23 Council; in that capacity, he helped lay the groundwork for the
24 vital support services that the council continues to provide to the

1 members of the legislature; and

2 WHEREAS, Dr. Moseley was hired as the president of Austin
3 College in 1953, and he immediately undertook a range of reforms
4 that brought more students to the Sherman campus, put the college's
5 finances on a sound footing, and doubled the number of campus
6 buildings in the course of a single decade; in academics, he
7 pioneered changes to the curriculum that promoted
8 interdisciplinary and international studies, and he oversaw the
9 establishment of the graduate-level Austin Teacher Program in the
10 latter part of his tenure; Dr. Moseley stepped down as president in
11 1978 but continued to serve as chancellor until 1981, and he
12 remained deeply involved in the college community for the rest of
13 his life; and

14 WHEREAS, This respected educator was the recipient of a long
15 list of honorary degrees and other prestigious awards, including
16 the Mirabeau B. Lamar Medal from the Association of Texas Colleges
17 and Universities and the Outstanding Service to Higher Education
18 Award from the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.); moreover, his
19 prominence among college administrators was reflected in the many
20 leadership roles he held in state and national educational
21 organizations, and he was likewise a central figure in a number of
22 civic groups in the Sherman area; and

23 WHEREAS, Throughout his life, John Moseley devoted himself to
24 serving others, and his exemplary work in the field of higher
25 education and as a member of state and federal government will be
26 remembered and admired long into the future; now, therefore, be it
