## RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The Texas House of Representatives is pleased to 2 recognize the directors and employees of the Community Supervision 3 and Corrections Department (CSCD) for their outstanding service to 4 the Lone Star State; and

5 WHEREAS, With locations throughout Texas, the CSCD is 6 responsible for providing community supervision or adult probation 7 services to hundreds of thousands of individuals, and it offers 8 numerous programs that are designed to change individual behavior 9 and help protect the community; and

WHEREAS, The agency's directors, along with their teams, tirelessly manage all aspects of the adult probation departments within their jurisdictions, aim to improve lives through the use of best practices, and encourage individuals assigned to community supervision to take positive steps toward enhancing their quality of life; and

WHEREAS, The committed individuals who have contributed 16 successful reintegration of 17 immeasurably to the formerly 18 incarcerated individuals into the community include: Paul Becker, director of Harris County CSCD; Stephen L. Enders, director of 19 20 West Texas CSCD; George Hernandez, director of Caldwell County 21 CSCD; Steven T. Henderson, director of Lubbock/Crosby Counties CSCD; Leighton Iles, director of Fort Bend County CSCD; Todd 22 23 Jermstad, interim director of Bell County CSCD; Dr. Geraldine Nagy, director of Travis County CSCD; Dr. Michael E. Noyes, director of 24

Dallas County CSCD; Tom Plumlee, director of Tarrant County CSCD;
 Jim Stott, director of Jefferson County CSCD; and Rodney J.
 Thompson, director of Angelina County CSCD, as well as many other
 caring and hardworking employees; and

5 WHEREAS, Paul Becker has worked diligently with state 6 legislators to advocate for stronger probation departments on 7 behalf of the entire field of community corrections; Mr. Becker has 8 also made much-needed improvements to the Harris County CSCD with 9 his knowledge of treatment programs and team building; and

10 WHEREAS, Stephen L. Enders has brought progressive and 11 innovative programming to adult probation in El Paso for more than 12 35 years; he has implemented and administered many smart-on-crime community corrections programs in the area, including an adult 13 14 probation learning center, а treatment alternative to 15 incarceration program, and victim services; moreover, Mr. Enders has presented fresh, evidence-based ways of management, and he is 16 17 the chair of the Probation Advisory Committee (PAC) and a member of the Texas Probation Association (TPA) and the Texas Corrections 18 Association; and 19

WHEREAS, George Hernandez is retiring at the end of August 20 21 2009, after a long and admirable career marked by dedication and service to community corrections; he has devoted numerous hours as 22 23 an advocate for recruiting and retaining quality officers, and he 24 has passionately represented the interests of the Central Texas regional chiefs as a member of the Probation Advisory Committee and 25 26 as the current co-chair of the TPA Adult Legislative Committee; and 27 WHEREAS, Steven T. Henderson has contributed to the field of

1 community supervision for more than two decades with his impeccable 2 work ethic and extensive knowledge about those programs and 3 supervision strategies that have been proven beneficial to the 4 community; Mr. Henderson is a much sought-after resource, and he 5 consistently provides his staff with the tools and encouragement 6 they need to serve their clients effectively; and

7 WHEREAS, Leighton Iles is an invaluable resource for 8 legislators, probation directors, advocacy groups, and judges, with over 20 years of experience in addressing substance abuse and 9 10 community supervision issues; recognized for his willingness to go above and beyond what is expected of him, Mr. Iles was granted 11 12 membership on the TPA Adult Legislative Committee, and in October 2007, he was appointed to represent all 122 CSCD offices on the 13 14 Judicial Advisory Council; and

15 WHEREAS, Todd Jermstad shares his experience with smart-on-crime criminal justice policies and his extensive 16 17 legislative knowledge with judges, probation directors, and such advocacy groups as the Texas Criminal Justice Coalition and the 18 19 Center for Effective Justice at the Texas Public Policy Foundation; Mr. Jermstad's willingness to support the efforts of those who seek 20 his help is constant and unparalleled, and it has made him a trusted 21 and irreplaceable friend to many within the field of community 22 23 supervision; and

24 WHEREAS, Dr. Geraldine Nagy has worked with the Texas 25 Legislature during several sessions to improve community 26 corrections, and she genuinely understands the role of adult 27 probation departments in changing the lives of those placed under

1 supervision and in making the community safer; Dr. Nagy has 2 dedicated her outstanding career to researching and implementing 3 effective justice system practices in her current position and 4 through her former roles as deputy director for the Community 5 Justice Assistance Division of the Texas Department of Criminal 6 Justice and deputy director of Bastrop County CSCD; and

7 WHEREAS, Dr. Michael E. Noyes is a valuable asset to the 8 criminal justice system, and his implementation of evidence-based best practices is improving the lives of many Texans; Mr. Noyes has 9 10 more than 20 years of experience in the administration of public and private agencies that provide direct services to at-risk families, 11 12 delinquent and dependent youth, and adults within the community 13 corrections environment; along with his committed and 14 knowledgeable team, he has spent considerable time during this 15 session working with policy makers who are seeking smart-on-crime approaches that increase public safety and use tax revenue 16 17 efficiently; and

WHEREAS, Tom Plumlee has gained the respect and admiration of his peers by devoting his career to enhancing the lives of those involved in the adult probation system; he has served as a CSCD director for more than two decades in Amarillo and later Fort Worth, and he has also worked as a probation officer for the Dallas County Probation Department; and

24 WHEREAS, Jim Stott has been a leader in the field of adult 25 probation as a former president and co-chair of the TPA Adult 26 Legislative Committee; with his active participation and his 27 incredible dedication, he has helped his colleagues find solutions

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1 to the problems facing community supervision, and he has remained a
2 strong advocate of community corrections; and

WHEREAS, Since 1983, Rodney J. Thompson has proven his 3 commitment to strengthening community supervision in Texas, and he 4 5 continues to serve on the board of directors for TPA and as co-chair of the TPA Adult Legislative Committee; Mr. Thompson was recognized 6 as the Supervisor of the Year for the Tarrant County CSCD in 2005, 7 8 and he has advocated for qualified staff and additional smart-on-crime strategies that will target the root causes of 9 criminal behavior and address the needs of those suffering from 10 11 substance abuse; and

WHEREAS, The CSCD directors have made lasting contributions to the areas they serve, and they have helped to strengthen the Texas criminal justice system by reducing incarceration costs, increasing public safety, and promoting independent and responsible living; now, therefore, be it

17 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 81st Texas 18 Legislature hereby honor all employees of the Community Supervision 19 and Corrections Department for their notable public service, and 20 extend to them sincere appreciation for their dedication to the 21 criminal justice corrections community; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That an official copy of this resolution be prepared for the CSCD directors as an expression of high regard by the Texas House of Representatives.
