Suspending limitations on conference committee jurisdiction, H.B. No. 3 (Eissler/Shapiro)

H.R. No. 3047

RESOLUTION

1 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the State of 2 Texas, 81st Legislature, Regular Session, 2009, That House Rule 13, 3 Section 9(a), be suspended in part as provided by House Rule 13, Section 9(f), to enable the conference committee appointed to 4 resolve the differences on House Bill 3, relating to public school 5 accountability, curriculum, and promotion requirements, 6 to 7 consider and take action on the following matters:

8 (1) House Rule 13, Sections 9(a)(1), (2), and (4), are 9 suspended to permit the committee to change and omit text not in 10 disagreement and to add text on a matter not included in either 11 version of the bill, in SECTION 1 of the bill, in Section 7.009, 12 Education Code, to read as follows:

13 SECTION 1. Section 7.009, Education Code, is amended to 14 read as follows:

Sec. 7.009. BEST PRACTICES; CLEARINGHOUSE. 15 (a) In coordination with the Legislative Budget Board, the agency shall 16 establish an online clearinghouse of information relating to best 17 practices of campuses, [and] school districts, and open-enrollment 18 19 charter schools. The agency shall determine the appropriate topic categories for which a campus, district, or charter school may 20 21 submit best [regarding instruction, dropout prevention, public school finance, resource allocation, and business] practices. To 22 23 the extent practicable, the agency shall ensure that information 24 provided through the online clearinghouse is specific, actionable

1 information relating to the best practices of high-performing and efficient campuses, [and school] highly 2 districts, and 3 open-enrollment charter schools and of academically acceptable campuses, districts, and open-enrollment charter schools that have 4 demonstrated significant improvement in student achievement rather 5 than general guidelines relating to campus, [and school] district, 6 and open-enrollment charter school operation. The information must 7 be accessible by campuses, school districts, open-enrollment 8 charter schools, and interested members of the public. 9

10 (b) The agency shall solicit and collect from the Legislative Budget Board, centers for education 11 research established under Section 1.005, and [exemplary or recognized] 12 school districts, campuses, and open-enrollment charter schools[au13 as rated under Section 39.072,] examples of best practices as 14 15 determined by the agency under Subsection (a) [relating to instruction, dropout prevention, public school finance, resource 16 17 allocation, and business practices, including best practices relating to curriculum, scope and sequence, compensation and 18 incentive systems, bilingual education and special language 19 programs, compensatory education programs, and the effective use of 20 instructional technology, including online courses]. 21

(c) The agency shall contract for the services of one or more third-party contractors to develop, implement, and maintain a system of collecting and evaluating the best practices of campuses, [and] school districts, and open-enrollment charter schools as provided by this section. In addition to any other considerations required by law, the agency must consider an applicant's

1 demonstrated competence and qualifications in analyzing campus, 2 [and] school district, and open-enrollment charter school 3 practices in awarding a contract under this subsection.

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4 (d) The commissioner may purchase from available funds
5 curriculum and other instructional tools identified under this
6 section to provide for use by school districts <u>and open-enrollment</u>
7 charter schools.

8 Explanation: The alteration of text is necessary to permit school districts and open-enrollment charter schools to submit best 9 10 practices in any relevant area, to clarify that a third-party contractor may collect and evaluate best practices submitted by 11 12 open-enrollment charter schools, and to clarify that the commissioner of education may purchase curriculum and other 13 14 instructional tools to provide for use by open-enrollment charter 15 schools.

16 (2) House Rule 13, Section 9(a)(2), is suspended to permit 17 the committee to omit text not in disagreement, in SECTION 25 of the 18 bill, in amended Section 28.002, Education Code, to read as 19 follows:

20 <u>(c-2) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules to</u> 21 <u>authorize each school district to implement a program under which</u> 22 <u>students in middle or junior high school may earn credits toward</u> 23 <u>high school graduation in middle or junior high school for any</u> 24 <u>course determined by board rule to qualify as a high school</u> 25 <u>equivalent course.</u>

Explanation: The omission of text is necessary to remove the requirement directing the State Board of Education to adopt rules

1 to authorize school district programs to allow middle or junior 2 high school students to earn high school credit.

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3 (3) House Rule 13, Section 9(a)(2), is suspended to permit 4 the committee to omit text not in disagreement, in SECTION 27 of the 5 bill, in amended Section 28.014(d), Education Code, to read as 6 follows:

The agency, in coordination with the Texas Higher 7 (d) Education Coordinating Board, shall adopt a series of questions to 8 be included in an end-of-course assessment instrument administered 9 10 under Subsection (c) to be used for purposes of Section 51.3062. The questions must be developed in a manner consistent with any 11 12 college readiness standards adopted under Sections 39.233 [39.113] and 51.3062. [A student's performance on a question adopted under 13 14 this subsection may not be used to determine the student's 15 performance on an end-of-course assessment instrument.]

Explanation: The omission of text is necessary to permit a student's performance on a specific question related to postsecondary readiness on an end-of-course assessment instrument to be used to determine the student's performance on the assessment instrument.

(4) House Rule 13, Section 9(a)(2), is suspended to permit the committee to omit text not in disagreement, in added Section 23 28.025(b-5), Education Code, to read as follows:

(b-5) Notwithstanding Section 5.09, Chapter 5 (H.B. 1),
 79th Legislature, 3rd Called Session, 2006, the curriculum
 requirements for the recommended and advanced high school programs
 under Subsection (b-1) apply to students entering the ninth grade

beginning with the 2011-2012 school year. This subsection expires September 1, 2015.

Explanation: The omission of text is necessary to have the high school curriculum requirements for the recommended and advanced high school programs established under Chapter 5 (H.B. 1), 79th Legislature, 3rd Called Session, 2006, apply to students entering the ninth grade beginning with the 2007-2008 school year, as originally intended.

9 (5) House Rule 13, Section 9(a)(4), is suspended to permit 10 the committee to add text on a matter not included in either version 11 of the bill, under SECTION 30 of the bill, in amended Section 12 28.025, Education Code, to read as follows:

13 (b-7) The agency shall establish a pilot program allowing a 14 student attending school in a county with a population of more than 15 one million and in which more than 80 percent of the population resides in a single municipality to satisfy the fine arts credit 16 17 required under Subsection (b-1)(3)(A) by participating in a fine arts program not provided by the school district in which the 18 student is enrolled. The fine arts program may be provided on or 19 off a school campus and outside the regular school day. Not later 20 than December 1, 2010, the agency shall provide to the legislature a 21 report regarding the pilot program, including the feasibility of 22 23 expanding the pilot program statewide.

24 (b-8) A school district, with the approval of the 25 commissioner, may allow a student to comply with the curriculum 26 requirements for the physical education credit required under 27 Subsection (b-1)(3)(B) by participating in a private or

commercially sponsored physical activity program provided on or off
 a school campus and outside the regular school day.

Explanation: The additions are necessary to establish a fine arts pilot program and to establish an alternative method for meeting the physical education credit requirement.

6 (6) House Rule 13, Section 9(a)(4), is suspended to permit 7 the committee to add the following SECTION to the bill on a matter 8 not included in either version of the bill to read as follows:

9 SECTION 52. Section 39.0234(a), Education Code, is amended 10 to read as follows:

(a) The agency shall ensure that assessment instruments required under Section 39.023 are capable of being administered by computer. <u>The commissioner may not require a school district or</u> <u>open-enrollment charter school to administer an assessment</u> <u>instrument by computer.</u>

16 Explanation: This addition is necessary to prohibit 17 mandatory administration of assessment instruments by computer.

18 (7) House Rule 13, Section 9(a)(4), is suspended to permit 19 the committee to add text on a matter not included in either version 20 of the bill, under SECTION 59 of the bill, in proposed Section 21 39.057(a), Education Code, to read as follows:

(a) The commissioner shall authorize special accreditationinvestigations to be conducted:

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25 (12) when resource allocation practices as evaluated 26 under Section 39.0821 indicate a potential for significant 27 improvement in resource allocation; or . . .

Explanation: This addition is necessary to authorize a 1 special accreditation investigation when the comptroller has 2 identified the potential for significant improvement in resource 3 4 allocation exists at a school district or campus.

(8) House Rule 13, Section 9(a)(4), is suspended to permit 5 6 the committee to add text on a matter not included in either version of the bill, under SECTION 59 of the bill, in added Section 39.0821, 7 Education Code, to read as follows: 8

9 (b) In reviewing resources allocation practices of districts and campuses under this section, the comptroller shall 10 ensure resources are being used for the instruction of students by 11 12 evaluating:

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(1) the operating cost for each student;

(2) the operating cost for each program; and

15 (3) the staffing cost for each student.

16 Explanation: The addition is necessary to ensure school 17 district and campus resources are being used for the instruction of 18 students.
