A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT 2 relating to professional development institutes regarding education of students with disabilities to serve as a resource for 3 public school teachers and paraprofessionals. 4 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Subchapter J, Chapter 21, Education Code, is 6 7 amended by adding Section 21.461 to read as follows: Sec. 21.461. PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT INSTITUTES REGARDING 8 9 EDUCATION OF STUDENTS WITH DISABILITIES. (a) The commissioner shall develop and make available professional development 10 institutes for teachers and paraprofessionals relating to 11 research-based instructional services for students with 12 13 disabilities, including autism spectrum disorders. 14 (b) A professional development institute developed under this section must address: 15 (1) disability-specific information necessary to 16 enable a teacher or paraprofessional to work effectively in the 17 classroom with students with disabilities; 18 19 (2) instructional techniques proven by scientifically

20 based research, as defined by Section 9101, No Child Left Behind Act 21 of 2001 (20 U.S.C. Section 7801), to be effective in teaching the 22 curriculum required under Section 28.002 to students with 23 disabilities; and 24 (3) appropriate management of behaviors related to a

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1	student's disability that may affect the student's performance.
2	(c) The commissioner shall develop one or more professional
3	development institutes that offer applied behavior analysis
4	training programs provided by or supervised by a person certified
5	as a behavior analyst by the Behavior Analyst Certification Board.
6	A training program under this subsection must provide:
7	(1) public access to lectures and training on the
8	agency's Internet website and the appropriate regional education
9	service center's Internet website;
10	(2) individual consultation in the classroom with
11	students for at least six one-hour sessions;
12	(3) telephone or in-person video review for at least
13	three one-hour sessions; and
14	(4) access to the teacher's mentor through telephone
15	or videoconference consultation during the program.
16	(d) The commissioner shall develop a list of providers
17	approved to conduct an applied behavior analysis training program
18	under Subsection (c). A training program may be provided by a
19	regional education service center, district specialist,
20	university, private entity, private consultant, or other entity
21	that provides training.
22	(e) The commissioner shall adopt criteria for selection of
23	teachers and paraprofessionals authorized to attend a professional
24	development institute, including an applied behavior analysis
25	training program, developed under this section. The commissioner
26	must give priority to teachers and paraprofessionals who have a
27	significant level of professional contact with students with autism

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1 spectrum disorders.

2 (f) From funds appropriated for the purpose, as well as 3 other available sources, the commissioner shall pay a stipend to 4 each teacher or paraprofessional who completes a professional 5 development institute developed under Subsection (a). The 6 commissioner shall determine the amount of the stipend paid under 7 this subsection.

8 (g) The commissioner shall, for each teacher or 9 paraprofessional who completes training in an applied behavior 10 analysis training program developed under Subsection (c), pay to 11 the provider the cost of providing the program to the teacher or 12 paraprofessional. The commissioner may determine a maximum amount 13 that may be paid to provide the program under this subsection.

14 (h) Not later than January 1 of each odd-numbered year, the 15 commissioner shall submit a report regarding the success of the 16 institutes developed under this section, including recommendations 17 for changes, to the governor, lieutenant governor, speaker of the 18 house of representatives, and presiding officer of each legislative 19 committee with primary jurisdiction over public education.

20 SECTION 2. This Act does not make an appropriation. This 21 Act takes effect only if a specific appropriation for the 22 implementation of the Act is provided in the General Appropriations 23 Act of the 81st Legislature.

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SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

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
