

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

relating to online institution resumes for public institutions of higher education.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. Subtitle A, Title 3, Education Code, is amended by adding Chapter 51A to read as follows:

CHAPTER 51A. ONLINE INSTITUTION RESUMES FOR INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION

SUBCHAPTER A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 51A.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:

(1) "Coordinating board" means the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board.

(2) "General academic teaching institution," "institution of higher education," "medical and dental unit," "public state college," and "public technical institute" have the meanings assigned by Section 61.003.

Sec. 51A.002. POWERS AND DUTIES OF COORDINATING BOARD RELATING TO INSTITUTION RESUMES; GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR INSTITUTION RESUMES. (a) The coordinating board, in consultation with each institution of higher education to which this chapter applies, shall develop and maintain online resumes for each of those institutions.

(b) The coordinating board shall:

(1) request from each institution of higher education

1 to which this chapter applies any information the coordinating
2 board considers necessary for the coordinating board to include
3 information or calculate data required to be included in the
4 institution's resume;

5 (2) establish for each institution of higher education
6 to which this chapter applies a list of representative in-state and
7 out-of-state peer institutions and maintain that list on the
8 coordinating board's Internet website;

9 (3) ensure that each of an institution of higher
10 education's online resumes:

11 (A) is available to the public on the
12 coordinating board's Internet website, in a one-page format if
13 possible, and is accessible through a link that appears in a
14 prominent place on the coordinating board's Internet website home
15 page;

16 (B) uses enhanced, user-friendly search
17 capabilities to ensure that the information required to be included
18 in the resume is easily accessible to the persons for whom the
19 resume is designed; and

20 (C) includes a clearly identifiable link to
21 information on the coordinating board's Internet website regarding
22 the coordinating board's higher education accountability system;
23 and

24 (4) ensure that the information provided in each
25 resume is accurate and up to date and includes the most recent data
26 available for out-of-state peer institutions.

27 (c) The coordinating board may modify, as the coordinating

1 board considers necessary, national data regarding an
2 institution's out-of-state peer institutions to ensure uniformity
3 in the comparison of that data to data regarding the institution for
4 which the resume is created and the institution's in-state peer
5 institutions in a resume under this chapter.

6 (d) The coordinating board is not required to include in the
7 resume any category of information that is unavailable to the
8 coordinating board.

9 Sec. 51A.003. DUTIES OF INSTITUTIONS OF HIGHER EDUCATION
10 RELATING TO INSTITUTION RESUMES. Each institution of higher
11 education to which this chapter applies shall:

12 (1) submit to the coordinating board any information
13 requested by the coordinating board as necessary for the
14 coordinating board to include information or calculate data
15 required to be included in the institution's resumes; and

16 (2) ensure that the institution's Internet website
17 home page includes, in a prominent place, an accessible link to the
18 institution's online resumes maintained on the coordinating board's
19 Internet website.

21 SUBCHAPTER B. ONLINE INSTITUTION RESUMES FOR FOUR-YEAR GENERAL
22 ACADEMIC TEACHING INSTITUTIONS

23 Sec. 51A.051. APPLICABILITY OF SUBCHAPTER. This subchapter
24 applies only to general academic teaching institutions, other than
25 public state colleges.

26 Sec. 51A.052. INSTITUTION RESUME FOR LEGISLATORS AND OTHER
27 POLICY MAKERS. (a) The coordinating board shall maintain for each

1 institution to which this subchapter applies an online resume that
2 is designed for use by legislators and other interested policy
3 makers.

4 (b) The resume required by this section must identify:

5 (1) the institutional grouping to which the
6 institution is assigned under the coordinating board's higher
7 education accountability system; and

8 (2) the institution's in-state and out-of-state peer
9 institutions.

10 (c) For purposes of this section, information required to be
11 included in the resume regarding the institution's in-state or
12 out-of-state peer institutions must be listed in the form of the
13 average of that information for those institutions unless otherwise
14 prescribed by coordinating board rule.

15 (d) The resume must include the following information
16 relating to the institution for the most recent state fiscal year
17 for which the information is available and compare that information
18 to the same information for the state fiscal year preceding the most
19 recent state fiscal year for which the information is available and
20 the state fiscal year preceding the most recent state fiscal year
21 for which the information is available by five years:

22 (1) under the heading "ENROLLMENT," the total number
23 of students enrolled in the institution during the fall semester
24 that ended in the fiscal year covered by the resume;

25 (2) under the heading "COSTS," the average annual
26 total academic costs for a resident undergraduate student enrolled
27 in 30 semester credit hours:

- 1 (A) at the institution; and
2 (B) at the institution's in-state and
3 out-of-state peer institutions;
4 (3) under the heading "STUDENT SUCCESS":
5 (A) the retention rate of first-time, full-time,
6 degree-seeking entering undergraduate students:
7 (i) enrolled in the institution after one
8 academic year and after two academic years; and
9 (ii) enrolled in the institution's in-state
10 peer institutions after two academic years;
11 (B) the percentage of undergraduate students
12 requiring developmental education who, after six years from
13 entering the institution, graduated from or are still enrolled in:
14 (i) the institution; and
15 (ii) the institution's in-state peer
16 institutions;
17 (C) the four-year and six-year graduation rates
18 of full-time degree-seeking students:
19 (i) at the institution; and
20 (ii) at the institution's in-state and
21 out-of-state peer institutions; and
22 (D) the average number of fall and spring
23 semesters of enrollment attempted by a student to obtain a
24 bachelor's degree:
25 (i) at the institution; and
26 (ii) at the institution's in-state peer
27 institutions; and

1 (4) under the heading "FUNDING":

2 (A) the total amount of money appropriated by the
3 legislature to the institution, including money appropriated for
4 faculty and staff health coverage and retirement benefits; and

5 (B) the total amount of money from any source
6 available to the institution in that state fiscal year.

7 Sec. 51A.053. INSTITUTION RESUME FOR PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS,
8 PARENTS, AND MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. (a) The coordinating board
9 shall maintain for each institution to which this subchapter
10 applies an online resume that is designed for use by prospective
11 students of the institution, their parents, and other interested
12 members of the public. A resume required for an institution under
13 this section is not required to include information that the
14 coordinating board considers to be substantially duplicative of
15 information reported and available to the public through the
16 Voluntary System of Accountability Program.

17 (b) The resume must identify:

18 (1) the institutional grouping to which the
19 institution is assigned under the coordinating board's higher
20 education accountability system; and

21 (2) the institution's in-state peer institutions.

22 (c) Except as otherwise provided by the coordinating board
23 under Subsection (a), the resume must include the following
24 information relating to the most recent state fiscal year for which
25 the information is available:

26 (1) under the heading "ENROLLMENT":

27 (A) the total number of students enrolled in the

1 institution during the fall semester that ended in the fiscal year
2 covered by the resume; and

3 (B) a clearly identifiable link to the
4 information described by Paragraph (A) disaggregated by student
5 ethnicity;

6 (2) under the heading "DEGREES AWARDED":

7 (A) the number of bachelor's degrees, number of
8 master's degrees, number of doctoral degrees, and number of
9 professional degrees awarded by the institution; and

10 (B) a clearly identifiable link to the
11 information described by Paragraph (A) disaggregated by student
12 ethnicity;

13 (3) under the heading "COSTS":

14 (A) the average annual total academic costs for a
15 resident undergraduate student enrolled in 30 semester credit hours
16 at the institution;

17 (B) clearly identifiable links to information
18 regarding:

19 (i) the rate or rates of tuition per
20 semester credit hour charged by the institution;

21 (ii) any mandatory fees, as defined by the
22 coordinating board, imposed by the institution; and

23 (iii) the amount and percentage by which
24 the institution has increased tuition for a degree program or
25 course level during the state fiscal year covered by the resume;

26 (C) the average cost of on-campus room and board
27 per student; and

1 (D) the average cost to a resident undergraduate
2 student enrolled in 30 semester credit hours for total academic
3 costs and on-campus room and board, excluding the cost of books,
4 supplies, transportation, or other expenses;

5 (4) under the heading "FINANCIAL AID":

6 (A) the percentage of undergraduate students
7 enrolled in the institution who receive need-based grants or
8 scholarships;

9 (B) the percentage of undergraduate students
10 enrolled in the institution who receive need-based grants,
11 scholarships, loans, or work-study funds;

12 (C) the average amount of an undergraduate
13 student's need-based grant and scholarship package; and

14 (D) the average amount of an undergraduate
15 student's need-based grant, scholarship, loan, and work-study
16 package;

17 (5) under the heading "ADMISSIONS":

18 (A) the middle 50 percent test score range of
19 first-time undergraduate students at the institution whose
20 Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT) scores were in the 25th to 75th
21 percentile of students' scores at that institution;

22 (B) the middle 50 percent test score range of
23 first-time undergraduate students at the institution whose
24 American College Test (ACT) scores were in the 25th to 75th
25 percentile of students' scores at that institution; and

26 (C) the percentage of the students who applied
27 for first-time undergraduate admission to the institution who were

1 offered admission to the institution;

2 (6) under the heading "INSTRUCTION":

3 (A) the student/faculty ratio at the
4 institution;

5 (B) the percentage of organized undergraduate
6 classes offered by the institution in which fewer than 20 students
7 are enrolled;

8 (C) the percentage of organized undergraduate
9 classes offered by the institution in which more than 50 students
10 are enrolled; and

11 (D) the percentage of teaching faculty members of
12 the institution who are tenured or tenure-track;

13 (7) under the heading "BACCALAUREATE SUCCESS":

14 (A) four-year, five-year, and six-year
15 graduation rates for full-time bachelor's degree-seeking students
16 at the institution, and links to that information disaggregated by
17 student ethnicity; and

18 (B) the average number of fall and spring
19 semesters of enrollment attempted by a student to obtain a
20 bachelor's degree; and

21 (8) under the heading "FIRST-TIME LICENSURE OR
22 CERTIFICATION EXAMINATION PASS RATES," the first-time licensure or
23 certification examination pass rates in the fields of education,
24 law, pharmacy, nursing, and engineering of students enrolled in the
25 institution or who have graduated from the institution.

1 SUBCHAPTER C. INSTITUTION RESUMES FOR LOWER-DIVISION INSTITUTIONS

2 Sec. 51A.101. APPLICABILITY OF SUBCHAPTER. This subchapter
3 applies only to the following institutions of higher education:

- 4 (1) public junior colleges;
- 5 (2) public technical institutes; and
- 6 (3) public state colleges.

7 Sec. 51A.102. INSTITUTION RESUME FOR LEGISLATORS AND OTHER
8 POLICY MAKERS. (a) The coordinating board shall maintain for each
9 institution to which this subchapter applies an online resume for
10 the institution designed for use by legislators and other
11 interested policy makers.

12 (b) The resume must identify:

- 13 (1) the institutional grouping to which the
14 institution is assigned under the coordinating board's higher
15 education accountability system; and
- 16 (2) the institution's in-state peer institutions.

17 (c) For purposes of this section, information required to be
18 included in the resume regarding the institution's in-state peer
19 institutions must be listed in the form of the average of that
20 information for those institutions unless otherwise prescribed by
21 coordinating board rule.

22 (d) The resume must include the following information
23 relating to the institution for the most recent state fiscal year
24 for which the information is available and compare that information
25 to the same information for the state fiscal year preceding the most
26 recent state fiscal year for which the information is available and
27 the state fiscal year preceding the most recent state fiscal year

1 for which the information is available by five years:

2 (1) under the heading "ENROLLMENT," the total number
3 of students enrolled in the institution for course credit during
4 the fall semester that ended in the fiscal year covered by the
5 resume;

6 (2) under the heading "COSTS," the average annual
7 total academic costs, which for a junior college must include those
8 costs for an in-district and an out-of-district student, for a
9 student enrolled in 30 semester credit hours toward a two-year
10 degree or certificate:

11 (A) at the institution; and

12 (B) at the institution's in-state peer
13 institutions;

14 (3) under the heading "STUDENT SUCCESS":

15 (A) the retention rate of first-time, full-time,
16 credential-seeking entering undergraduate students:

17 (i) enrolled in the institution after two
18 academic years; and

19 (ii) enrolled in the institution's in-state
20 peer institutions after two academic years;

21 (B) the percentage of undergraduate students
22 requiring developmental education who, after three years from
23 entering the institution, graduated from or are still enrolled in:

24 (i) the institution; and

25 (ii) the institution's in-state peer
26 institutions;

27 (C) the three-year, four-year, and six-year

1 graduation rates of full-time credential-seeking students:

2 (i) at the institution; and

3 (ii) at the institution's in-state peer
4 institutions;

5 (D) the percentage of students who transferred to
6 a general academic teaching institution or equivalent institution
7 of higher education, as determined using the accountability system
8 definition of a transfer student:

9 (i) from the institution; and

10 (ii) from the institution's in-state peer
11 institutions; and

12 (E) the percentage of graduates from the
13 preceding academic year who, as of the fall semester that ended in
14 the fiscal year covered by the resume, were either employed or
15 enrolled in a general academic teaching institution or equivalent
16 institution of higher education for:

17 (i) the institution; and

18 (ii) the institution's in-state peer
19 institutions; and

20 (4) under the heading "FUNDING":

21 (A) the total amount of money appropriated by the
22 legislature to the institution for that state fiscal year,
23 including money appropriated for faculty and staff health coverage
24 and retirement benefits;

25 (B) the total amount of money from any source
26 available to the institution in that state fiscal year; and

27 (C) the tax rate per \$100 valuation of taxable

1 property imposed by the junior college district, if the institution
2 is a public junior college.

3 Sec. 51A.103. INSTITUTION RESUME FOR PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS,
4 PARENTS, AND OTHER MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. (a) The coordinating
5 board shall maintain for each institution to which this subchapter
6 applies an online resume that is designed for use by prospective
7 students of the institution, their parents, and other interested
8 members of the public.

9 (b) The resume must identify:

10 (1) the institutional grouping to which the
11 institution is assigned under the coordinating board's higher
12 education accountability system; and

13 (2) the institution's in-state peer institutions.

14 (c) For purposes of this section, information required to be
15 included in the resume regarding the institution's in-state peer
16 institutions must be listed in the form of the average of that
17 information for those institutions unless otherwise prescribed by
18 coordinating board rule.

19 (d) The resume must include the following information

4 (2) under the heading "DEGREES AND CERTIFICATES
5 AWARDED":
6 (A) the number of degrees or certificates awarded
7 for each level, type, or other category of degree or certificate
8 specified by the coordinating board for purposes of this paragraph:
9 (i) by the institution; and
10 (ii) by the institution's in-state peer
11 institutions; and
12 (B) a clearly identifiable link to the
13 information described by Paragraph (A) disaggregated by student
14 ethnicity;
15 (3) under the heading "COSTS," the average annual
16 total academic costs, which for a junior college must include those
17 costs for an in-district and out-of-district student, for a student
18 enrolled in 30 semester credit hours toward a two-year degree:
19 (A) at the institution; and
20 (B) at the institution's in-state peer
21 institutions;
22 (4) under the heading "FINANCIAL AID":
23 (A) the percentage of students who receive
24 need-based grants or scholarships:
25 (i) at the institution; and
26 (ii) at the institution's in-state peer
27 institutions;

1 (B) the percentage of students who receive
2 need-based grants, scholarships, loans, or work-study funds:

- 3 (i) at the institution; and
4 (ii) at the institution's in-state peer
5 institutions;

6 (C) the average amount of a student's need-based
7 grant and scholarship package:

- 8 (i) at the institution; and
9 (ii) at the institution's in-state peer

23 SUBCHAPTER D. ONLINE INSTITUTION RESUMES FOR MEDICAL AND DENTAL

24 UNITS

25 Sec. 51A.151. APPLICABILITY OF SUBCHAPTER. This subchapter
26 applies only to medical and dental units.

27 Sec. 51A.152. INSTITUTION RESUME FOR LEGISLATORS AND OTHER

1 POLICY MAKERS. (a) The coordinating board shall maintain for each
2 institution to which this subchapter applies an online resume
3 designed for use by legislators and other interested policy makers.

4 (b) The resume must identify:

5 (1) the institutional grouping to which the
6 institution is assigned under the coordinating board's higher
7 education accountability system; and

8 (2) the institution's in-state and out-of-state peer
9 institutions.

10 (c) For purposes of this section, information required to be
11 included in the resume regarding the institution's in-state or
12 out-of-state peer institutions must be listed in the form of the
13 average of that information for those institutions unless otherwise
14 prescribed by coordinating board rule.

15 (d) The resume must include the following information
16 relating to the institution for the most recent state fiscal year
17 for which the information is available and compare that information
18 to the same information for the state fiscal year preceding the most
19 recent state fiscal year for which the information is available and
20 the state fiscal year preceding the most recent state fiscal year
21 for which the information is available by five years:

22 (1) under the heading "ENROLLMENT":

5 Graduate Medical Education or the American Osteopathic
6 Association;

7 (2) under the heading "COSTS," the average annual
8 total academic costs, including those costs identified by type of
9 degree program if required by coordinating board rule, for a
10 resident, full-time undergraduate student and for a resident,
11 full-time graduate student:

12 (A) at the institution; and

13 (B) at the institution's in-state and
14 out-of-state peer institutions;

15 (3) under the heading "STUDENT SUCCESS":

16 (A) if applicable, the percentage of medical
17 school students who pass Part 1 or Part 2 of any examination
18 administered or accepted for a medical license under Subtitle B,
19 Title 3, Occupations Code:

20 (i) at the institution; and

21 (ii) at the institution's in-state and
22 out-of-state peer institutions;

23 (B) if applicable, the percentage of medical
24 school students who are practicing primary care in this state:

25 (i) after graduating from the institution;

26 and

27 (ii) after graduating from the

1 institution's in-state peer institutions;

2 (C) the number of nursing degrees or allied
3 health degrees awarded for each level:

4 (i) by the institution; and

5 (ii) by the institution's in-state and
6 out-of-state peer institutions; and

7 (D) the estimated total amount of the
8 institution's research expenditures for the most recent state
9 fiscal year available; and

10 (4) under the heading "FUNDING":

11 (A) the total amount of money appropriated by the
12 legislature to the institution, including money appropriated for
13 faculty and staff health coverage and retirement benefits, for that
14 state fiscal year; and

15 (B) the total amount of money from any source
16 available to the institution for that state fiscal year.

17 Sec. 51A.153. INSTITUTION RESUME FOR PROSPECTIVE STUDENTS,
18 PARENTS, AND OTHER MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC. (a) The coordinating
19 board shall maintain for each institution to which this subchapter
20 applies an online resume that is designed for use by prospective
21 students of the institution, their parents, and other interested
22 members of the public.

23 (b) The resume must identify:

24 (1) the institutional grouping to which the
25 institution is assigned under the coordinating board's higher
26 education accountability system; and

27 (2) the institution's in-state and out-of-state peer

1 institutions.

2 (c) For purposes of this section, information required to be
3 included in the resume regarding the institution's in-state peer
4 institutions must be listed in the form of the average of that
5 information for those institutions unless otherwise prescribed by
6 coordinating board rules.

7 (d) The resume must include the following information
8 relating to the most recent state fiscal year for which the
9 information is available:

10 (1) under the heading "ENROLLMENT," with clearly
11 identifiable links to the information disaggregated by student
12 ethnicity:

13 (A) the total number of students enrolled in the
14 institution during the fall semester that ended in the fiscal year
15 covered by the resume;

16 (B) if applicable, the total number of students
17 enrolled in the institution's medical school during that fall
18 semester; and

19 (C) if applicable, the total number of physicians
20 certified by the institution annually on September 1 as training in
21 residency programs accredited by the Accreditation Council for
22 Graduate Medical Education or the American Osteopathic Association
23 at the institution on the most recent September 1 for which the
24 information is available;

25 (2) under the heading "COSTS":

26 (A) the average annual total academic costs,
27 including those costs identified by type of degree program if

1 required by coordinating board rule, for a resident, full-time
2 student at the institution;

3 (B) clearly identifiable links to information
4 regarding:

5 (i) the tuition per academic year charged
6 by the institution under Section 54.051;

7 (ii) any mandatory fees, as defined by the
8 coordinating board, imposed by the institution; and

9 (iii) the amount and percentage by which
10 the institution has increased tuition for a degree program or
11 course level during the five state fiscal years preceding the state
12 fiscal year covered by the resume; and

13 (C) the average cost to a resident undergraduate
14 student enrolled in 30 semester credit hours for tuition and fees;

15 (3) under the heading "FINANCIAL AID":

16 (A) the percentage of graduate students enrolled
17 in the institution who receive need-based grants or scholarships;

18 (B) the percentage of graduate students enrolled
19 in the institution who receive need-based grants, scholarships,
20 loans, or work-study funds;

21 (C) the average amount of a graduate student's
22 need-based grant and scholarship package; and

23 (D) the average amount of a graduate student's
24 need-based grant, scholarship, loan, and work-study package;

25 (4) under the heading "STUDENT SUCCESS":

26 (A) if applicable, the percentage of medical
27 school students who pass Part 1 or Part 2 of any examination

1 administered or accepted for a medical license under Subtitle B,
2 Title 3, Occupations Code:

3 (i) at the institution; and
4 (ii) at the institution's in-state peer
5 institutions;

6 (B) if applicable, the percentage of medical
7 school students who are practicing primary care in this state:

8 (i) after graduating from the institution;
9 and

10 (ii) after graduating from the
11 institution's in-state peer institutions;

12 (C) the number of nursing degrees or allied
13 health degrees awarded for each level:

14 (i) by the institution; and
15 (ii) by the institution's in-state peer
16 institutions; and

17 (D) the estimated total amount of the
18 institution's research expenditures; and

19 (5) under the heading "FIRST-TIME LICENSURE OR
20 CERTIFICATION EXAMINATION PASS RATES," the first-time licensure or
21 certification examination pass rates in applicable fields of
22 students who are enrolled in or have graduated from:

23 (A) the institution; and

24 (B) the institution's in-state peer
25 institutions.

26 SECTION 2. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board
27 shall create the online institution resumes required by Chapter

1 51A, Education Code, as added by this Act, and provide the resumes
2 on the board's Internet website not later than February 1, 2010.

3 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
4 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
5 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
6 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
7 Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
