4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subchapter H, Chapter 51, Education Code, is
6	amended by adding Section 51.4011 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 51.4011. COMMISSION TO RECOMMEND LONG-RANGE PLAN FOR
8	HIGHER EDUCATION. (a) In this section:
9	(1) "General academic teaching institution" has the
10	meaning assigned by Section 61.003, except that the term does not
11	include a public state college.
12	(2) "Institution of higher education," "medical and
13	dental unit," "public junior college," "public state college,
14	"public technical institute," and "university system" have the
15	meanings assigned by Section 61.003.
16	(b) A commission is established to conduct a study of issues
17	relating to the higher education system in this state and to
18	recommend for that system a long-range plan to meet the demands of a
19	global economy and a growing and diverse population.
20	(c) The commission is composed of 20 members as follows:

- (e) The governor shall designate as the presiding officer

- 17 (f) The commission may request from any institution of
- 18 higher education or other state agency assistance or information
- 19 and, to the extent permissible under state and federal law and to
- 20 the extent practicable, the institution or agency shall provide the
- 21 <u>assistance or information requested.</u>
- 22 (g) The expenses of the commission shall be paid in equal
- 23 amounts from the contingent expense accounts of the senate and the
- 24 house of representatives, or as otherwise agreed to by the
- 25 lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of
- 26 representatives. Members of the commission serve without
- 27 <u>compensation but are entitled to reimbursement of travel expenses</u>

incurred in carrying out the commission's duties. 1 2 (h) The commission may study any issue the commission determines to be important to the future of higher education in this 3 4 state, including: (1) incentives, including concurrent enrollment and 5 6 dual credit courses, and related requirements to facilitate seamless student transitions between and among high schools, public 7 junior colleges, public technical institutes, public state 8 colleges, general academic teaching institutions, private and 9 independent institutions of higher education, and medical and 10 dental units; 11 (2) methods to improve communication and coordination 12 between institutions of higher education and the business community 13 14 to: 15 (A) create pathways to careers for students; and 16 (B) enhance curricula in a manner that will 17 benefit students, businesses, and the overall economy of the state; (3) concerns regarding current and projected student 18 enrollment and enrollment capacity at The University of Texas at 19 Austin and Texas A&M University in College Station and methods for 20 21 ensuring that those elite institutions remain competitive with other public and private flagship institutions of higher education; 22 (4) the creation of additional public flagship 23 24 research institutions of higher education, including studying 25 methods for: 26 (A) selecting the locations of those <u>institutions</u>, <u>including consideration of the</u> feasibility of 27

1	selecting the locations through:
2	(i) a bidding or other competitive process
3	among communities in this state; or
4	(ii) solicitation of proposals from
5	existing public or private institutions of higher education,
6	businesses, or other appropriate entities; and
7	(B) ensuring that those additional flagship
8	institutions admit a qualified and diverse student body;
9	(5) methods:
10	(A) that can be used to identify the mission,
11	areas of specialization, and unique attributes of each institution
12	of higher education; and
13	(B) that the institutions can use to better
14	coordinate among themselves and to further develop, enhance, and
15	promote their respective missions;
16	(6) criteria for establishment of new graduate
17	programs;
18	(7) alternative methods of funding institutions of
19	higher education, with emphasis on studying how research
20	universities should be funded; and
21	(8) the TEXAS grant, Texas educational opportunity
22	grant, tuition equalization grant, and other financial aid
23	programs, including whether to add to the TEXAS grant program a
24	component that targets students at the preschool and primary and
25	secondary school levels to encourage those students to commit to
26	and succeed in higher education programs and that may include a
27	work-study requirement.

(i) Based on the commission's study under Subsection (h), the commission shall prepare a report, including findings, recommendations, and any proposed legislation the commission determines would be beneficial to further the commission's recommendations. The report must include recommendations for improving financial aid programs to ensure that the maximum number of eliqible students receive financial aid and that a minimum number of students are burdened with debt as a result of attending institutions of higher education. Not later than October 1, 2010, the commission shall submit the report to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board and to the governor, the lieutenant governor, the speaker of the house of representatives, and the presiding officer of each legislative standing committee or subcommittee with jurisdiction over higher education.

(j) This section expires January 1, 2011.

SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
