SECTION 4. The changes in law made by this Act apply only to a decree of dissolution of a marriage or order in a suit affecting the parent-child relationship that is rendered or issued on or after the effective date of this Act. A decree or order rendered or issued before the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect on the date the decree or order was rendered or issued, and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.
