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A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the provision and evaluation of comprehensive substance
3	abuse treatment under the state Medicaid program.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subchapter B, Chapter 531, Government Code, is
6	amended by adding Section 531.0226 to read as follows:
7	Sec. 531.0226. SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT EVALUATION.
8	(a) The commission shall monitor the provision of comprehensive
9	substance abuse treatment, as described by Section 32.024(ff),
10	Human Resources Code, to Medicaid recipients who are at least 21
11	years of age and analyze data relating to the provision of those
12	services. The commission shall provide the data to the Legislative
13	Budget Board in the format and at the times requested by the
14	Legislative Budget Board.
15	(b) The data analyzed and provided under Subsection (a)
16	must:
17	(1) be measured in three consecutive years, including
18	the year before the year in which the recipient receives
19	comprehensive substance abuse treatment, the year in which the
20	treatment is first provided to the recipient, and the year
21	following the year in which the treatment is first provided to the
22	recipient; and
23	(2) include at least the following:
24	(A) the number of recipients to whom

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comprehensive substance abuse treatment is provided; 1 2 the type of substance abuse treatment (B) 3 provided; 4 (C) the average annual cost per recipient of treatment under the Medicaid program, other than the comprehensive 5 substance abuse treatment, including inpatient services other than 6 7 inpatient labor and delivery services, emergency department services, outpatient services, and pharmaceutical and ancillary 8 9 services; (D) the average annual cost per recipient of the 10 11 comprehensive substance abuse treatment; and 12 (E) the average annual number per recipient of: 13 (i) inpatient days; (ii) emergency department visits; and 14 15 (iii) outpatient visits. 16 (c) The commission shall collect the data listed in Subsections (b)(2)(C) and (E) for Medicaid recipients who are at 17 least 21 years of age and with respect to whom there is no evidence 18 of a substance abuse disorder for the same period described by 19 20 Subsection (b). The commission shall ensure that data is analyzed using: 21 (d) 22 (1) appropriate demographic categories, including 23 recipient age, disability, and income; and 24 (2) the type of service delivery model through which 25 the recipient received services through Medicaid, including the fee-for-service, primary care case management, and health 26 27 maintenance organization models.

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1 (e) Using the data provided by the commission, the 2 Legislative Budget Board shall evaluate cost and utilization trends 3 and whether the provision of comprehensive substance abuse 4 treatment through the state Medicaid program results in an increase in overall Medicaid spending. Not later than February 1, 2013, the 5 Legislative Budget Board shall prepare and publish a report of the 6 7 data. The Legislative Budget Board shall provide a draft of the report to the commission before publishing the report. 8

9 (f) If the Legislative Budget Board determines that the 10 provision of comprehensive substance abuse treatment through the 11 state Medicaid program has resulted in an increase in overall 12 Medicaid spending, the commission may not continue to provide those 13 services to a Medicaid recipient who is at least 21 years of age.

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(g) This section expires March 1, 2013.

15 SECTION 2. Section 32.024, Human Resources Code, is amended 16 by adding Subsection (ff) to read as follows:

17 (ff) Except as otherwise provided by this subsection, the 18 department shall provide comprehensive substance abuse treatment under the medical assistance program to a person who is at least 21 19 years of age, has a substance abuse disorder, and otherwise 20 qualifies for medical assistance. The department may not provide 21 the treatment if, based on the data evaluated under Section 22 23 531.0226, Government Code, the Legislative Budget Board determines that the treatment resulted in an increase in overall medical 24 25 assistance program spending. Comprehensive substance abuse treatment includes assessment, residential detoxification, 26 27 outpatient detoxification, methadone maintenance, residential

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1 services, specialized residential services for women, outpatier

2 chemical dependency counseling, and any other necessary services as

3 determined by the department.

SECTION 3. If before implementing any provision of this Act a state agency determines that a waiver or authorization from a federal agency is necessary for implementation of that provision, the agency affected by the provision shall request the waiver or authorization and may delay implementing that provision until the waiver or authorization is granted.

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SECTION 4. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
