3-14 SECTION 2. This Act does not make an appropriation. A 3-15 provision in this Act that creates a new governmental program, 3-16 creates a new entitlement, or imposes a new duty on a governmental 3-17 entity is not mandatory during a fiscal period for which the 3-18 legislature has not made a specific appropriation to implement the 3-19 provision.

3-20 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 3-21 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 3-22 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 3-23 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 3-24 Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

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
