Not later than September 1, 2010, the housing and health services coordination council shall submit the first report 3-60 3-61 3-62 of the council's findings and recommendations as required by Subchapter NN, Chapter 2306, Government Code, as added by this Act. SECTION 4. This Act does not make an appropriation. A provision in this Act that creates a new governmental program, creates a new entitlement, or imposes a new duty on a governmental 3-63 3-64 3-65 3-66 entity is not mandatory during a fiscal period for which the 3-67 legislature has not made a specific appropriation to implement the 3-68 3-69 provision.
