5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:		
6	SECTION 1. Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by adding		
7	Subchapter FF to read as follows:		
8	SUBCHAPTER FF. PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE FUNDING		
9	Sec. 61.9801. PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE FUNDING FOR CERTAIN		
10	GENERAL ACADEMIC TEACHING INSTITUTIONS. (a) This section applies		
11	only to general academic teaching institutions other than public		
12	state colleges.		
13	(b) In this section:		
14	(1) "Advanced degree" means a graduate or professional		
15	degree for which a baccalaureate degree is usually required as a		
16	prerequisite to admission into the degree program.		
17	(2) "At-risk student" means a student of an		
18	institution to which this section applies:		
19	(A) whose score on the Scholastic Assessment Test		
20	(SAT) or the American College Test (ACT) is less than the national		
21	mean score of students' scores on that test;		
22	(B) who has been awarded a grant under the		
23	federal Pell Grant program;		
24	(C) who was 20 years of age or older on the date		

1 the student initially enrolled in the institution; 2 (D) who initially enrolled in the institution for 3 less than 12 semester credit hours during a fall or spring semester; 4 (E) who did not receive a high school diploma but 5 received a high school equivalency certificate; 6 (F) who may not be claimed by any other person as a dependent for federal income tax purposes but may claim at least 7 one other person as a dependent for federal income tax purposes; or 8 9 (G) who is a single parent. 10 (3) "Critical field" means a field of study designated as a critical field under Subsection (c). 11 12 (c) Except as otherwise provided under Subdivision (2), the fields of engineering, computer science, mathematics, physical 13 science, allied health, nursing, and teaching certification in the 14 15 field of science or mathematics are critical fields. Beginning September 1, 2011, the board, based on the board's determination of 16 17 those fields of study in which the support and development of postsecondary education programs at the bachelor's degree or 18 19 advanced degree level are most critically necessary for serving the needs of this state, by rule may: 20 21 (1) designate as a critical field a field of study that 22 is not currently designated by this subsection or by the board as a critical field; or 23 24 (2) remove a field of study from the list of fields 25 currently designated by this subsection or by the board as critical fields. 26

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(d) For each state fiscal year, the board shall distribute

any performance incentive funds appropriated by the legislature for 1 the purposes of this section, and any other funds made available for 2 the purposes of this section, to institutions to which this section 3 applies in proportion to the increase, if any, in the average number 4 of degrees awarded annually by each institution in the two most 5 recent fiscal years from the average number of degrees awarded 6 annually by that institution in the two fiscal years immediately 7 preceding those fiscal years, using the weights assigned to each 8 degree under the table prescribed by Subsection (e). (e) A number of points is assigned for each degree awarded 10 by an eligible institution, other than a degree awarded to an 11 12 international student, according to the following table: 13 POINTS 14 Noncritical Field/Not At-Risk Student 1.0 15 Noncritical Field/At-Risk Student 2.0 Critical Field/Not At-Risk Student 16 2.0 Critical Field/At-Risk Student 17 3.0 Sec. 61.9802. PERFORMANCE INCENTIVE FUNDING FOR PUBLIC 18 JUNIOR COLLEGES, PUBLIC TECHNICAL INSTITUTES, AND PUBLIC STATE 19 COLLEGES. (a) This section applies only to the following 20 21 institutions of higher education: 22 (1) public junior colleges; 23 (2) public technical institutes; and 24 (3) public state colleges. (b) In this section: 25 26 (1) "At-risk student" means a student of

institution to which this section applies:

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1	(A) who graduated from high school with a
2	cumulative grade point average of less than 2.5 on a four-point
3	scale or the equivalent;
4	(B) who has been awarded a grant under the
5	federal Pell Grant program;
6	(C) who was 20 years of age or older on the date
7	the student enrolled in the institution for the first time;
8	(D) who initially enrolled in the institution for
9	less than 12 semester credit hours during a fall or spring semester;
10	(E) who did not receive a high school diploma but
11	received a high school equivalency certificate;
12	(F) who may not be claimed by any other person as
13	a dependent for federal income tax purposes but may claim at least
14	one other person as a dependent for federal income tax purposes; or
15	(G) who is a single parent.
16	(2) "Critical field" means a field of study designated
17	as a critical field under Subsection (c).
18	(c) Except as otherwise provided under Subdivision (2), the
19	fields of engineering technology, computer science, mathematics,
20	physical science, allied health, and nursing are critical fields.
21	Beginning September 1, 2011, the board, based on the board's
22	determination of those fields of study in which the support and
23	development of postsecondary education programs at the
24	lower-division level are most critically necessary for serving the
25	needs of this state, by rule may:
26	(1) designate as a critical field a field of study that
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- 1 critical field; or
- 2 (2) remove a field of study from the list of fields
- 3 currently designated by this subsection or by the board as critical
- 4 fields.
- 5 (d) For each state fiscal year, the board shall distribute
- 6 any performance incentive funds appropriated by the legislature for
- 7 the purposes of this section, and any other funds made available for
- 8 the purposes of this section, to institutions to which this section
- 9 applies in proportion to the increase, if any, in the average number
- 10 of student transfers described by Subsection (g) and degrees and
- 11 certificates awarded annually by each institution in the two most
- 12 recent fiscal years from the average number of student transfers
- 13 described by Subsection (g) and degrees and certificates awarded
- 14 annually by that institution in the two fiscal years immediately
- 15 preceding those fiscal years, using the weights assigned to each
- 16 student transfer or degree or certificate under the table
- 17 prescribed by Subsection (h).
- 18 (e) Points may not be assigned under Subsection (h) for any
- 19 degree or certificate awarded:
- 20 (1) in a program on a topic or at a level that the board
- 21 determines does not merit funding under this section; or
- 22 (2) to an international student.
- 23 (f) Points may not be assigned under Subsection (h) for both
- 24 a student's certificate or degree and the student's transfer.
- 25 Points must be assigned for the student only in the category under
- 26 Subsection (h) in which the highest number of points will be
- 27 assigned for the student.

2	Subsection (h) only for a student of the institution who comple	eted	
3	at least 30 but not more than 70 semester credit hours at	the

7	(h) A number of points is assigned for each degree awa	ded	
8	or student transfer by an eligible institution according to	the

17	applies in proportion to the increase, if any, in the	e average number
18	of degrees and certificates awarded by, and medic	cal residencies
19	completed at, each institution annually in the t	wo most recent
20	fiscal years from the average number of degrees as	nd certificates
21	awarded by, and medical residencies completed at, t	hat institution
22	annually in the two fiscal years immediately precedi	ng those fiscal

26	(c) A number of points is assigned for	each degree or

TEXAS ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE AWARD PROGRAM. (a) 11 12 In this section: (1) "At-risk student" includes any student who is an 13
- 14 <u>at-risk student under Section 61.9801 or 61.9802.</u>
 15 (2) "Critical field" includes any field of study
- 16 designated as a critical field under Section 61.9801 or 61.9802.
- 17 (3) "End-of-degree examination" means an examination

 18 approved by the board for purposes of this section as an effective

 19 measure of the knowledge, skill, proficiency, and understanding
- 20 achieved by a student on completion of a degree program.
- 21 (4) "Licensing examination" means an examination
- 22 required for the issuance of a professional or occupational
- 23 license, except that in regard to an examination required for a
- 24 medical license, the term applies only to the first two sittings by
- 25 a student for any examination administered or accepted for that
- 26 purpose under Subtitle B, Title 3, Occupations Code.
- 27 (b) The board shall administer the Texas Academic

- 1 Excellence Award Program, under which the board annually:
- 2 (1) presents a Texas Academic Excellence Award to each
- 3 graduate of an institution of higher education whose licensing
- 4 examination score or end-of-degree examination score exceeds the
- 5 national average of students' scores on that examination or, if the
- 6 examination is not administered nationally, exceeds the statewide
- 7 average of students' scores on that examination; and
- 8 (2) provides funds to the institutions of higher
- 9 education from which the award recipients graduated in accordance
- 10 with Subsection (c).
- 11 (c) For each state fiscal year, the board shall distribute
- 12 any funds appropriated by the legislature for the purposes of this
- 13 subsection, and any other funds made available for purposes of this
- 14 subsection, to the institutions of higher education from which the
- 15 Texas Academic Excellence Award recipients for that year graduated,
- 16 <u>in proportion to the number of degrees awarded by each institution</u>
- 17 to students receiving the award for that year, weighted according
- 18 to the weights assigned to the degrees under the table prescribed by
- 19 Section 61.9801(e), 61.9802(h), or 61.9803(c), as applicable,
- 20 including any additional weights assigned to students who are
- 21 at-risk students or who graduated with a degree in a critical field.
- 22 (d) The board shall hire consultants to assist the board in
- 23 determining which end-of-degree examinations to approve for
- 24 purposes of this section.
- Sec. 61.9805. RULES. The board shall adopt rules for the
- 26 administration of this subchapter.
- Sec. 61.9806. REPORT BY INSTITUTIONS TO BOARD. Not later

- 1 than September 1 of each year, each institution of higher education
- 2 shall compile and submit to the board, in accordance with rules
- 3 adopted by the board, a report that includes the following data
- 4 regarding each student who was awarded a degree or certificate by
- 5 the institution, completed a medical residency with the
- 6 institution, or transferred from the institution to a general
- 7 academic teaching institution other than a public state college,
- 8 during the preceding state fiscal year:
- 9 (1) the student's scores on the Scholastic Assessment
- 10 Test (SAT) and American College Test (ACT);
- 11 (2) for a student who transferred from the institution
- 12 without completing a degree or certificate, the number of semester
- 13 credit hours completed by the student at the institution;
- 14 (3) the student's grade point average on all course
- 15 work completed at the institution;
- 16 (4) whether the student received a grant under the
- 17 federal Pell Grant program;
- 18 (5) the age of the student on the date the student
- 19 initially enrolled in the institution;
- 20 (6) whether the student initially enrolled in the
- 21 institution for less than 12 semester credit hours during a fall or
- 22 <u>spring semester;</u>
- 23 (7) whether the student is an international student;
- 24 (8) whether any degree or certificate awarded to the
- 25 student by the institution is in a field designated as a critical
- 26 field under Section 61.9801 or Section 61.9802; and
- 27 (9) any other information required by the board.

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- 1 Sec. 61.9807. REPORT TO BOARD AND LEGISLATURE BY EDUCATION
- 2 RESEARCH CENTER REGARDING EVALUATION OF POINT ASSIGNMENTS. Each
- 3 state fiscal biennium, the board shall provide for the evaluation
- 4 by an education research center established under Section 1.005 of
- 5 the points assigned under Sections 61.9801, 61.9802, and 61.9803.
- 6 Not later than June 1 of each even-numbered year, the education
- 7 research center shall submit to the board and the legislature a
- 8 written report regarding the center's evaluation under this
- 9 section, including any recommendations for changes to the points
- 10 <u>assigned under those sections.</u>
- 11 SECTION 2. Section 61.0591, Education Code, is repealed.
- 12 SECTION 3. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board
- 13 shall adopt rules relating to the administration of Subchapter FF,
- 14 Chapter 61, Education Code, as added by this Act, as soon as
- 15 practicable after the effective date of this Act.
- SECTION 4. Section 61.9804, Education Code, as added by
- 17 this Act, applies beginning with licensing examinations and
- 18 end-of-degree examinations administered on or after September 1,
- 19 2011.
- 20 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
