A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to physician residency programs, including physicians
3	shortage residency programs and oncology training in certain
4	residency programs.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	SECTION 1. Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by adding
7	Subchapter I-1 to read as follows:
8	SUBCHAPTER I-1. CONTRACTS FOR PHYSICIAN SHORTAGE RESIDENCY
9	PROGRAMS
10	Sec. 61.511. DEFINITIONS. As used in this subchapter:
11	(1) "Medical school" means a medical school that is
12	part of The University of Texas System, the Texas Tech University
13	System, The Texas A&M University System, the University of North
14	Texas System, or the Baylor College of Medicine.
15	(2) "Approved physician shortage residency training
16	program" means a graduate medical education program that is
17	operated by a medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit
18	corporation and that has been approved for training physicians in a
19	shortage area identified by the Physician Shortage Residency
20	Advisory Committee.
21	Sec. 61.512. CONTRACTS. The board may contract with a
22	medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation for the
23	purpose of establishing and operating an approved physician
24	shortage residency training program and may compensate the medical

- 1 school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation on a formula
- 2 approved by the board based upon the number of resident physicians
- 3 in the training program.
- 4 Sec. 61.513. RULES. The board shall adopt rules to
- 5 implement this subchapter.
- 6 Sec. 61.514. DISBURSEMENTS. (a) Pursuant to a contract,
- 7 the board may disburse through the designated project director to a
- 8 medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation funds
- 9 for the purpose of the graduate training of physicians in an
- 10 approved physician shortage residency training program. The
- 11 project director of the residency program shall, in accordance with
- 12 such rules as the board may adopt, make timely reports directly to
- 13 the board concerning the development and progress of the residency
- 14 training program.
- 15 (b) The board may establish by contract the method or manner
- 16 of the disbursement to the project director.
- Sec. 61.515. ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a) The Physician
- 18 Shortage Residency Advisory Committee is created and shall consist
- 19 of nine members, as follows:
- 20 (1) one member shall be a licensed physician appointed
- 21 by the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association;
- 22 (2) two members shall be administrators of hospitals
- 23 and shall be appointed by the Texas Hospital Association;
- 24 (3) two members shall be licensed physicians appointed
- 25 by the Texas Medical Association;
- 26 (4) three members of the public shall be appointed to
- 27 the committee by the governor; and

- 1 (5) one member representing the statewide health
- 2 coordinating council as determined by the chair of the council.
- 3 (b) The terms of office of each member shall be for three
- 4 years. Each member shall serve until a replacement has been
- 5 appointed to the committee.
- 6 (c) The members of the committee serve without
- 7 compensation, but shall be reimbursed by the board for actual
- 8 expenses incurred in the performance of duties as members of the
- 9 committee.
- 10 (d) The committee shall meet at least annually and so often
- 11 as requested by the board or called into meeting by the chairman.
- 12 <u>(e) The chairman shall be elected by the members of the</u>
- 13 committee for one year.
- 14 (f) The committee shall:
- 15 (1) review data from the statewide health coordinating
- 16 council and other resources to determine the physician shortages in
- 17 Texas;
- 18 (2) review for the board applications for approval and
- 19 funding of residency training programs and related support
- 20 programs;
- 21 (3) make recommendations to the board relating to the
- 22 <u>disbursement of funds under this subchapter based on the following</u>
- 23 <u>criteria:</u>
- 24 (A) residency programs which would expand
- 25 training opportunities in medical specialty areas in which there is
- 26 a shortage in Texas;
- 27 (B) residency programs which would be located in

- 1 medically underserved communities in Texas;
- 2 (C) residency programs in specialty areas in
- 3 which a substantial number of graduates of Texas medical schools
- 4 have left the state of Texas to pursue such training; or
- 5 (D) residency programs which would undertake
- 6 <u>innovative approaches to residency training</u>, including extensive
- 7 use of ambulatory facilities or the creation of medical homes for
- 8 patients; and
- 9 (4) perform such other duties as may be directed by the
- 10 board.
- 11 Sec. 61.516. FUNDING. The board may:
- 12 (1) receive and expend appropriations for purposes of
- 13 this subchapter, including funds generated by fees under Chapter
- 14 153, Occupations Code, in excess of the funds needed for the
- 15 purposes authorized by Section 153.052, Occupations Code; and
- 16 (2) accept gifts, grants, and donations of real or
- 17 personal property from any entity, subject to limitations or
- 18 conditions set by law, for the purposes of this subchapter.
- 19 Sec. 61.517. CONTRACTS SUBJECT TO AVAILABLE FUNDS.
- 20 Notwithstanding any other provision of this subchapter, the board
- 21 may not enter into a contract under this subchapter with respect to
- 22 <u>an approved physician shortage residency training program unless</u>
- 23 the board requests certification and the comptroller certifies that
- 24 the amount of appropriations or other money available for that
- 25 purpose equals or exceeds \$3 million. The comptroller shall
- 26 publish the certification in the Texas Register.
- 27 SECTION 2. The heading to Subchapter I, Chapter 61,

- 1 Education Code, is amended to read as follows:
- 2 SUBCHAPTER I. CONTRACTS FOR FAMILY PRACTICE [MEDICAL] RESIDENCY
- 3 PROGRAMS
- 4 SECTION 3. Subsection (b), Section 51.918, Education Code,
- 5 is amended to read as follows:
- 6 (b) The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall:
- 7 (1) encourage and coordinate the creation or expansion
- 8 of a rural preceptor program among medical schools, teaching
- 9 hospitals, nursing schools, and schools of allied health sciences;
- 10 and
- 11 (2) require family practice residency programs to
- 12 provide an opportunity for residents to have a one-month rotation
- 13 through:
- 14 (A) a rural setting; [and]
- 15 (B) a public health setting; and
- (C) an oncology setting.
- 17 SECTION 4. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board
- 18 shall adopt rules to implement Subchapter I-1, Chapter 61,
- 19 Education Code, as added by this Act, not later than January 1,
- 20 2010.
- 21 SECTION 5. This Act does not make an appropriation. A
- 22 provision in this Act that creates a new governmental program,
- 23 creates a new entitlement, or imposes a new duty on a governmental
- 24 entity is not mandatory during a fiscal period for which the
- 25 legislature has not made a specific appropriation to implement the
- 26 provision.
- 27 SECTION 6. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives

- 1 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 2 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 3 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 4 Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
