4	SECTION 1. Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by adding
5	Subchapter II to read as follows:
6	SUBCHAPTER II. CONTRACTS FOR PHYSICIAN SHORTAGE RESIDENCY

8	Sec. 61.511. DEFINITIONS. As used in this subchapter:
9	(1) "Medical school" means a medical school that is
10	part of The University of Texas System, the Texas Tech University
11	System, the Texas A&M University System, the University of North
12	Texas System, or the Baylor College of Medicine.
13	(2) "Approved physician shortage residency training
14	program" means a graduate medical education program that is
15	operated by a medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit
16	corporation and that has been approved for training physicians in a
17	shortage area identified by the Physician Shortage Residency
18	Advisory Committee.
19	Sec. 61.512. CONTRACTS. The board may contract with a
20	medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation for the
21	purpose of establishing and operating an approved physician
22	shortage residency training program and may compensate the medical
23	school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation on a formula
24	approved by the board based upon the number of resident physicians

1 in the training program. 2 Sec. 61.513. RULES. The board shall adopt rules to implement 3 this subchapter. 4 Sec. 61.514. DISBURSEMENTS. (a) Pursuant to a contract, the board may disburse through the designated project director to a 5 medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation funds 6 7 for the purpose of the graduate training of physicians in an approved physician shortage residency training program. 8 The 9 project director of the residency program shall, in accordance with such rules as the board may adopt, make timely reports directly to 10 11 the board concerning the development and progress of the residency tr<u>aining program.</u> 12 13 (b) The board may establish by contract the method or manner

of the disbursement to the project director.
 Sec. 61.515. ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a) The Physician
 Shortage Residency Advisory Committee is created and shall consist

17 of nine members, as follows:

18 (1) one member shall be a licensed physician appointed by 19 the Texas Osteopathic Medical Association;

20 (2) two members shall be administrators of hospitals and
21 shall be appointed by the Texas Hospital Association;

22 (3) two members shall be a licensed physician appointed by 23 the Texas Medical Association;

24 (4) three members of the public shall be appointed to the 25 committee by the governor; and

26 (5) one member representing the Statewide Health
27 Coordinating Council as determining by the chair of the Council.

Each member shall serve until a replacement has been 2 appointed to the committee. 3 (c) The members of the committee serve without 4 compensation, but shall be reimbursed by the board for actual 5 expenses incurred in the performance of duties as members of the 6 7 committee. (d) The committee shall meet at least annually and so often 8 9 as requested by the board or called into meeting by the chairman. 10 (e) The chairman shall be elected by the members of the 11 committee for one year. 12 (f) The committee shall: 13 (1) review data from the Statewide Health Coordinating Council and other resources to determine the physician shortages in 14 15 Texas; 16 (2) review for the board applications for approval and 17 funding of residency training programs and related support 18 programs; (3) make recommendations to the board relating to the 19 20 disbursement of funds under this subchapter based on the following 21 criteria: (A) residency programs which would expand 22 23 training opportunities in medical specialty areas in which there is 24 a shortage in Texas; 25 (B) residency programs which would located in medically underserved communities in Texas; 26 27 (C) residency programs in specialty areas in

which a substantial number of graduates of Texas medical schools 1 2 have left the state of Texas to pursue such training; or 3 (D) residency programs which would undertake innovative approaches to residency training, include extensive use 4 of ambulatory facilities or the creation of medical homes for 5 6 patients; and 7 (4) perform such other duties as may be directed by the 8 board. 9 Sec. 61.516. FUNDING. The board may: (1) receive and expend appropriations for purposes of 10 11 this subchapter, including funds generated by fees under Chapter 153, Occupations Code, in excess of the funds needed for the 12 purposes authorized by Section 153.052, Occupations Code; and 13 (2) accept gifts, grants, and donations of real or 14 personal property from any entity, subject to limitations or 15 conditions set by law, for the purposes of this subchapter. 16 SECTION 2. The heading to Subchapter I, Chapter 17 61, Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 18 SUBCHAPTER I. CONTRACTS FOR FAMILY PRACTICE 19 [MEDICAL] RESIDENCY PROGRAMS. 20 SECTION 3. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board 21 shall adopt rules to implement Subchapter II, Chapter 61, Education 22 Code, as added by this Act, not later than January 1, 2010. 23 24 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 25 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 26

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Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
