4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Chapter 22, Government Code, is amended by
6	adding Subchapter C-1 to read as follows:
7	SUBCHAPTER C-1. PILOT PROJECTS DEVELOPED BY FIRST AND FOURTEENTH
8	COURTS OF APPEALS
9	Sec. 22.250. DEFINITION. In this subchapter "courts of
10	appeals" means the First and Fourteenth Courts of Appeals.
11	Sec. 22.251. PILOT PROJECT FOR DEVELOPMENT AND EVALUATION
12	OF HUMAN RESOURCES. The courts of appeals may implement a pilot
13	project to jointly develop and implement human resources policies
14	and procedures in accordance with this code and the provisions of
15	the Texas Human Resources Management Statutes Inventory.
16	Sec. 22.252. PILOT PROJECT RELATED TO ACCESS THROUGH
17	ON-LINE E-FILING SYSTEM BY PARTIES WHO REPRESENT THEMSELVES. The
18	courts of appeals may implement a pilot project to jointly develop
19	and implement policies and procedures that ensure adequate access
20	to the appellate courts through the Texas Online e-filing system
21	for parties who represent themselves in the courts of appeals.
22	SECTION 2. During the 2010-2011 biennium, the First and
23	Fourteenth Courts of Appeals may evaluate whether the creation of a
24	standardized human resources and employee manual is the most

1 efficient and effective method by which to develop, implement, and 2 maintain policies and procedures relating to employee management in 3 those courts.

SECTION 3. During the 2010-2011 biennium, the First and 4 Fourteenth Courts of Appeals may participate in a pilot project to 5 jointly develop and evaluate criteria to convert certain closed 6 7 civil and criminal case file documents to a digital format and to destroy the remaining paper copies of those files. This criteria 8 9 must comply with all applicable provisions of the Government Code pertaining to the retention and destruction of paper case file 10 11 documents and must be developed in consultation with the state archivist. The courts may retain and destroy paper case file 12 documents from closed civil and criminal cases based on the 13 criteria developed under the pilot project. 14

15 SECTION 4. During the 2010-2011 biennium, the First and 16 Fourteenth Courts of Appeals may participate in a pilot project to 17 jointly develop common procedures for the continuity of operations 18 for the courts and for their recovery from disasters.

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SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

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
