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## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2 WHEREAS, The Ecumenical Patriarchate, located in modern-day 3 Istanbul, formerly known as Constantinople, in the Republic of 4 Turkey, is the Sacred See that presides over a community of 5 self-governing churches of the Orthodox Christian world; and

6 WHEREAS, The See is led by Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew, 7 who is the 269th direct successor of the Apostle Andrew and who 8 holds titular primacy as *primus inter pares*, "first among equals," 9 in the community of Orthodox Churches worldwide; the Orthodox 10 Church has been in existence for nearly 2,000 years and numbers 11 approximately 300 million members around the world, with more than 12 two million members in the United States; and

13 WHEREAS, The government of Turkey refuses to recognize the 14 international status and the rights and religious freedoms of the 15 Ecumenical Patriarchate, the head of the Greek Orthodox Christian 16 Church, which is a minority religion in Turkey; and

17 WHEREAS, The government of Turkey and Turkish prime ministers have limited the candidates available to the Holy Synod for 18 selection as the Ecumenical Patriarch to Turkish nationals who have 19 performed mandatory military service in the Turkish armed forces, 20 and they continue to insist that any new spiritual head of Orthodox 21 22 Christians, including Orthodox Christians in Texas and throughout the United States, be approved by them; because of selective 23 enforcement of laws and regulations, the once large eligible 24

community of Turkish citizens of the Orthodox faith has declined to
only approximately 2,500 persons, most of whom are elderly; and

3 WHEREAS, Before its closure, the Theological School of Halki 4 was the only educational institution for Orthodox Christianity in 5 Turkey; the school was closed in 1971 by Turkish authorities under a 6 law requiring that higher education in religion and minority 7 training be controlled by the state; and

8 WHEREAS, The United States Congress passed a resolution 9 expressing its sentiment that the Orthodox Theological School of 10 Halki in the Republic of Turkey should be reopened in order to 11 promote religious freedom; and

12 WHEREAS, The government of Turkey has reneged on its 13 agreement to reopen the Theological School of Halki, thus impeding 14 training for Orthodox Christian clergy within its borders; and

WHEREAS, In recent years, the government of Turkey has, in violation of the inalienable rights of all peoples, confiscated more than 90 percent of the properties of the Ecumenical Patriarchate and has placed a 42 percent tax, retroactive to 1999, on the nonprofit Balukli hospital, which is run by the Ecumenical Patriarchate; and

21 WHEREAS, The dissolution of the spiritual head of Orthodox 22 Christian Churches in the coming decades is inevitable if Turkey 23 continues its policy of interference in religious matters, despite 24 the government's stated policy of being purely secular in its 25 dealings; and

26 WHEREAS, All Christians in our state, in the United States, 27 and around the world stand to lose this nearly 2,000-year-old

Sacred See, where the text of the New Testament was codified, the 1 2 canonical structure of the Christian church was established, and Nicene and first Creed 3 the was written pronounced; the 4 disappearance of the Ecumenical Patriarchate would mean the loss of a crucial link between Christians and their religious history, 5 sacred texts, and religious forebears; and 6

7 WHEREAS, The disappearance of this See would also mean the 8 end of a crucial link between Christians and the Muslim world; at a 9 time when individuals hostile to the United States are attempting 10 to create conflict between Christians and Muslims, the continuing 11 presence of the Ecumenical Patriarchate in Turkey is a powerful 12 testament to the coexistence of these two faiths in Istanbul since 13 1453; and

14 WHEREAS, Following the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks 15 on America, the spiritual leader of Orthodox Christians, Ecumenical 16 Patriarch Bartholomew, gathered international religious leaders 17 and produced the first statement signed by Muslim leaders that 18 condemned the attacks as "anti-religious"; and

WHEREAS, The importance of Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew to the United States is reflected in the record number of Congressional cosponsors of the measure that bestowed on him America's highest civilian award, the Congressional Gold Medal of Honor--an award also given to George Washington, Winston Churchill, Nelson Mandela, Mother Teresa, and Pope John Paul II; and

25 WHEREAS, The European Union, a group of nations with a common 26 goal of promoting peace and the well-being of its peoples, began 27 accession negotiations with Turkey on October 3, 2005; and

1 WHEREAS, The European Union defined membership criteria for 2 accession to the European Union at the Copenhagen European Council 3 in 1993, obligating candidate countries to have achieved certain 4 levels of reform, including stability of institutions guaranteeing 5 democracy, adherence to the rule of law, and respect for and 6 protection of minorities and human rights; and

7 WHEREAS, The Treaty of Amsterdam, which came into effect in 8 1999, affirms that the European Union is founded on the principles 9 of liberty, democracy, respect for human rights and fundamental 10 freedoms, and the rule of law; Article 13 of the Amsterdam Treaty 11 enables the European Council to take appropriate action to combat 12 discrimination based on religion or belief; and

13 WHEREAS, Turkey's current treatment of the Ecumenical 14 Patriarchate is inconsistent with the membership conditions and 15 goals of the European Union; and

16 WHEREAS, The United States has long been a beacon of hope for 17 vulnerable and disenfranchised people around the world, and the State of Texas has long valued and defended the principles of 18 democracy, individual liberty, freedom of speech, and freedom of 19 20 religion; as citizens of conscience of this great land, we bear both the responsibility and the honor to raise our voices against 21 injustice in behalf of those unable to speak for themselves; now, 22 therefore, be it 23

RESOLVED, That the 81st Legislature of the State of Texas hereby express its support for the Ecumenical Patriarchate and urge the United States, the European Union, and the United Nations, as leaders of the international community, to encourage the government

1 of Turkey to cease its discrimination against one of the oldest 2 institutions in Christianity, the Ecumenical Patriarchate; and, be 3 it further

RESOLVED, That the State of Texas call on the government of Turkey to eliminate all forms of discrimination based on religion and to immediately grant the Ecumenical Patriarchate appropriate international recognition, the right to determine ecclesiastic succession, and the right to train clergy of all nationalities; and, be it further

10 RESOLVED, That the State of Texas call on the government of 11 Turkey to pledge to uphold and safeguard religious rights without 12 compromise; and, be it further

RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward official 13 copies of this resolution to the president of the United States, to 14 15 the United States ambassador to the Republic of Turkey, to the 16 ambassador of the Republic of Turkey to the United States, to the presidents of the commission, parliament, and Council of the 17 European Union, to the secretary general of the United Nations, to 18 the speaker of the house of representatives and the president of the 19 20 senate of the United States Congress, and to all the members of the Texas delegation to Congress with the request that this resolution 21 be officially entered in the Congressional Record as a memorial to 22 the Congress of the United States of America. 23
