A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to classifying elk and elk hybrids as livestock under the
3 Agriculture Code.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Section 1.003(3), Agriculture Code, is amended
6 to read as follows:

7 (3) "Livestock" means cattle, horses, mules, asses,
8 sheep, goats, llamas, alpacas, exotic livestock, elk, elk hybrids,
9 and hogs, unless otherwise defined.

10 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
11 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
12 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
13 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
14 Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
