5	SECTION 1. The vital importance of small businesses to the

7	that it be the policy of this state to encourage the development and

9	opportunities for those businesses to prosper.
10	SECTION 2. Section 481.078, Government Code, is amended by
11	adding Subsections (k) , (1) , (m) , (n) , and (o) to read as follows:
12	(k) To encourage the development and location of small
13	businesses in this state, the governor shall consider making grants
14	from the fund:
15	(1) to recipients that are small businesses in this
16	state that commit to using the grants to create additional jobs;
17	(2) to recipients that are small businesses from
18	outside the state that commit to relocate to this state; or
19	(3) for individual projects that create 100 or fewer
20	additional jobs.
21	(1) For purposes of Subsection (k), "small business" means a
22	legal entity, including a corporation, partnership, or sole
23	<pre>proprietorship, that:</pre>

(1) is formed for the purpose of making a profit;

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- 1 (2) is independently owned and operated; and
- 2 (3) has fewer than 100 employees.
- 3 (m) In making grants under Subsection (k), the governor
- 4 shall consider making grants from the fund to historically
- 5 <u>underutilized businesses</u>, as defined by Section 2161.001.
- 6 (n) In deciding to award a grant under Subsection (k), the
- 7 governor must give priority to a small business over a business that
- 8 pays any of the grant funds to an executive in the form of
- 9 <u>compensation above the executive's base salary.</u>
- 10 (o) The governor is encouraged to consider making grants
- 11 from the fund to support the establishment and expansion of small
- 12 <u>businesses</u> in this state that have as their primary purpose the
- 13 provision of energy derived from renewable energy technology, as
- 14 <u>defined by Section 39.904(d)</u>, Utilities Code.
- SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

SECTION 1. The vital importance of small businesses to the 5 economy of this state and the well-being of its residents requires 6 that it be the policy of this state to encourage the creation and 7 location of small businesses in this state and promote 8

- SECTION 2. Section 481.078, Government Code, is amended by 10 adding Subsections (k) and (l) to read as follows: 11
- (k) To encourage the creation, development, and location of 12 small businesses in this state, the governor shall consider making 13 grants from the fund to recipients that are: 14
- (1) small businesses in this state that commit to 15 16 using the grants to create additional jobs; or
- (2) small businesses from outside the state that 17 18 commit to relocate to this state.
- (1) For purposes of Subsection (k), "small business" means a 19 20 legal entity, including a corporation, partnership, or sole 21 proprietorship, that:
- 22 (1) is formed for the purpose of making a profit;
- 23 (2) is independently owned and operated; and
- 24 (3) has fewer than 100 employees.

SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
