H.B. No. 4789

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to the creation of the Kaufman County Parks Improvement
3 District; providing authority to impose a tax and issue bonds;
4 providing penalties.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

6 SECTION 1. Subtitle C, Title 4, Special District Local Laws
7 Code, is amended by adding Chapter 3873 to read as follows:

CHAPTER 3873. KAUFMAN COUNTY PARKS IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT

SUBCHAPTER A. GENERAL PROVISIONS

Sec. 3873.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:

(1) "Board" means the district's board of directors.

15 (4) "County" means Kaufman County.

16 (5) "Director" means a board director.

17 (6) "District" means the Kaufman County Parks

18 Improvement District

19 (7) "Park" includes any land, including any
20 improvements to the land, that is located in the district or owned
21 or leased by the city for use of the general public.

22 Sec. 3873.002. NATURE OF DISTRICT. The Kaufman County
23 Parks Improvement District is a special district created under
24 Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution.

1 Sec. 3873.003. PURPOSE; DECLARATION OF INTENT. (a) The
2 creation of the district is essential to accomplish the purposes of
3 Sections 52 and 52-a, Article III, and Section 59, Article XVI,
4 Texas Constitution, and other public purposes stated in this
5 chapter. By creating the district and in authorizing the city, the
6 county, and other political subdivisions to contract with the
7 district, the legislature has established a program to accomplish
8 the public purposes set out in Section 52-a, Article III, Texas
9 Constitution.

10 (b) The creation of the district is necessary to promote,
11 develop, encourage, and maintain tourism, recreation, the arts,
12 entertainment, economic development, safety, and the public
13 welfare in the district.

14 (c) This chapter and the creation of the district may not be
15 interpreted to relieve the city or county from providing the level
16 of services provided, as of the effective date of the Act enacting
17 this chapter, to the area in the district. The district is created
18 to supplement and not to supplant the city or county services
19 provided in the area in the district.

20 Sec. 3873.004. FINDINGS OF BENEFIT AND PUBLIC PURPOSE. (a)
21 The district is created to serve a public use and benefit.

22 (b) All land and other property included in the district
23 will benefit from the improvements and services to be provided by
24 the district under powers conferred by Sections 52 and 52-a,
25 Article III, and Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and
26 other powers granted under this chapter.

27 (c) The creation of the district is in the public interest

1 and is essential to:

2 (1) further the public purposes of developing and
3 diversifying the economy of the state; and
4 (2) preserve and conserve the natural resources of the
5 state.

6 (d) The district will:

7 (1) promote the health, safety, and general welfare of
8 residents, employers, employees, potential employees, visitors,
9 and consumers in the district, and of the public;

10 (2) promote the health, safety, welfare, and enjoyment
11 of the public by landscaping, developing, maintaining, financing,
12 operating, and making capital improvements to parks in the
13 district, which are necessary for the restoration, preservation,
14 and enhancement of scenic beauty;

15 (3) conserve the natural resources of the district;
16 and

17 (4) cooperate with the city in the furtherance of
18 common purposes of the city and the district.

19 (e) The district will not act as the agent or
20 instrumentality of any private interest even though the district
21 will benefit many private interests as well as the public.

22 Sec. 3873.005. INITIAL DISTRICT TERRITORY. The district is
23 initially composed of the territory described by Section 2 of the
24 Act enacting this chapter.

25 Sec. 3873.006. ELIGIBILITY FOR INCLUSION IN SPECIAL ZONES.
26 All or any part of the area of the district is eligible to be
27 included in:

- 1 (1) a tax increment reinvestment zone created under
- 2 Chapter 311, Tax Code;
- 3 (2) a tax abatement reinvestment zone created under
- 4 Chapter 312, Tax Code; or
- 5 (3) an enterprise zone created under Chapter 2303,
- 6 Government Code.

7 Sec. 3873.007. LIBERAL CONSTRUCTION OF CHAPTER. This
8 chapter shall be liberally construed in conformity with the
9 findings and purposes stated in this chapter.

10 [Sections 3873.008-3873.050 reserved for expansion]

11 SUBCHAPTER B. CONFIRMATION OF CREATION OF DISTRICT

12 Sec. 3873.051. CONFIRMATION ELECTION. (a) The
13 commissioners court may order an election on the issue of
14 confirming the creation of a district:

15 (1) on the commissioners court's own motion; or
16 (2) after the filing of a written petition signed by a
17 number of the registered voters who reside in the area of the
18 proposed district equal to at least five percent of the votes
19 received in that area in the most recent gubernatorial general
20 election.

21 (b) The petition or commissioners court's motion must
22 include:

23 (1) the name of the district;
24 (2) an accurate description of the area included in
25 the district by any appropriate method, including by metes and
26 bounds and by public roads or rights-of-way; and

27 (3) an accurate plat of the area included in the

1 district.

2 Sec. 3873.052. NOTICE OF HEARING. (a) If a petition is
3 filed under Section 3873.051(a)(2), the commissioners court shall
4 set a date for a hearing on the petition that is after the 20th day
5 but on or before the 40th day after the date the petition is filed.

6 (b) The commissioners court shall publish notice of the
7 petition and the hearing date in a newspaper of general circulation
8 in the county.

9 (c) The notice must be published once each week for a period
10 of two weeks before the hearing date.

11 Sec. 3873.053. HEARING. (a) At the hearing, evidence
12 shall be taken as in civil cases in the county court. The
13 commissioners court shall hear all arguments for and against
14 confirming the creation of the district.

15 (b) The hearing may be adjourned from time to time on good
16 cause shown.

17 (c) The commissioners court shall grant the petition and
18 order the election on the issue of confirming the creation of the
19 district if the commissioners court finds that:

20 (1) the petition is signed by the required number of
21 registered voters;

22 (2) the district will serve the purposes prescribed by
23 Sections 3873.003 and 3873.004; and

24 (3) the district includes any area within the
25 boundaries of the city.

26 Sec. 3873.054. CONFIRMATION ELECTION. (a) The election
27 shall be held in the area of the proposed district on the date of the

1 first regularly scheduled countywide election that follows the date
2 of the order of the election and for which there is sufficient time
3 to comply with other requirements of law.

4 (b) The returns on the election shall be certified and
5 canvassed and the results declared, in the same manner as provided
6 for other county elections. If a majority of the votes received on
7 the issue favor creation of the district, the commissioners court
8 shall declare the creation of the district confirmed and shall
9 enter the results in its minutes at its next regularly scheduled
10 meeting.

11 Sec. 3873.055. COSTS OF CREATION, CONFIRMATION, AND
12 ORGANIZATION. The costs necessarily incurred in the creation,
13 confirmation, and organization of the district may be paid from the
14 district's tax revenue or from revenue from bond anticipation
15 notes, the first revenue bonds issued by the district, or any other
16 source.

18 SUBCHAPTER C. BOARD OF DIRECTORS

19 Sec. 3873.101. GOVERNING BODY; TERMS. The district is
20 governed by a board of five directors who serve staggered terms of
21 four years, with two or three directors' terms expiring June 1 of
22 each odd-numbered year.

23 Sec. 3873.102. ELECTION DATE. The board shall hold
24 elections for directors on the uniform election date in May in
25 odd-numbered years. The elections of the first directors under
26 this section shall be held on the first uniform election date in May
27 that occurs in the years in which initial directors' terms expire

1 under Section 3873.107.

2 Sec. 3873.103. ELIGIBILITY. (a) A director must be a
3 citizen of the United States and must reside in the district.

4 (b) A director may not be an officer or employee of the
5 county or the city.

6 (c) A director may not serve more than four consecutive full
7 terms.

8 Sec. 3873.104. VACANCY. If a vacancy occurs on the board,
9 the board shall appoint a person to fill the vacancy for the
10 remainder of the unexpired term.

11 Sec. 3873.105. QUORUM. Four directors constitute a quorum
12 of the board. The board may act on the majority of the vote of the
13 assembled quorum.

14 Sec. 3873.106. COMPENSATION AND REIMBURSEMENT. A director
15 is not entitled to compensation but is entitled to reimbursement
16 for necessary expenses, including travel expenses, incurred in
17 performing the duties of a director. If the amount of a director's
18 reimbursement for necessary expenses exceeds \$250, the board must
19 approve the reimbursement.

20 Sec. 3873.107. INITIAL VOTING DIRECTORS. (a) The initial
21 board consists of the following voting directors:

1 (b) Of the initial directors, the terms of directors
2 appointed for positions 1 through 3 expire June 1, 2011, and the
3 terms of directors appointed for positions 4 and 5 expire June 1,
4 2013.

5 (c) Section 3873.102 does not apply to this section.

6 (d) If permanent directors have not been elected under
7 Section 3873.102 and the terms of the temporary directors expire,
8 the commissioners court shall appoint successor temporary
9 directors to serve four-year terms.

10 [Sections 3873.108-3873.150 reserved for expansion]

11 SUBCHAPTER D. POWERS AND DUTIES

12 Sec. 3873.151. DEPOSITORYES AND DISBURSEMENTS. (a) Money
13 and other funds belonging to or under control of the board are
14 public funds.

15 (b) The board shall select depositories for the money.

16 (c) A warrant or check for the withdrawal of money must be
17 signed by two persons authorized to sign a warrant or check by
18 resolution entered in the minutes of the board.

19 Sec. 3873.152. PERSONNEL. (a) The board may employ
20 managers, secretaries, stenographers, bookkeepers, accountants,
21 technical experts, and any other support personnel or agents the
22 board considers necessary.

23 (b) The board shall determine the qualifications and set the
24 duties of employees.

25 (c) The board may call on the county attorney, district
26 attorney, or criminal district attorney of the county for the legal
27 services it requires. In addition, or in the alternative, the board

1 may contract for and compensate its own legal staff.

2 Sec. 3873.153. SEAL. The board shall adopt a seal to place
3 on each lease, deed, or other instrument usually executed under
4 seal and on other instruments as the board requires.

5 Sec. 3873.154. CONTRACTS. (a) The board may enter into any
6 contract that the board considers necessary or convenient to carry
7 out the purposes and powers granted by this chapter, including a
8 lease or other contract connected with, incident to, or affecting
9 the acquisition, financing, construction, equipment, maintenance,
10 renovation, repair, improvement, or operation of real property or
11 facilities.

12 (b) If the contract is for an amount less than or equal to
13 the amount provided by Section 262.023, Local Government Code, the
14 board may enter into the contract without advertisement. If the
15 contract is for more than that amount, the contract is subject to
16 the bidding provisions for contracts applicable to a county under
17 that section.

18 (c) To be effective, a contract must be:

19 (1) approved by resolution of the board;
20 (2) executed by the president or vice president; and
21 (3) attested by the secretary or treasurer.

22 Sec. 3873.155. SUITS. The board may sue and be sued in its
23 own name.

24 Sec. 3873.156. DISTRICT RULES AND ORDERS; CRIMINAL PENALTY;
25 CIVIL ENFORCEMENT. (a) The board may adopt reasonable rules and
26 orders applicable to:

27 (1) the administration, enforcement, and collection

1 of district taxes;

2 (2) littering and litter abatement in the parks in the

3 district, including the possession and disposition of glass

4 containers;

5 (3) activities that endanger the health and safety of

6 persons or property in parks in the district;

7 (4) tenants, business privileges, concessionaires,

8 users, and activities affecting district property and facilities,

9 including any provision necessary to protect and conserve natural

10 resources; and

11 (5) a road that borders or runs through a park, subject

12 to an applicable municipal ordinance.

13 (b) A police officer, constable, sheriff, or other law

14 enforcement officer with jurisdiction in the county may arrest a

15 person violating rules or orders of the board and carry out the

16 prosecution of a person arrested under this subsection in the

17 proper court.

18 (c) A person who violates a rule or order adopted under this

19 section commits an offense. An offense under this section is a

20 Class C misdemeanor.

21 (d) The county attorney, district attorney, and criminal

22 district attorney or an attorney retained by the board for this

23 purpose may bring an action to enjoin a violation of board rules or

24 orders.

25 Sec. 3873.157. BOND NOT REQUIRED. If the board brings an

26 action to enforce this subchapter or enjoin a violation of a rule or

27 order adopted by the board under this subchapter, the board is not

1 required to post a bond.

2 Sec. 3873.158. POWER TO ACQUIRE PROPERTY. (a) For the
3 conservation of the district's natural resources, the board may
4 acquire land in the county, inside or outside the district,
5 including streams, lakes, submerged lands, and swamplands, to
6 create parks. The board may develop, improve, protect, and promote
7 the land in a manner the board considers conducive to the general
8 welfare.

9 (b) The land may be acquired by:

10 (1) gift or devise;

11 (2) lump-sum payment; or

12 (3) installment payments regardless of an option to
13 purchase.

14 (c) The district does not have the power of eminent domain.

15 (d) The commissioners court by eminent domain may not

16 acquire land for park purposes and subsequently transfer by any
17 means the land or control of the land to the board for park
18 purposes. If the commissioners court by eminent domain acquires
19 land for purposes other than park purposes, the court may not
20 subsequently transfer by any means the land or control of the land
21 to the board for park purposes unless at least 10 years have expired
22 after the date of the acquisition by the court. This subsection
23 applies only to land that the commissioners court acquires by
24 eminent domain.

25 Sec. 3873.159. SALE OR LEASE OF LANDS. (a) If the board

26 determines that land owned by the district is not necessary for the
27 purposes for which the land was acquired, the board may sell and

1 dispose of the land on terms the board considers advisable.

2 (b) The board may lease or permit the use of land for
3 purposes consistent with the purposes for which the land was
4 acquired and on terms the board considers advisable.

5 (c) Before land owned by the district may be sold, once a
6 week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general
7 circulation in the county the board must publish a notice of its
8 intention to sell the land. The notice must include an accurate
9 description of the land, the time of a public hearing that is before
10 the 10th day before the disposition date, and the time and place at
11 which sealed bids will be received.

12 Sec. 3873.160. ACCEPTANCE OF GRANTS AND GRATUITIES. To
13 promote, establish, or accomplish a purpose of this chapter, the
14 board may:

15 (1) accept grants and gratuities in any form from any
16 source, including the United States government, this state, any
17 state or federal agency, any private or public corporation, or any
18 other person;

19 (2) accept donations of money or other property; and
20 (3) act as trustee of land, money, or other property.

21 Sec. 3873.161. COOPERATION WITH OTHER PUBLIC AUTHORITIES.
22 Under an agreement with a public authority, including the city, in
23 control of parkland in the county, the district may assume control
24 of all or part of the parkland in or contiguous to the district or
25 may contract or cooperate with the authority in connection with the
26 use, development, improvement, and protection of the parkland.

27 Sec. 3873.162. REQUIREMENTS FOR RENTAL OF WATER-ORIENTED

1 RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT. (a) This section applies only to the
2 rental of water-oriented recreational equipment in the district.

3 (b) A person may not rent water-oriented recreational
4 equipment to a person younger than 18 years of age.

5 (c) A person may rent water-oriented recreational equipment
6 to a person who is at least 18 years of age only if:

7 (1) each person who is at least 18 years of age who
8 will use the equipment signs a written agreement for the rental of
9 that equipment; and

10 (2) each person who will use the equipment, regardless
11 of age, is listed on the agreement.

12 Sec. 3873.163. PLAN FOR DEVELOPMENT OF PARKS; ANNUAL
13 BUDGET; FILING. (a) The board shall develop and approve a
14 three-year master plan for capital development and the development
15 of parks and district facilities.

16 (b) The board shall annually review and revise the master
17 plan during the budget process and shall file a copy of the master
18 plan and revisions with the county clerk.

19 (c) The board shall annually develop and approve a one-year
20 budget that must include the suggested revisions and additions to
21 the master plan.

22 (d) The board shall submit the annual budget to the
23 commissioners court for approval and shall file a copy with the
24 county clerk.

25 [Sections 3873.164-3873.200 reserved for expansion]

26 SUBCHAPTER E. GENERAL FINANCIAL PROVISIONS

27 Sec. 3873.201. DISBURSEMENTS AND TRANSFERS OF MONEY. The

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1 board by resolution shall establish the number of directors'
2 signatures and the procedure required for a disbursement or
3 transfer of the district's money.

4 Sec. 3873.202. GENERAL OBLIGATION AND REVENUE BONDS. For
5 the payment of all or part of the costs of a park improvement
6 project or park services, the board may issue bonds in one or more
7 series payable from and secured by ad valorem taxes, revenues,
8 grants, gifts, contracts, leases, or any combination of those
9 funds. Bonds may be liens on all or part of the revenue derived from
10 park improvements or services authorized under this chapter.

11 Sec. 3873.203. TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF BONDS. (a) Bonds may
12 be issued to mature serially or otherwise not more than 40 years
13 from their date of issue.

14 (b) If provided by the bond order or resolution, the
15 proceeds from the sale of bonds may be used to pay interest on the
16 bonds during and after the period of the acquisition or
17 construction of any park improvement project to be provided through
18 the issuance of the bonds, to administrative and operation expenses
19 to create a reserve fund for the payment of the principal of and
20 interest on the bonds, and to create any other funds.

21 Sec. 3873.204. PLEDGES. (a) The board may pledge all or
22 part of the income from park improvement projects financed under
23 this chapter or from any other source to the payment of the bonds,
24 including the payment of principal, interest, and any other amounts
25 required or permitted in connection with the bonds. The pledged
26 income shall be set and collected in amounts that will be at least
27 sufficient, with any other pledged resources, to provide for all

1 payments of principal, interest, and any other amounts required in
2 connection with the bonds and, to the extent required by the order
3 or resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds, to provide for
4 the payment of expenses in connection with the bonds and to pay
5 operation, maintenance, and other expenses in connection with the
6 improvement projects authorized under this chapter.

7 (b) Bonds may be additionally secured by a mortgage or deed
8 of trust on real property relating to the facilities authorized
9 under this chapter owned or to be acquired by the district and by
10 chattel mortgages, liens, or security interests on personal
11 property appurtenant to that real property. The board may
12 authorize the execution of trust indentures, mortgages, deeds of
13 trust, or other forms of encumbrance to evidence the indebtedness.

14 (c) The board may pledge to the payment of the bonds all or
15 any part of any grant, donation, revenue, or income received or to
16 be received from the United States government or any other public or
17 private source.

18 Sec. 3873.205. MUNICIPAL APPROVAL. (a) A district must
19 obtain the approval of the governing body of the city before issuing
20 bonds for a park improvement project and for the plans and
21 specifications of a park improvement project financed by the bond
22 issuance.

23 (b) Instead of approval of bonds by the city, the district
24 before finally approving a capital improvements budget may obtain
25 approval from the governing body of the city of a capital
26 improvements budget for a period not to exceed five years. If a
27 district obtains approval of a capital improvements budget, it may

1 finance the capital improvements and issue bonds specified in the
2 budget without further approval from the city.

3 (c) The district must obtain approval from the city of the
4 plans and specifications of any park improvement project that
5 involves the use of the rights-of-way of streets, roads, or
6 highways or the use of city land or any easements granted by the
7 city.

8 (d) The city is not obligated to pay any bonds, notes, or
9 other obligations of the district.

10 Sec. 3873.206. AD VALOREM TAX; ELECTION. (a) The district
11 must hold an election in the manner provided by Subchapter L,
12 Chapter 375, Local Government Code, to obtain voter approval before
13 the district imposes an ad valorem tax.

14 (b) If authorized at an election under Subsection (a) and
15 subject to Subsection (c), the district may impose an annual ad
16 valorem tax on taxable property in the district to:

17 (1) maintain and operate the district;
18 (2) construct or acquire park improvements; or
19 (3) provide a park service.

20 (c) The board shall determine the tax rate. The tax rate may
21 not exceed 35 cents per \$100 valuation.

22 [Sections 3873.207-3873.250 reserved for expansion]

23 SUBCHAPTER F. DISSOLUTION

24 Sec. 3873.251. DISSOLUTION. (a) The commissioners court by
25 order may dissolve the district. The order may be adopted:

26 (1) on the commissioners court's own motion; or
27 (2) after the filing of a written petition signed by a

1 number of the registered voters who reside in the district equal to
2 at least 10 percent of the votes received in the district in the
3 most recent gubernatorial general election.

4 (b) The commissioners court shall give notice of a hearing
5 on the petition and hold a hearing in the manner prescribed by
6 Sections 3873.052 and 3873.053 for a petition for confirming the
7 creation of the district.

8 (c) The commissioners court shall grant the petition and
9 order the dissolution of the district if the court finds that the
10 petition meets the requirements of this section and that the
11 dissolution is in the best interest of the county.

12 (d) On dissolution of the district, the property and other
13 assets, the debts and other liabilities, and the obligations of the
14 district that are not related to city property become those of the
15 county. The property and other assets, the debts and other
16 liabilities, and the obligations of the district that are related
17 to city property become those of the city.

18 SECTION 2. The Kaufman County Parks Improvement District
19 initially includes all territory contained in Forney Independent
20 School District that is not included in the boundaries of the City
21 of Forney as it exists on the effective date of this Act.

22 SECTION 3. (a) The legal notice of the intention to
23 introduce this Act, setting forth the general substance of this
24 Act, has been published as provided by law, and the notice and a
25 copy of this Act have been furnished to all persons, agencies,
26 officials, or entities to which they are required to be furnished
27 under Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and Chapter 313,

1 Government Code.

2 (b) The governor, one of the required recipients, has
3 submitted the notice and Act to the Texas Commission on
4 Environmental Quality.

5 (c) The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has filed
6 its recommendations relating to this Act with the governor,
7 lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house of representatives
8 within the required time.

9 (d) The general law relating to consent by political
10 subdivisions to the creation of districts with conservation,
11 reclamation, and road powers and the inclusion of land in those
12 districts has been complied with.

13 (e) All requirements of the constitution and laws of this
14 state and the rules and procedures of the legislature with respect
15 to the notice, introduction, and passage of this Act have been
16 fulfilled and accomplished.

17 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
18 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
19 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
20 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
21 Act takes effect September 1, 2009.

2 Sec. 3873.052. NOTICE OF HEARING. (a) If a petition is
3 filed under Section 3873.051(a)(2), the commissioners court shall
4 set a date for a hearing on the petition that is after the 20th day
5 but on or before the 40th day after the date the petition is filed.

6 (b) The commissioners court shall publish notice of the
7 petition and the hearing date in a newspaper of general circulation
8 in the county.

9 (c) The notice must be published once each week for a period
10 of two weeks before the hearing date.

11 Sec. 3873.053. HEARING. (a) At the hearing, evidence
12 shall be taken as in civil cases in the county court. The
13 commissioners court shall hear all arguments for and against

6 (c) A director may not serve more than four consecutive full
7 terms.

8 Sec. 3873.104. VACANCY. If a vacancy occurs on the board,
9 the board shall appoint a person to fill the vacancy for the
10 remainder of the unexpired term.

11 Sec. 3873.105. QUORUM. Three directors constitute a quorum
12 of the board. The board may act on the majority of the vote of the
13 assembled quorum.

14 Sec. 3873.106. COMPENSATION AND REIMBURSEMENT. A director
15 is not entitled to compensation but is entitled to reimbursement
16 for necessary expenses, including travel expenses, incurred in
17 performing the duties of a director. If the amount of a director's
18 reimbursement for necessary expenses exceeds \$250, the board must
19 approve the reimbursement.

20 Sec. 3873.107. INITIAL VOTING DIRECTORS. (a) The initial
21 board consists of five voting directors who meet the eligibility
22 requirements described by Section 3873.103 and are appointed by the

24 may contract for and compensate its own legal staff.

25 Sec. 3873.153. SEAL. The board shall adopt a seal to place
26 on each lease, deed, or other instrument usually executed under
27 seal and on other instruments as the board requires.

1 Sec. 3873.154. CONTRACTS. (a) The board may enter into any
2 contract that the board considers necessary or convenient to carry
3 out the purposes and powers granted by this chapter, including a
4 lease or other contract connected with, incident to, or affecting
5 the acquisition, financing, construction, equipment, maintenance,
6 renovation, repair, improvement, or operation of real property or
7 facilities.

8 (b) If the contract is for an amount less than or equal to
9 the amount provided by Section 262.023, Local Government Code, the
10 board may enter into the contract without advertisement. If the
11 contract is for more than that amount, the contract is subject to
12 the bidding provisions for contracts applicable to a county under
13 that section.

14 (c) To be effective, a contract must be:

- 15 (1) approved by resolution of the board;
- 16 (2) executed by the president or vice president; and
- 17 (3) attested by the secretary or treasurer.

18 Sec. 3873.155. SUITS. The board may sue and be sued in its
19 own name.

20 Sec. 3873.156. DISTRICT RULES AND ORDERS; CRIMINAL PENALTY;
21 CIVIL ENFORCEMENT. (a) The board may adopt reasonable rules and
22 orders applicable to:

- 23 (1) the administration, enforcement, and collection
24 of district taxes;
- 25 (2) littering and litter abatement in the parks in the
26 district, including the possession and disposition of glass
27 containers;

1 (3) activities that endanger the health and safety of
2 persons or property in parks in the district;

3 (4) tenants, business privileges, concessionaires,
4 users, and activities affecting district property and facilities,
5 including any provision necessary to protect and conserve natural
6 resources; and

7 (5) a road that borders or runs through a park, subject
8 to an applicable municipal ordinance.

9 (b) A police officer, constable, sheriff, or other law
10 enforcement officer with jurisdiction in the county may arrest a
11 person violating rules or orders of the board and carry out the
12 prosecution of a person arrested under this subsection in the
13 proper court.

14 (c) A person who violates a rule or order adopted under this
15 section commits an offense. An offense under this section is a
16 Class C misdemeanor.

17 (d) The county attorney, district attorney, and criminal
18 district attorney or an attorney retained by the board for this
19 purpose may bring an action to enjoin a violation of board rules or
20 orders.

21 Sec. 3873.157. BOND NOT REQUIRED. If the board brings an
22 action to enforce this subchapter or enjoin a violation of a rule or
23 order adopted by the board under this subchapter, the board is not
24 required to post a bond.

25 Sec. 3873.158. POWER TO ACQUIRE PROPERTY. (a) For the
26 conservation of the district's natural resources, the board may
27 acquire land in the county, inside or outside the district,

1 including streams, lakes, submerged lands, and swamplands, to
2 create parks. The board may develop, improve, protect, and promote
3 the land in a manner the board considers conducive to the general
4 welfare.

5 (b) The land may be acquired by:
6 (1) gift or devise;

21 Sec. 3873.159. SALE OR LEASE OF LANDS. (a) If the board
22 determines that land owned by the district is not necessary for the
23 purposes for which the land was acquired, the board may sell and
24 dispose of the land on terms the board considers advisable.

25 (b) The board may lease or permit the use of land for
26 purposes consistent with the purposes for which the land was
27 acquired and on terms the board considers advisable.

1 (c) Before land owned by the district may be sold, once a
2 week for four consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general
3 circulation in the county the board must publish a notice of its
4 intention to sell the land. The notice must include an accurate
5 description of the land, the time of a public hearing that is before
6 the 10th day before the disposition date, and the time and place at
7 which sealed bids will be received.

8 Sec. 3873.160. ACCEPTANCE OF GRANTS AND GRATUITIES. To
9 promote, establish, or accomplish a purpose of this chapter, the
10 board may:

11 (1) accept grants and gratuities in any form from any
12 source, including the United States government, this state, any
13 state or federal agency, any private or public corporation, or any
14 other person;

15 (2) accept donations of money or other property; and
16 (3) act as trustee of land, money, or other property.

17 Sec. 3873.161. COOPERATION WITH OTHER PUBLIC AUTHORITIES.
18 Under an agreement with a public authority, including the city, in
19 control of parkland in the county, the district may assume control
20 of all or part of the parkland in or contiguous to the district or
21 may contract or cooperate with the authority in connection with the
22 use, development, improvement, and protection of the parkland.

23 Sec. 3873.162. REQUIREMENTS FOR RENTAL OF WATER-ORIENTED
24 RECREATIONAL EQUIPMENT. (a) This section applies only to the
25 rental of water-oriented recreational equipment in the district.

26 (b) A person may not rent water-oriented recreational
27 equipment to a person younger than 18 years of age.

1 (c) A person may rent water-oriented recreational equipment
2 to a person who is at least 18 years of age only if:
3 (1) each person who is at least 18 years of age who
4 will use the equipment signs a written agreement for the rental of
5 that equipment; and
6 (2) each person who will use the equipment, regardless
7 of age, is listed on the agreement.

8 Sec. 3873.163. PLAN FOR DEVELOPMENT OF PARKS; ANNUAL
9 BUDGET; FILING. (a) The board shall develop and approve a
10 three-year master plan for capital development and the development
11 of parks and district facilities.

12 (b) The board shall annually review and revise the master
13 plan during the budget process and shall file a copy of the master
14 plan and revisions with the county clerk.

15 (c) The board shall annually develop and approve a one-year
16 budget that must include the suggested revisions and additions to
17 the master plan.

18 (d) The board shall submit the annual budget to the
19 commissioners court for approval and shall file a copy with the
20 county clerk.

22 SUBCHAPTER E. GENERAL FINANCIAL PROVISIONS

23 Sec. 3873.201. DISBURSEMENTS AND TRANSFERS OF MONEY. The
24 board by resolution shall establish the number of directors'
25 signatures and the procedure required for a disbursement or
26 transfer of the district's money.

27 Sec. 3873.202. GENERAL OBLIGATION AND REVENUE BONDS. For

1 the payment of all or part of the costs of a park improvement
2 project or park services, the board may issue bonds in one or more
3 series payable from and secured by ad valorem taxes, revenues,
4 grants, gifts, contracts, leases, or any combination of those
5 funds. Bonds may be liens on all or part of the revenue derived from
6 park improvements or services authorized under this chapter.

7 Sec. 3873.203. TERMS AND CONDITIONS OF BONDS. (a) Bonds may
8 be issued to mature serially or otherwise not more than 40 years
9 from their date of issue.

10 (b) If provided by the bond order or resolution, the
11 proceeds from the sale of bonds may be used to pay interest on the
12 bonds during and after the period of the acquisition or
13 construction of any park improvement project to be provided through
14 the issuance of the bonds, to administrative and operation expenses
15 to create a reserve fund for the payment of the principal of and
16 interest on the bonds, and to create any other funds.

17 Sec. 3873.204. PLEDGES. (a) The board may pledge all or
18 part of the income from park improvement projects financed under
19 this chapter or from any other source to the payment of the bonds,
20 including the payment of principal, interest, and any other amounts
21 required or permitted in connection with the bonds. The pledged
22 income shall be set and collected in amounts that will be at least
23 sufficient, with any other pledged resources, to provide for all
24 payments of principal, interest, and any other amounts required in
25 connection with the bonds and, to the extent required by the order
26 or resolution authorizing the issuance of the bonds, to provide for
27 the payment of expenses in connection with the bonds and to pay

1 operation, maintenance, and other expenses in connection with the
2 improvement projects authorized under this chapter.

3 (b) Bonds may be additionally secured by a mortgage or deed
4 of trust on real property relating to the facilities authorized
5 under this chapter owned or to be acquired by the district and by
6 chattel mortgages, liens, or security interests on personal
7 property appurtenant to that real property. The board may
8 authorize the execution of trust indentures, mortgages, deeds of
9 trust, or other forms of encumbrance to evidence the indebtedness.

10 (c) The board may pledge to the payment of the bonds all or
11 any part of any grant, donation, revenue, or income received or to
12 be received from the United States government or any other public or
13 private source.

14 Sec. 3873.205. MUNICIPAL APPROVAL. (a) A district must
15 obtain the approval of the governing body of the city before issuing
16 bonds for a park improvement project and for the plans and
17 specifications of a park improvement project financed by the bond
18 issuance.

19 (b) Instead of approval of bonds by the city, the district
20 before finally approving a capital improvements budget may obtain
21 approval from the governing body of the city of a capital
22 improvements budget for a period not to exceed five years. If a
23 district obtains approval of a capital improvements budget, it may
24 finance the capital improvements and issue bonds specified in the
25 budget without further approval from the city.

26 (c) The district must obtain approval from the city of the
27 plans and specifications of any park improvement project that

1 involves the use of the rights-of-way of streets, roads, or
2 highways or the use of city land or any easements granted by the
3 city.

4 (d) The city is not obligated to pay any bonds, notes, or
5 other obligations of the district.

6 Sec. 3873.206. AD VALOREM TAX; ELECTION. (a) The district
7 must hold an election in the manner provided by Subchapter L,
8 Chapter 375, Local Government Code, to obtain voter approval before
9 the district imposes an ad valorem tax.

10 (b) If authorized at an election under Subsection (a) and
11 subject to Subsection (c), the district may impose an annual ad
12 valorem tax on taxable property in the district to:

- 13 (1) maintain and operate the district;
- 14 (2) construct or acquire park improvements; or
- 15 (3) provide a park service.

16 (c) The board shall determine the tax rate. The tax rate may
17 not exceed 35 cents per \$100 valuation.

19 SUBCHAPTER F. DISSOLUTION

20 Sec. 3873.251. DISSOLUTION. (a) The commissioners court by
21 order may dissolve the district. The order may be adopted:

- 22 (1) on the commissioners court's own motion; or
- 23 (2) after the filing of a written petition signed by a
24 number of the registered voters who reside in the district equal to
25 at least 10 percent of the votes received in the district in the
26 most recent gubernatorial general election.

27 (b) The commissioners court shall give notice of a hearing

1 on the petition and hold a hearing in the manner prescribed by
2 Sections 3873.052 and 3873.053 for a petition for confirming the
3 creation of the district.

4 (c) The commissioners court shall grant the petition and
5 order the dissolution of the district if the court finds that the
6 petition meets the requirements of this section and that the
7 dissolution is in the best interest of the county.

8 (d) On dissolution of the district, the property and other
9 assets, the debts and other liabilities, and the obligations of the
10 district that are not related to city property become those of the
11 county. The property and other assets, the debts and other
12 liabilities, and the obligations of the district that are related
13 to city property become those of the city.

14 SECTION 2. The Kaufman County Parks Improvement District
15 initially includes all territory contained in Forney Independent
16 School District that is not included in the boundaries of the City
17 of Forney as it exists on the effective date of this Act.

18 SECTION 3. (a) The legal notice of the intention to
19 introduce this Act, setting forth the general substance of this
20 Act, has been published as provided by law, and the notice and a
21 copy of this Act have been furnished to all persons, agencies,
22 officials, or entities to which they are required to be furnished
23 under Section 59, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, and Chapter 313,
24 Government Code.

25 (b) The governor, one of the required recipients, has
26 submitted the notice and Act to the Texas Commission on
27 Environmental Quality.

1 (c) The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has filed
2 its recommendations relating to this Act with the governor,
3 lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house of representatives
4 within the required time.

5 (d) The general law relating to consent by political
6 subdivisions to the creation of districts with conservation,
7 reclamation, and road powers and the inclusion of land in those
8 districts has been complied with.

9 (e) All requirements of the constitution and laws of this
10 state and the rules and procedures of the legislature with respect
11 to the notice, introduction, and passage of this Act have been
12 fulfilled and accomplished.

13 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
14 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
15 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
16 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
17 Act takes effect September 1, 2009.
